BIG TEN NAME MYTHICAL TEAM

Coaches Shift Nagurski to Tackle in Order to Give Bergham Fullback Position

CHICAGO, Nov. 29, (AP)—Russell Bergham, Northwestern's workhorse backfield star, is placed at fullback on the 1929 Western conference all-star football team, picked for the Associated Press by nine Big Ten coaches; and to place him there, the coaches elected to switch Bronko Nagurski, one of the Minnesota's greatest stars, from fullback to tackle.

The first team, as selected, follows:
Wesley Fessler, Ohio State, left end; Bronko Nagurski, Minnesota, left tackle; Fred Roberts, Iowa, left guard; Milton Erickson, Northwestern, center; Henry Anderson, Northwestern, right guard; Elmer Sleight, Purdue, right tackle; Robert Tanner, Minnesota, right end; Glenn Harmon, Purdue, quarterback; Willis Glasgow, Iowa, left halfback; Ralph Welch, Purdue, right halfback; Russell Bergham, Northwestern, fullback.

Amos Stagg, 67-year-old coach of the University of Chicago eleven, adhered to his policy of not naming players for "all-teams," saying that he felt qualified only to select a team from the squad with which he worked during the season.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29, (AP)—A light practice is on the program for the University of Southern California football aggregation as the final gesture toward the grid clash tomorrow on the Coliseum sod with an invading Cougar team from Washington State.

Coach Olin "Babe" Hollingbery will bring his squad into town today, primed for the battle which will mark the closing of the 1929 Pacific Coast conference season. A short workout on the Coliseum field is in prospect.

Defeat for either team will remove it from the now five-cornered tie for the conference lead. Stanford, California and Oregon share the position.

GAELS GALLOP OVER OREGON WEBFEET 31-6

Oregon Back First To Cross St. Mary Goal Line.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29, (AP)—St. Mary's Galloping Gaels from Moraga wound up their 1929 football season yesterday by defeating the University of Oregon Webfoots, 31 to 6, in a game that cost the victors the enviable record of being the only major eleven in the country to complete the year without having its goal line crossed.

Browne Goes Over
Browne, Oregon half, caught a 15-yard pass from Robinson, half back, in the final period and scampered over the goal line to deny St. Mary's the supreme achievement, but the Gaels supporters consoled themselves with the knowledge that Coach Slip Madrigan's charges remained in the list of the undefeated college teams in the nation.

The Gaels swung into their stride early in the game, scoring three touchdowns in the first and another in the second periods.

Line Rushes Powerful
Smashing through the Oregon line in powerful rushes, the Gaels backfield pounded across a goal line that had yielded only to Stanford and Idaho this season.

A blocked kick, with Edding, St. Mary's end, falling on the ball behind the Webfoot line, resulted in the first touchdown. Stennett passed to Edding, who ran ten yards for the second score. Shortly before the end of the first period, Stennett shot a 27-yard pass to Simas which put the Gaels on Oregon's 16-yard line. A few plays later Stennett went over for the third touchdown.

Play Second String
St. Mary's second team took the field as the second quarter opened, and Scheffla went over from the 6-yard line for the fourth touchdown after a long pass put the ball into Oregon territory.

Oregon strengthened in the third period and had St. Mary's on the defensive. Within scoring distance several times, the Webfoots lacked the necessary punch to put the ball over the line.

Gaels Penalized
The fourth period was five minutes gone when a 20-yard pass put Oregon on St. Mary's 40-yard line. Robinson, Webfoot negro, threw another pass and the officials ruled that Boyle, St. Mary's half, had interfered with the receiver. The ball was placed on the St. Mary's 20-yard line, and while thousands held their breath in suspense, Robinson tossed a pass to Browne, who ran five yards to place the ball behind the St. Mary's goal line for the first time this season.

Fighting mad, St. Mary's rallied to score their fifth touchdown, and from that time until the final gun, the two teams struggled on even terms.

Approximately 300 players were sifted, weighed and tested before the 22 stars were named.

Cougars, Oregon, Lead
Washington State College and the University of Oregon, leaders of the north division race, each gained four players on the all-star eleven, while Idaho captured two and Washington one.

Although not awarded a place on the first team, Oregon State carried off both the end positions and the fullback berth on the second lineup.

Get Unanimous Choice
Four players, John Kitzmiller, the "Flying Dutchman," and Marshall Shields of Oregon, Merle Hufford, flashy Washington halfback and Elmer Schwartz, powerful Washington State fullback, were unanimously chosen for first team places. Kitzmiller received

several votes for the quarterback berth, but the majority of the experts picked Archie Buckley of Washington State for the signal calling job, and placed the Oregon triple threat ace at right half.

Bend Outplayed By Washington Hi And Loses 20 to 14

PORTLAND, Nov. 29, (AP)—Powerful, machine-like line plunging, intermingled with sparkling aerial attacks forced the Bend high school football team to relinquish any claim to the Oregon state interscholastic championship here yesterday to Washington high school by a smashing victory of 20 to 14.

Although the score bespeaks a ragged brand of football playing, it was by no means less than a variety of brilliant playing. Before 15,500 fans, the Bend team finally found itself and staged a sensational counter-attack that nearly averted defeat.
