

CITY COUNCIL ACCEPTS BID

Par Bid Offered By Treasury Department Accepted.

A par bid offered by the treasury department of the state of Oregon on Klamath Falls street improvement bonds was accepted by the city council at a meeting held last night. One other bid on the bonds was received.

The state put in a 5 1/2 per cent bid on the bonds which amounted to \$110,428.36. The United Oregon corporation at Portland was the other bidder.

It was felt by the council that this is another evidence of the state's trust in the bond sinking fund of this city which was proved once before when T. B. Kay, state treasurer, signified the state's intention of offering a par bid on the municipal airport bonds.

Some results of the new city tax ordinance which was passed by the city council a week ago were felt last night when J. A. Cornforth, Anderson's Taxi and the White Star Taxi, applied for a license to operate. Other applications are expected to be filed later. These were referred to the police committee. Under the new ordinance taxi owners are not allowed to have stands along Main street or any side street between Main and Pine.

The second reading of several ordinances, including the "sawdust" ordinance, and the plumbing ordinance, were laid over until next week.

H. E. Stock & Co. requested the extension of time on sewer units 12 and 13, which was granted. The company expects to have these units completed by December 16. W. D. Miller was granted until December 20 to have improvement unit 72 completed.

Twelve building permits, totaling \$9,590, were allowed. At the conclusion of the meeting it was announced that a meeting of the budget committee would be held this afternoon at 2:30, when the budget will receive its final passage by the committee.

Darling swore out a complaint against Wright for assault with a dangerous weapon. Wright was released on \$250 cash bail.

Head Blown Open
Chief Keith Ambrose, Sheriff Lloyd Low, Deputy Coroner Joyaux, and Deputy District Attorney Gillenwaters immediately took charge. Dr. Paul Sharp was called but it was too late. Darling was dead.

Mother Near Darling
"He was all I had, I'll get that man," Mrs. Martha Earl, mother of Darling, stated as she sat nearby exhausted and shaking with sobs. Mrs. Earl and Mrs. S. W. Sweetman ran the dining room of the hotel which was not under lease to Wright.

Saw Wright Get Gun
Max Redington, cde at the hotel, told of Wright's getting the 12 gauge shotgun from the room near the hotel desk, putting in one shell and walking out. He did not see him bring in the gun, he stated.

Called Officers
L. E. Stoner, mechanic with the Dunham Auto company, said that he arrived soon after the shooting and saw Wright with the gun. He then went to help the women, who were badly frightened.

Not Sorry
He asked what had happened, and was told that Darling was dead. "I did a good job. huh?", he said.

Was Worrying
Then he said that he was nearly 50 years old. Had made and lost two fortunes. That he could not face going out and working hard with his hands again at his age and that when he thought of someone trying to get his last "shoe string" he couldn't bear it.

The man told Firth he was a forest ranger and was in a hurry to get into Los Angeles to see his daughter, who had been injured and was in the children's hospital. Firth said he took the man, who gave the name of Hall, to the hospital, and was handed a \$5 bill, peeled from a big roll the asserted ranger carried in his pocket.

Firth said he became suspicious later, because the man described the wreck in detail during the ride to the city.

No ranger by the name of Hall is listed in forestry department records.
