Present Season Finds Several Graduates On Big Teams

Klamath high, in her 22 years of intercollegiate football, has developed many players who have starred in college conferences.

When the students of today were making mud pies in their back yards, K. H. developed such players as Scott Warren, U. of O. tackle, and "Pod" Montgomery, quarterback at O. S. C. Warren is not playing this year, but Montgomery is very much in evidence.

Three Playing Now

In the past few years Klamath has given a tackle to Idaho, a tackle to Oregon State college, and an end to St. Ignace. These three men are playing this season.

To elucidate further, "Bill" Bessler is the tackle at University of Idaho. "Bill" played here for three years, where he carried the nickname of "Wild Bill." And he was wild. "Bill" is taking engineering at the university where he is a sophomore. With black, wavy hair and twinkling blue eyes, "Bill" is fondly remembered by all who have seen him play.

"Pat" Popular

"Pat" Lucas is a tackle at Oregon State college. "Pat" was student body president in 1927. In this capacity he gave his executive as well as his athletic ability to the school.

At O. S. C. "Pat" is taking medicine, majoring in surgery, a member of the junior class, and a tackle on the football squad. "Pat" is doing his share to bring glory to the high school from which he graduated.

Huntley Great End

LeRoy Huntley, right end at St. Ignace, left here in '28, and played the following year at Ashland normal.

This football season LeRoy has been playing so well that the sport writers of the leading papers in the bay district have picked him as one of the outstanding 25 players on the coast.

This means that he shapes up with such gridsters as "Benny" Lom of U. C. and "Johnny" Kittmiller of U. of O. LeRoy has two more years ahead of him, and then he plans to go east, where he will study to be a coach. LeRoy is probably the biggest reason Klamath Hi bows to no one when it comes to developing football players.

STRIBLING OUT ON FOUL BLOW

Went to Fourth Round With Italian Giant, Only to Be Counted Out on a Foul

LONDON, Nov. 19, (AP)—William L. (Young) Stribling's first English ring appearance has ended in defeat. The Macon, Ga., heavyweight lost on a foul to Primo Carnera, huge Venetian carpenter, in the fourth round of their 15-round encounter at Royal Albert hall last night. Eight thousand fans, including the Prince of Wales, packed the famous hall, and were rewarded with some spectacular milling.

Stribling amazed the crowd with his skillful work in the first two rounds when he evaded all of the giant Italian's wild swings and gave Carnera a bad beating about the body.

In the third round Stribling cracked the Italian on the jaw and Carnera went down for a count of six. Carnera got up in a wild fury and floored Stribling for a count of nine. The American was dazed, but gamely got up and succeeded in holding his rival at bay for the rest of the round.

Early in the fourth round Stribling landed a right and left to Carnera's body. The referee ruled the blows were foul, and Stribling was disqualified.

Carnera, weighing 263, had an advantage of 95 pounds, and towered eight inches above his American rival.

TRICK PLAYS USUALLY DO NOTHING BUT FOOL THE PLAYERS AND SPECTATORS

STRAIGHT FOOTBALL IS USUALLY THE MOST SUCCESSFUL

Even as great a coach as Knute Rockne is a firm believer that comparatively simple formations are much more successful against all kinds of opposition than intricate, trick maneuvers that usually fool the team using them more than the opposing eleven.

It was Rockne who put up the sign "Secret Practice, Walk In" when his team was being scouted by the opposition.

"Timing and coordination is the main thing in the modern game," said the Swede. "Individual brilliancy is sacrificed these days for team work."

"One of the few 'trick' plays I remember that was successful was Pennsylvania's hidden ball play and even that play was broken up by opposing teams after the first three or four plays and they had to go back to straight, fundamental football."

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GRAND CLIMAX DUE SATURDAY IN CALIFORNIA

Cardinals and Bears Gird Loins For Finish Fight.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 19, (AP)—The grand climax of the Pacific Coast conference football season will unfold itself in the Stanford bowl Saturday, with the University of California Bears pitted against their ancient rivals, the Stanford Cardinals.

With the conference championship at stake, the Bears cannot afford defeat. A victory will give California the title, but a loss will bring on an anti-climax in which the Trojans of Southern California would stand an excellent chance of nailing the crown. That chance would lay mostly in defeating the Idaho Vandals at Los Angeles Saturday, and Washington State Cougars November 30. The two victories would give the men of Troy a larger percentage.

All things considered, however, California appears to be the favorite contender for the championship. Undelected and untied in conference play, the Bears were rated the superior eleven by virtue of the better showing they have made.

With several of their good men out of practice with injuries suffered in the clash with Santa Clara, the Cardinals were at work today preparing for their battle Saturday. It was not certain whether the injured players would return to the line in time. They were Heinicke and Taylor, centers, and Rudy Rintala, halfback. They were all treated for leg injuries at Palo Alto hospital.

WILDCATS WIN SIX GAMES

The Wildcats, K. U. H.'s second string squad, have played a perfect season, defeating all opponents and annexing the county championship.

The first game of the season was with Henley. The Wildcats won 29-0. This game was played at Henley, October 5. Boyd was the star of this game.

The next game was played with Malin at Malin October 11. The Klamath team triumphed, 19-7. It was a close game, and Malin's passing attack kept the Wildcats guessing. "Stars" were Boyd and Hall.

The imposing score of 60-0 was run up against Lakewood October 19 at the fair grounds. Players who distinguished themselves were R. Hamaker, Boyd, Elliott and Lundquist.

Merrill was defeated 32-7, on the home field October 26. Hamaker, Brunton and Lundquist made touchdowns.

November 2, the Wildcats tangled with Bonanza and came out victors, running up a score of 51-0. R. Hamaker, Boyd, Brunton and Reckard played stellar roles.

Malin was the victim of the Wildcats November 9 at the fairgrounds, 25-7. By winning this game the Wildcats became county champions. Boyd, Elliott, Allen, Reckard and Hamaker led the attack.

It was the first game of the 1929-30 season. The play was not up to par, but was good for the opener, and was brightened up by some sparkling bits of hockey.

WAS COLLEGE COACH

CORVALLIS, Nov. 19, (AP)—E. J. "Doc" Stewart, former football and basketball coach, who was accidentally killed near Kerrville, Texas, yesterday, when mistaken for a deer by a hunting companion, coached Oregon State college football teams from 1912 to 1914, and was regarded as one of the most colorful mentors that ever coached here. He succeeded Sam Dolan as the Orange coach.

The November meeting and dinner of the Klamath county merchants' bureau was held last night at the chamber of commerce rooms with George Cunniff, vice chairman, presiding.

The greater portion of the evening was taken up in discussion of the formal Christmas opening which is being sponsored by the bureau. The unveiling of windows will take place at 7:30 on the evening of December 6, and prizes will be awarded by the bureau for the best displays. A method of visiting every window will be worked out.

Band to Play

The Klamath union high school band in uniform will be on the street and a program will be held at some point, details of which are to be announced later. Evergreen trees for the occasion are to be furnished by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, it was announced.

On the same evening the annual Klamath potato hall will open with a grand march at 9 o'clock at the fairgrounds exhibit building.

A report of the membership committee made by E. L. Cramblitt, chairman, showed that the bureau is now composed of 60 signed up retail merchants of the county, and it is expected this figure will reach the 100 mark within the coming week or two.

Save Merchants Money

The benefit of the merchants of the advertising and soliciting committee which requires legitimate references of any company soliciting in the city, was stressed. The committee has already saved thousands of dollars for merchants of the city, and it is believed the amount in savings will rise much higher.

Oregon To Close Season Saturday

PORTLAND, Nov. 19, (AP)—The University of Oregon will play its final Northwest gridiron contest of the 1929 season here Saturday against the University of Hawaii minus its outstanding performer, Johnny Kittmiller, the "Flying Dutchman."

Kittmiller is in the Eugene hospital, suffering from a broken ankle, received on Hayward field in the university campus last Saturday in the annual homecoming game between Oregon and Oregon State college. Physicians declared he will be able to return to the gridiron next season, but he is out for the remainder of this season. Kittmiller had planned to turn out for basketball this winter, he having missed the team by the narrowest of margins last year. His injury will also keep him off the basketball court.

Although there is no one who can adequately fill the hole at quarterback, Kittmiller's substitute in the Hawaii game probably will be Johnny Londahl, his understudy. Londahl replaced Kittmiller last Saturday and turned in a brilliant performance.

The Hawaiian squad, scheduled to arrive at San Francisco today, was to enroute for this city immediately, stopping off en route at Ashland, Ore., for a brief workout. The Wolfest will desert their Eugene stronghold Friday, arriving here the same day.

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
