Crater Lake Season Is Most Popular in History of Park; Cars Continue To Visit Scene

The 1929 travel year which closed September 30 was the most successful in the history of Oregon's only national park. Although the roads through the park were closed for nearly eight months on account of heavy snow, 38,105 cars with 125,435 people visited Crater lake during the travel year. The highway to the rim of Crater lake was opened at midnight June 22 and from June 23 until September 20, 36,327 cars with 120,949 people visited the lake.

August 11 Largest

During this period 976 people entered on stages, and 82 park visitors entered on foot.

An average of 1,220 visitors arrived at the rim of Crater lake daily for 100 days during the summer months of July, August and September.

The greatest number of visitors to the lake for any single day arrived on Sunday, August 11, when 3,591 people in 963 cars were checked in through the three entrances.

Increase 18.5

During the first months of the 1929 travel year, October, and

half of November, 1,768 cars with 6,311 people entered the park; and 117 visitors who ventured in over the snow on skis were recorded.

These figures added to summer travel make a total of 38,105 cars with 125,435 people, and show an increase of 18.5 per cent in travel over the previous year.

Of this number 34,572 cars with 115,322 people entered over the south and the west roads through Anna Springs; 2,592 cars with 7,938 people entered through the east entrance; and 1,531 cars with 5,175 people entered through the north entrance from Diamond lake.

From All States

With 5 cars and 14 people from Alaska, and 31 cars with 160 people from Hawaii, all other states in the Union were well represented during the months of greatest travel to the lake.

Oregon, with 17,477 cars and 59,943 people head the list, and California with 14,193 cars and 45,943 people came second,

while the state of Washington was represented by 1,322 cars with 6,214 people.

Of foreign countries, Canada was represented by as many cars as the average of eastern states. Cars from the Philippine Islands, China, Australia, Panama, England, Germany, Japan, Mexico, Sweden and Scotland were checked in to the park during the summer.

Total Increase 94
Visitors to the national parks since October 1 will be recorded on the 1930 travel year, and with figures on hand for the month of October and up until November 12, Crater lake shows an increase of 26 per cent over last year to date.

During the month of October, 2,765 cars with 9,241 people visited the lake, and since November 1 an average of 71 cars have been checked in to the park daily.

The excellent highways leading to the rim of Crater lake, over which the round trip from Medford or Klamath Falls can be made in about five hours, offers all lovers of the outdoors the privilege of seeing Crater lake decorated in fantastic coloring of autumn, or the rugged walls of the crater rim cloaked in soft white robes of winter.
