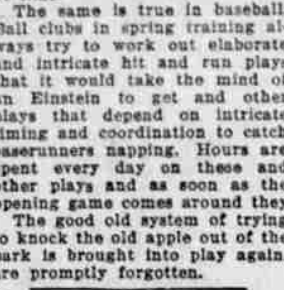
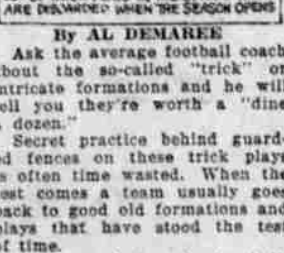

Eddie Mack Has No Crown But He Defeats Champion

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 27. (AP)—Petro Quiciana—they call him Eddie Mack for short—today stands out as a fighter who twice defeated a champion, with no crown to show for his efforts.

In a ten-round non-title battle before 10,000 fans last night, the former St. Regis college youth repeated a previous non-title victory over Tod Morgan, junior lightweight king, in a rousing rally which saw him win the battle in the closing period.

It was the third meeting of the pair at catch weights, with the scrapper from Denver holding two triumphs by the decision route. The second engagement terminated in a draw.

Morgan Fast at First
Morgan looked very much like a champion in the opening stanza, as he rushed Mack before him with a series of crushing blows to the head, followed by left hooks to the body. Sensing an opportunity to square accounts with his opponent, the Los Angeles scrapper followed his advantage by tearing into Mack with a two-fisted attack to the body.

Trailing when the fourth came

up, Mack rallied to hold the champion even, and then rushed out to win the fifth by a wide margin, bringing blood to Morgan's nose and mouth with a series of bruising lefts and rights to the face and chin.

Mack hammered the title holder into complete submission in the dying moments of the tenth.

Mack Gets Decision
The rally earned him the decision, for up to the tenth, the scoring stood at three rounds each, with the other three called draws. The battle was waged with Mack entering the ring three pounds over the 130-pound limit. Morgan weighed 131.

Whatever hopes Morgan entertained of meeting Sammy Mandell in a lightweight championship bout faded into oblivion. Mack made it quite apparent that the junior lightweight is doomed to be shorn of his honors should he ever risk the crown in a championship fight, and is no fit subject to bid for the 135-pound crown.

In a fast semi-windup, Sid Torres, local Filipino 115-pounder, was given the nod in a close fight with Frankie Murray of Philadelphia.

Shires Makes Debut As Pro Scrapper

CHICAGO, Nov. 27. (AP)—Charles Arthur (the Great) Shires will make his debut as a professional fighter December 9 under the promotion of Jim Mullen. "I'll knock a lot of those bums stiff," said Mr. Shires, who is first baseman, off and on, for the Chicago White Sox. "I'll make myself \$20,000 in the off season. Then next spring I'll go out and knock a lot of pitchers loose from the box." Promoter Mullen said Shires is "a big, powerful fellow, who should make a good fighter." Shires' opponent was not announced.

Army Has No Fear Of Notre Dame In Saturday's Affray

WEST POINT, N. Y., Nov. 27. (AP)—Except for two positions, head coach Bluff Jones of the Army knows what lineup he will start against Notre Dame at the Yankee stadium, New York, on Saturday, and the chances are that he knows the answers to those two problems as well. If he does, though, he isn't telling anyone.

Center and quarterback are the two positions open to question. Miller and Lazar are waging an even battle for the snap-back job and Carver, Bowman and Gibner all are in the field for quarterback. The rest of the starting lineup probably will include Eagle, Murrell and Galt in the backfield, and Perry, Price, Hillsinger, Humber, Messenger and Carlmark on the line.

Reports that Jones will at his second team, as he did against Dickinson, Ohioan Wesleyan and several other foes, appear to be founded on anything but fact. Jones is expected to start his strongest combination.

The squad will not go to New York until Friday, taking a light workout at Travers Island. The boys will wait until Saturday to travel to the Yankee stadium. "We know the stadium very well," says Jones.

Portland Boxer Wins Nod Over Man From South

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27. (AP)—Joe Marcus, Portland, won over Kid Ponce, Los Angeles Mexican, in their ten-round main event on Ralph Gruman's boxing card last night. Marcus proved too shifty for the southerner, who looked to be a clever, hard hitting boxer, unable to locate Marcus to demonstrate his wares. Marcus landed often on the Mexican, but he too, found it hard to plant solid blows.

In the semi-windup, Eddie Volk, ex-Multnomah club star, making his first professional start, won over Russ Green, Salem, who fought a game fight and carried the battle to his opponent throughout. Green went to his knees twice from body punches in the third round which decided the count against him.

Two knockouts featured the preliminaries. A long fued ended when Mickey Dolan put Jack Nash away in the first round of their four-rounder with a right cross to the chin. Jess Holloway knocked out Young Jess Willard in the third round with a right on the button.

Benny Gallup, Duluth, took the curtain raiser over Johnny Snell, Portland, four rounds.
