Local Firm Qualifies—

A local firm has qualified as plant experimenters for the government, according to an announcement from the Nord's Landscape Service made yesterday. "We are receiving new plants every day and now have in the neighborhood of six hundred and fifty varieties of Perennial and Alpine plants planted at the nursery," said H. C. Batesham, horticulturist yesterday. "Our collection includes seventy-five of the newer varieties of Iris and fifty of the later introductions of Peonies. Fifty thousand Gladiolus bulbs of the newer introductions were received recently, and all these will be shown next year at our Fair grounds display yards." "In addition we expect to receive in a few days from the U. S. Department of Agriculture a large number of new trees and shrubs being introduced into this country, which we will experiment with and report our results to the Bureau of Plant Industry. We have qualified as Experimenters for the government in this section and our display grounds at our new location will contain plants of all new varieties being introduced by the U. S. government into this country."
