CHILOQUIN HAS BIG-TIME CARD BILL OF FARE

Two Indian Tribes In Lineup That Looks Like Good Fight.

CHILOQUIN, Nov. 25. (Special)—A pitched battle between the Modoc and Klamath Indians in this reservation city is threatening as the hour approaches Tuesday evening when the champion of each tribe meets at the Chiloquin boxing arena to defend the honors of his tribe.

More excitement over a prize fight has not been seen or heard in many months. Bill Huff, champion boxer of all the Klamaths, will meet Jack Crim, Modoc Indian champ, in the top six round bout of a triple set of six rounds.

Huff and Crim Sign.
The partisans of these two boxers, and they number all the members of both tribes stationed on the reservation, are rabid in favor of their national. An Indian has to be either for Crim or Huff to get along with his fellow tribesmen. No fence straddlers are permitted. Every indication points to a few pitched battles between rival tribesmen on the outside of the arena Tuesday night, November 26, when these two clever boxers tangle.

The fans are guaranteed a real treat when Huff and Crim tangle for the one that is beaten will have to move on, for his people will make it plenty tough for him. They are out to win and both are in the pink of condition.

Bend Boys to Show.

Jack Breedlove, Bend boxer, and Chuck Borden, a new comer to Klamath ring from Eugene, fight in another of the six-round main events. Breedlove needs no introduction to Klamath fans, having fought here on several occasions. He is a pleasing fighter with a wallop. Borden is noted as a slugger and fights in the main event circle in Eugene. Billy Breedlove, clever little lightweight from Bend, will tangle with the fast swinging Tony O'Dell, Eugene's slugger, who made such a hit in Chiloquin in his last appearance here against Austin Rosander, when he nearly brought the house down with his whirlwind attack that had the game Rosander all but out several times. This bout will be the first of the three six-round goes.

Big Tom Popular.

Big Tom Edmundson, who has won every start in a Klamath ring in his appearance here during the past year, will meet Luke Chester, chief of the Klamath Indians from Beatty. Luke Chester, in addition to being a good boxer, is also a power among his people. He has been selected by popular vote of his tribe to appear in Washington, D. C., as a tribal representative before congress. If he doesn't get what he wants he is liable to plant his fist on the nose of some congressman who gets in his way. He is a good fighter and one of the best natural boxers among the Indians. Big Tom is in for a large afternoon when they meet. They weight 170 pounds apiece and will fight four rounds.

Knockout Promised.

Jack Davies and Timber Souers will meet in another four-round bout that promises to be a knockdown and dragout affair. Timber Souers, as his name implies, is one of the lumberjack boxers who fights with occasional demands and if the occasion doesn't present itself often enough he seeks amusement in the squared circle. He is out to beat Davies, and says he will be the first to put the sleep touch to Davies' chin in Klamath county. Davies denies that he has any notion of letting the hard hitting lumberjack connect and wants to present his side of the case in a different fashion. In fact, he believes he can put Timber out of the way without trouble. This fight is arousing much local interest. A fast four rounder will open the card.

Matchmaker Savage has assembled one of his best cards in recent months which consists almost entirely of local boys. He will get action on every bout because the home town boys hate to have another home town boxer get the best of him. The ringside section is already well sold out. Practically every Indian on the reservation will be in the hall Tuesday and it will be one colorful fight.

Spears Asked To Succeed Bagshaw

CHICAGO, Nov. 25. (AP)—Reports persisted today that Dr. Clarence Spears of the University of Minnesota was to succeed Enoch Bagshaw as head football coach at the University of Washington, effective next season. Earl Campbell, student manager of athletics at Washington, remained over in Chicago after the intersectional game between the Huskies and Chicago, thereby indicating Washington was at least angling for the services of a big ten mentor. He said he planned to stay here for two weeks. The annual meeting of the big ten football coaches will be held in Chicago December 6. Coach Jimmy Phelan of Purdue and Pat Page of Indiana were also rumored as desirable for the Washington post, but they as well as Dr. Spears, said they had not been approached. Another rumor had it that Phelan, whose team won the big ten title this season, was due to take over the Minnesota coaching "may give me something to announce," Campbell said. "Right now there is nothing to give out as to Coach Bagshaw's successor."

Coach Proud.

"I am proud of the way the team fought," Coach Al Sinclair said after the game. "The players went out on that field and scrapped hard and they deserve all the credit coming to them. I am glad they could top the season's games with this win."

Both teams played exceptionally hard interference and were well matched. Klamath's team did exceptionally well, the players working in better unison than any other game. The athletes this year deserve much credit for in addition to their practicing and games, they are holding up their scholastic standing.

Scored in Second.

Harvard Player In Serious Condition

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 25. (AP)—Victor M. Harding, Harvard end, was in a dangerous condition at the college hospital today from injuries received in the Yale game Saturday.

His life was saved by an emergency operation late Saturday night in which a ruptured spleen was removed. It was said by physicians that he would not be out of danger for several days.

Harding, a junior of Hubbard-Wood, Ill., left the game in the fourth quarter in great pain after an apparent kick in the back. Harding's scholastic record was high and he could complete the full college course in three years. Dr. Thomas Richards, team physician, said that Harding's football days are ended. "If I have anything to say about it," The boy's mother saw the game and was at his bedside before and after the operation. Harding made a spectacular catch of a 48-yard forward pass that enabled Harvard to tie Army.

Five Have Claims on Coast Title Since Card's Victory

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25. (AP)—Over the peak of a great football season, Pacific Coast conference teams relaxed today while far western fandom backtracked the trail of a schedule cluttered with many upsets, spectacular victories and unusual large crowds.

Promised outstanding treats for their Thanksgiving Day gridiron menu next Thursday, the football mob, to the last man, woman and child, however, could scarce do aught else than bark back to last Saturday's bangup finish when Stanford soundly trounced California, 21-6, to scatter all over the Cardinal stadium the conference championship hopes of the previously undefeated Bears.

Primed for their first title since 1923 and flushed with the confidence that four previous conference victories had built up, the Bears met their Waterloo in the final clash of the year. California had defeated Southern California, 15-7, a week after Southern California had beat out Stanford, 7-0. One week ago last Saturday, a fighting Santa Clara team had trounced the Stanford aggregation, 13-7.

Cards Brilliant

Cold facts and figures and sentiment combined to make the California bear a favorite in the 35th annual "big game" but the 39,000 persons who squeezed in to the big stadium saw a Stanford eleven of tremendous power, outsmart, outfight and outplay its old time rival. Stanford's showing in the "big game" was merely a throwback to the early season form that stamped it as one of the really formidable teams in the country. Midway of the season, the Cardinals "looked the goods" and had "it" in a football way.

An intricate offensive system, football flubdubbery — Coach Glenn Warner — was built around a young army of regulars and reserves.

From Riches to Rags
Nov. 23, 1929, has been jotted down as a sad and eventful day for California's Bears and the tens of thousands who lend their hurrahs to the cause of the blue and gold. From riches to rags dropped California's Bears for the outcome of the game freed the conference championship of a potential dictator and gave over its rule to the hands of five. California, Stanford, Southern California, Oregon and Washington State each have a fifth interest in the title.
