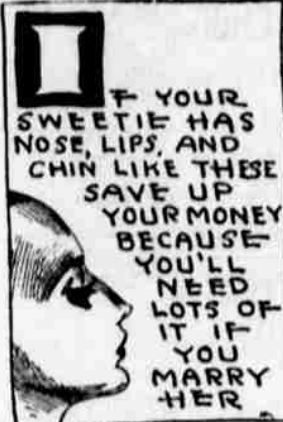


NEWS IN BRIEF
