McCumber Meets Good Man in Semi-Windup on Card Friday

Jimmy O'Dowd, who will fight Willie Feldman here Friday night in the main event of the Legion fight card, arrived last night from Oakland, Calif.

O'Dowd was accompanied by his manager, Walter Coffey, former star middleweight of the world, and Battling Siki, colored heavyweight who meets K. O. McCumber in the semi-windup.

An Irishman, O'Dowd is described as in great demand in the bay district. He bores in and is always willing to exchange blows with his opponent. That's what Feldman likes, and it is expected that the bout Friday night will be a "hot-shot."

In his last bout in the large Dreamland hall in San Francisco he fought Wesley Ketchell, who has won his last six out of seven bouts and gave the "wise" fans who were betting 2 to 1 on Ketchell a surprise by taking a technical knockout when the referee stopped the bout.

In his short career he has had 75 fights and has won 50 percent by the knockout route.

After another knockout to his credit Monday night at Medford, Kayo McCumber, Dairy giant, will fill one-half of the semi-windup notch. That's a total of seven kayoes for the Dairy comer. He will face his hardest fight when he meets Battling Siki, tough negro from Oakland.

Should McCumber pin one on Siki it is thought that he will be the big drawing card here with probably better chances in the future.

Harold Wright and Roy Rose, in a special event, may steal the show. Great rivalry exists between the two and each has something besides a win in mind, according to Joe Bickerstaff, matchmaker. Rose challenged any 130-pounder on the coast from the ring at the last card here and Wright stepped up and said "I'll go."

Tonight at 5 p.m. O'Dowd will work out at the Legion gym and all fans are invited to be present. Bickerstaff stated last night. Tickets for the card Friday are on sale at the Mecca.

Jessup Heaviest of Football Pivot Men

CHICAGO, Nov. 20. (AP)—Four hundred and sixty pounds of football players will be posed at center when the University of Washington eleven meets Chicago on Stagg Field Saturday.

Paul Jessup, Washington captain, whose six feet, seven inches and 235 pounds make the biggest man in college football, will represent the Huskies, and Charles "Buck" Weaver, six feet, four inches and 225 pounds, will start at center for the Maroons.

GAME BOARD ADOPTS RULE OF ECONOMY

Drop Special Wardens And Hold Down All Expense Items.

Drastic reductions in expenses have been called for by the members of the state game commission. At the monthly meeting last week the commissioners authorized Harold Clifford, state game warden, to make such reductions as he thought necessary. The work of the commission will not be crippled and the economy program will continue until license fees start coming in next April. Several special deputy game wardens will be dropped from the payroll, expenses of regular deputies are to be reduced and practically all proposed work that would go ahead were finances at high tide will be delayed until there is more money in the game protection fund.

Conquers Scupper

A total of 255 cougar were killed in Oregon during the state game commission's fiscal year which ended September 30. This was 34 more than were killed during the preceding year. A total of 87 of the big cats were killed in Douglas county; 55 in Lane, 37 in Curry and Clackamas and 25 each in Clatsop and Clatsop counties.

Game Violations Many

There were 81 arrests for angling without a license and 82 for hunting without license. Citizens apprehended in illegal possession of deer meat numbered 82. In the combined counties of the state there were 659 arrests for violation of the game laws and out of these 628 convictions were obtained. Convicted law violators who went to jail were 33.

Birds More Plentiful

Gene Simpson, superintendent of state game farms has reported to Harold Clifford, state game warden that 17,823 Chinese pheasants were released during the year. In addition to these there was a release of 1,442 Hungarian partridges in the counties of Eastern Oregon. Wild turkeys released numbered 356, guinea fowl 537 and golden pheasants 60.

Trout On Increase

Trout eggs of all types taken during the year ending September 30, were in excess of the number taken during the previous year according to the report of Matt Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries. Also there was a substantial increase in the number of fish planted in the state's lakes and streams. A total of 47,454,058 eggs were taken and 25,507,011 trout planted as against 42,240,359 eggs taken and 20,348,678 trout planted in the previous year. The trout placed in streams were much larger than during any other year during the game commission's history. Several million were of sufficient size to be within the legal length limit for catching when they were taken from the hatchery ponds.

Run Of White Fish

White fish are reported to be running in Trapper Creek in Deschutes county in such large numbers that it is possible to dip them from the stream with nets, according to reports made to the state game commission. Several reports condemning such methods of catching these fish have been made to Harold Clifford, state game warden. There is no law protecting the white fish and as they are of the type of the finny tribe not greatly desired in Oregon waters the word has gone out for fishermen to dip up all they want as long as they do not make a mistake of catching protected trout.

MUNROE PULLS DRAW IN BOUT WITH O'LEARY

PORTLAND, Nov. 20. (AP)—The four round draw between Frankie Munroe, Klamath Falls, and Charlie O'Leary, Portland, was the bright spot on last night's boxing card here, and the only contest to arouse the enthusiasm of the fans. The two boys mixed from start to finish, and both were shaken up time after time with solidly landed blows.

Gene O'Grady, Ashland light heavyweight, outpointed Denny Lenhart, Roseburg, in their ten round event. O'Grady landed at will throughout the fight, Lenhart being content with landing an occasional left to the face, except in the latter rounds, when he put his right hand to work.

The final main event between Benny Pels, Portland, and Joe Gonzales, Mexican featherweight of Oakland, lasted just one minute and two seconds, with but one blow being struck. Pels landed a short right to the pit of Gonzales' stomach and it was all over.

Earl Bebe, Portland, knocked out Mike Brotherton, Walla Walla, in the first round, and Hank Zestro, Portland, put Tom Kelley, Portland, away in the fourth round in the preliminaries.

FOREIGN HEAVIES SIGNED

CHICAGO, Nov. 20. (AP)—Salvatore Ruggirello, giant Italian heavyweight and Hein Mueller, recent German heavyweight arrival, has been signed for the 10-round semi-final bout, supporting the Tuffy Griffith Paolino Uscudun bout at the Chicago Stadium, November 29.

CARDS NOT UP TO USUAL FORM

Warner Machine Facing One of Hardest Battles in Years With Bears Saturday

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. Nov. 20. (AP)—Facing a difficult battle Saturday against the tough conference leading Bears of the University of California, the most formidable foe they will meet this football season, the Cardinals of Stanford University were having their troubles today, and the prospects were not so bright.

Although several of the Cardinals were not in the pink of condition, most of the eleven will see service in Saturday's fray. It was certain, however, that Rudy Rintala, crack half-back, would not be in the lineup, for Rudy twisted his ankle in the game last Saturday with Santa Clara. Thus the Stanford team is left with only two left half-backs, Lud Frentrup and Phil Moffat. The latter also was considerably battered by the flying hoofs of the Broncos, but at least he can still do some practice.

It is admitted that the general condition of the team, physically, is not up to standard. The trouble is not much with new injuries as with old troubles that have kept men out of play throughout the season. However, Coach Warner is proceeding as best he can, and regular practice sessions are being held daily. The team will move out for a nearby country club Friday night.

BEARS EXPECT TO BEAT CARDS

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 20. (AP)—Coach Nibs Price and his busy Bears were at work today preparing a parcel of grief to hand to the Stanford Cardinals in the Bowl at Palo Alto Saturday, a battle in which the University of California eleven expected to emerge victorious, but one that is not without its hazards.

With a "we will win" spirit that bodes no good for the Red and White, the conference leading Bears worked long and hard to perfect their crushing attack and an invulnerable defense. Only this game must be barged for the Bears to claim the 1929 Pacific coast conference championship. A defeat would be like slamming the door to the crown jewels in their face. Enthusiasm and excellent conditions prevailing throughout the entire eleven were notable features of the Bears' practice sessions. The possibility was seen that a shift in the backfield would be made for the game Saturday. Moose Garrity, a junior, was being groomed to replace Rusty Gill, husky sophomore, at fullback. The remainder of the backfield found Lee Eisan at quarter, and Ed Griffiths and Benny Lem at the halves.

Orange Eleven To Face Tough Team Saturday

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 20.—Oregon university football team, one of the leading in the middle west, will be Oregon State's intercollegiate opponent Saturday at Detroit in the last game of the season for the Orange. The Detroit Titans under Gus Dorais present a formidable eleven which has 24 wins to its credit. The Orangemen with Coach Paul J. Schlatter at the helm have proved colorful in games with teams from other parts of the country.

Since Schlatter came to Oregon State in 1924 the Orangemen games, losing the first to Nebraska, winning the next from Marquette at Milwaukee, Wis., tied a third 14 to 14, with Carnegie Tech at Portland, and took a sensational 25 to 13 decision over New York university last year. At least three All-Americans have played against Oregon State in these games including Howard Harpater, quarterback have played four intercollegiate

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
