OREGON HEADS SOUTH TODAY

Meets St. Mary's On Turkey Day Clash; Go On to Florida To Play Dec. 7

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 26. (AP)—The start of a journey into the southland will be made today by the University of Oregon football varsity when it en-trains for California where it will clash with St. Mary's Thanksgiving Day followed by an intercollegiate game with Florida, Dec. 7.

The battle with St. Mary's will be the last contest for the Webfoots this season and also will be the last game in which the team will be intact. When the squad leaves California for Florida after the game with the Oaks, Austin Colbert, tackle; Eben Bohls, sub tackle, and Charles Spoor, sub half, will come back to Eugene because their scholastic standing will not allow their absence from the university for a too long period.

Rus Berghem Best Scorer In Big Ten

CHICAGO, Nov. 26. (AP)—Rus Berghem, Northwestern football, finished the season at the top of the scoring in Big Ten competition with 28 points, a three point margin over Glen Arneson, Purdue star. Art Phareson, who tied with Berghem at 25 points, for scoring in all games, finished third with 21 points.

Mayor Saw Too Much Drinking At Annual Game

BETH, Mass., Nov. 26 (AP)—Mayor Ralph S. Bauer saw so much drinking at the Harvard-Yale football game at the Harvard stadium Saturday that he has ordered the Thanksgiving day high school contest here to be done dry or be stopped.

Twelve thousand persons at the stadium, he estimated today, were more interested in quart bottles and hip flasks than anything else. Many women "took a pull out of the bottles the same as the men," he said, and neither police nor the faculty interfered.

The Rev. Garfield Morgan, pastor of the Center Congregational church, according to the mayor, was approached by some one in a big fur coat who said to him, "You look like an old timer, have a drink."

"Can this," he asked, "be the same Harvard of which the late President Elliot used to boast, 'the factor that made it the dominant educational institution of our land was that she had been building men for nearly 300 years'?"

On the mayor's order, the police chief will station fifty patrolmen and sergeants on duty Thursday at the Lynn English-Classical High game with orders to arrest all persons who drink and to stop the game if drinking demonstrations become serious.

Washington Squad Prepares for Bend

PORTLAND, Nov. 26. (AP)—Eldon Jeanne, coach of the Washington high school football team here, was hurrying his squad through elaborate final training this week in preparation for the "intercollegiate" game here on Thanksgiving day with the Bend high school team. The game will be played on the Multnomah stadium field.

The Bend Lava Bears are said to have the highest scoring average in the state. In nine games they have scored 329 points against 24 points made by opposing teams.

Buckaroos Boost Selves Into Lead

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 26. (AP)—Displaying speed aplenty and a superb defensive against the Vancouver Lions, the Portland Buckaroos boosted themselves into the leadership of the Pacific coast hockey league here last night by a 1-0 win over the champions. It was another overtime struggle between these teams but this time the Bucks snatched the victory before the added period was a minute old.

Armstrong ended the game in 49 seconds of extra play when he flipped in a rebound into the Lions' net. The Bucks' stonewall defense held the Lions at bay throughout. The Lions matched speed with the Oregonians, but they could not penetrate their defense.

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Alabama Fullback Establishes Record

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Nov. 26. (AP)—Tony Holm, Alabama fullback, has gained nearly a mile against Alabama's foes this year. Latest records credit him with 1,293 yards this season. Only McEver of Tennessee has outgained the Crimson Tide's fullback in any one game this year. McEver gained seven more yards than Holm but was in the Tennessee-Alabama game four minutes longer and carried the ball oftener.

COSTLY RUGS.

Ballard has traveled three times around the world collecting this group of rugs, visiting 42 countries. One of the rugs was obtained after traveling 41,000 miles. The group is valued at more than \$250,000.
