He is a willing boy who throws plenty of gloves and is noted for his gameness.

Coffey Old Fighter

Both O'Dowd and Siki are being handled by the former middle weight star, Walter Coffey of Oakland. Fans who can look back about 20 years around San Francisco when they had real fighters, the kind who fought more for glory than for dough, will remember Walter as being one of the hardest hitters in the game at that time and one who held his own against the best. Walter thinks he has a coming champion in this Irishman O'Dowd and if you will look over at him once in awhile during the main event you will notice him giving instructions to his boys as to how to beat their opponents. Walter says this Siki will be just the boy for the green McCumber to meet—a fair boy who will be in there doing his best.

Special Will Be Hot

The special is a hot number. Roy Rose, the pride of the Spar, and Harold Wright, the game little redskin from Chilcoquin, will settle for once and all who is the better boy. Harold is about the best liked youngster ever to appear here. He always gives the fans the best there is in him and what a game boy he is. Never has been known to quit, but he will have to be at his best to take this rugged Roy Rose. Roy has a win over Harold and thinks he can duplicate the feat. Klamath's eleven will play its "big game" Saturday at 2 p. m. at the fairgrounds against the Medford high gridgers.

With a record of four wins, one tie and three defeats for the season and with fine reserve material from the championship Wildcats, Klamath has the best chance they have ever had of beating the Medford team.

All Pelican first string men will be able to start the game, having recovered from colds and injuries which kept some of the stars out of the last two games.

Excitement is at a high pitch here. Last night 120 persons, guests of Harry Poole at the Pelican, staged a rally and pep talks were given. Members of the football team, the Pep-Peppers, the band and the faculty were guests.

After talks by Coach Al Sinclair, Charles Kendle of the football team, and Harry Poole, the students gathered on the stage and gave yells under the leadership of Yell King Dean Houston and his assistant, Jack McGehegan.

This afternoon a rally will be staged.

Medford has a strong squad but not as strong as a year ago, since nearly all their first squad graduated last spring. "The game Saturday at 2 o'clock is the last of the season. Klamath has the best chance to beat Medford that she has ever had. The team wants all the townspeople and merchants to be at the game. If the game isn't worth the 50 cents admission the money will be refunded at the gate," Paul Jackson, principal, stated last night.

Purdue, Starting Up As Underdog, Wins First Title.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22. (A. P.)—Big Ten football will close one of its most sensational seasons tomorrow with three inter-league games and two contests involving teams from outside the conference.

Purdue Surprises
Purdue, rated in September as just a good team, wrecked the dope, and won its first Big Ten title, and will close its season against its rival, Indiana, tomorrow at Bloomington.

Indiana, defeated by Colgate, Chicago and Minnesota and tied by Ohio State, hardly ranks as equal to the job of tripping the championship Purdue eleven, but after last week's upset triumph over Northwestern, may have enough punch to make one scratch on the Boiler-maker slate.

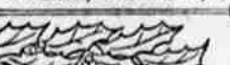

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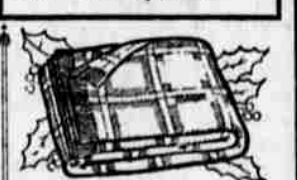
