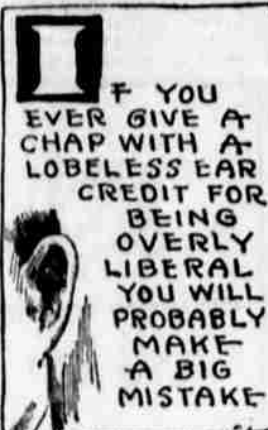


NEWS IN BRIEF

Roads Slippery—
All persons contemplating motoring to Crater Lake National park, even if only through the Anna Springs loop from Klamath Falls to Crater Lake, are warned to have their cars equipped with chains, as the going between Union creek and the rim is slippery from the recent snows and cold weather, according to word received here today. Ninety cars with 282 sightseers visited Crater Lake last Sunday and one or two minor accidents were caused by lack of chains. The Crater Lake highway from above Union creek to the Medford park entrance as well as the roads throughout the park are covered with an icy coating of melted and packed snow.
