CHAMPIONSHIP OF STATE AT STAKE TODAY

State Schools Battle For Coveted Title At Eugene.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 16 (AP)—The mythical state college football championship was the object of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college eleven here today. Today's game will be the 35th annual football contest between the two Oregon institutions.

Orange Soaks Revenge
The University of Oregon has won a majority of the games but the Staters were in a revengeful mood today, having lost last year's contest to the Webfeet.

Rivalry Keen
Rivalry between the two institutions had run unusually high this season. First, part of the huge concrete "O" on Skinner's Butte here, symbol of the University of Oregon, was blasted away. Several nights later an unidentified gang invaded the Oregon State college campus and spread the Webfeet colors haphazardly upon buildings.

Since then both institutions have maintained freshmen campus guards, armed with baseball bats, crowbars and other implements of warfare.

Both teams have had two weeks of rest and were primed for the "civil war."

Dundee In Line To Fight Fields

CHICAGO, Nov. 16, (AP)—The progress of My Sullivan of St. Paul, toward a chance at Jackie Fields' welterweight title, has been ruined, and a member of the Dundee family of Baltimore stood today as an outstanding challenger for the crown.

Vince Dundee, brother of Joe from whom Fields won his title, used the occasion of Jack Dempsey's third show at the coliseum last night to stop Sullivan's string of triumphs by a decision victory in 10 rounds. Dundee's margin was enough to place him in line for a bout with Fields for the championship, as contemplated by Dempsey.

Bud Taylor, veteran Terre Haute, Ind., featherweight, walloped Santiago Morilla, San Blas Indian, in another 10-rounder. The show drew 7,678 customers who paid \$20,640.

Calls Same Play Six Straight Times

Quarterbacks are usually commended for "mixing up" plays to confuse the defense, but Lee Hanley, Northwestern quarterback, called the same type of play six times straight, and scored a touchdown on Wisconsin.

While Wisconsin was busy watching Bruder, flashy halfback, Hanley called Berghorn to buck the same side of the line on six straight plays and crossed up the Badger defense. As usual, of course, the credit went to Hanley and Berghorn but scouts present jotted down a note to watch the two gigantic Wildcat tackles who were opening the hole.

As it turned out, that touchdown spelled defeat, 7 to 0, for Gloomy Glenn Thistlewaite, who had formerly coached at Northwestern himself.

Anything that is successful in sports and gets results is considered a good play even if it is not technically orthodox.

The accident occurred when the team was on the way to Weston for a game today and was caused by steering trouble. The game was called off.

OREGON FROSH TAME ROOKIES

Come From Behind in Third Quarter to Lead in Wild and Thrilling Game

CORVALLIS, Nov. 16, (AP)—In a wild and thrilling football game here yesterday, University of Oregon Freshmen evened up their 7 to 6 defeat at Medford last week by coming from behind in the last half to defeat Oregon State Rooks 31 to 19. The Rooks led at the half by 17 to 12. The "break" came in the third quarter, when Frank Lillie, Oregon State fullback, got rough and was sent to the bench. The Rooks at the same time suffered a penalty half the distance to their own goal, the Frosh taking the ball on Oregon State 33-yard line. A 10-yard forward pass, Rushlow to Sheehy, advanced the ball to the 23-yard marker. Rushlow, on a delayed buck, suddenly broke through to the left and galloped 19 yards for a touchdown. From that moment the Frosh held the upper hand. A crowd of 5000 witnessed the struggle.

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Today's Games Mark Making Or Breaking of Champions

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16, (AP)—The thunder of decisive battles destined to either make or break leaders of far western football, will echo over half a dozen Pacific coast gridirons today, as six conference teams fight it out, and a like number tear at each other for non-conference football honors.

Bears Undefeated
Undefeated and unrivaled thus far in their most difficult conquests, the Golden Bears of California will come to grips at Berkeley with an old rival from the north, Coach Enoch Bagshaw's Washington Huskies, who thus far have failed to win a game this season, but still are rated a formidable foe.

When the Huskies line up against their California rivals, they will at least hold the psychological advantage of knowing they have nothing to lose and much to gain. Since the start of the season, Washington has met only adversity, and its meeting with the Bears appeared to be a privilege that comes rarely in any season. This will be the last conference game of the Huskies this year.

Old Rivals Meet
Two rivals who for thirty five years have been struggling for gridiron supremacy in Oregon will clash at Eugene, where University of Oregon meets Oregon State. The University of Oregon eleven have won a majority of the games in the past, but today the Oregon Staters were ready to give battle with a vengeance, still smarting under their defeat of last year. Oregon has lost but one conference game this season.

Cougars Should Win
Washington State and the Montana Grizzlies were staging a party at Missoula, with prospects bright for the invaders of returning home with the lion's share of the honors. It will be the last home game of the season for the Grizzlies.

La Grande School Closes First Season by Winning Mythical Title

LA GRANDE, Ore., Nov. 16 (AP)—Eastern Oregon Normal school decisively defeated Monmouth normal football team here yesterday to claim the mythical state normal school championship. The score was 17 to 7.

The easterners outplayed the visitors except in the first period. Rust, halfback, intercepted a Monmouth pass to pave the way for the first touchdown in the first period. Monmouth then scored after a 75-yard march, and a 17-yard forward pass to tie the score.

Rust kicked a field goal from the 10-yard line to complete the scoring.

East Oregon concluded its first season of competition with victories over Monmouth, Whitman, College of Idaho a tie with Lewiston normal, and a defeat by the Oregon State Rooks.

Ashland Teachers Crush Chico Squad

ASHLAND, Nov. 16, (AP)—The Chico, Calif., State Normal school eleven went down to a crushing defeat before the southern Oregon Normal team here yesterday. The score was 30 to 7.

The Californians scored first. The Oregon teachers matched the counter in the first half, and held the visitors scoreless thereafter.

The Southern Oregon team was outweighted more than 20 pounds per man.

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
