

SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS GROWTH

Population Gained Over 16 Percent During Past Year.

Definite proof that the population of Klamath Falls has increased over 16 per cent in the past year is given in results of the 1929 school census just completed in District No. 1, which includes all of the city of Klamath Falls as well as a number of the surrounding suburbs.

The census, which is taken by a house to house visit, shows that 4,062 children between the ages of 4 and 20 years are residing in District No. 1. This number is divided into 2,042 boys and 2,020 girls.

Enrollment Given
Figures for last year total 3,379 residents of school age, 1,601 of which were boys and 1,778 girls.

According to a count taken October 15, there were 2,003 pupils enrolled in school of the city with 554 at Fremont, 283 at Fairview, 595 at Mills, 139 at Pelican, 215 at Riverside, 324 at Roosevelt.

The classes being held in the old Klamath high school are included in the Fremont school count.

Later figures, which will be available at the office of J. Percy Wells next week at the close of the six weeks period are expected to show an increase in school attendance.

BRUINS CLIMB OUT OF CELLAR

Outplay Grizzly Horde in Final Game of the Season to Win by Two Touchdowns

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29, (AP)—Chomaxing the football season with a 14 to 6 Thanksgiving Day victory over the Grizzlies, the Bruins of the University of California at Los Angeles today are celebrating their eleventh-hour deliverance from the cellar position in the Pacific Coast conference. The defeat left Montana tied with Washington for the bottom line in the 1929 standings.

A series of brilliant forward passes in the third and fourth periods spelled disaster for the invading grizzlies. Early in the third frame Edward Solomon tossed a long one to Leonard Weindorf, who raced 29 yards for the first marker. A few minutes later Captain Carl Brokn got on the receiving end of one of Solomon's passes, and crossed the line for a second touchdown. Norman Duncan converted both times.

Eugene Grappler Wins From Texan

EUGENE, Nov. 29, (AP)—Wildcat Pete, Eugene, defeated Texas Teddy Waters two out of three falls here yesterday to win his bout and retain his title of junior middleweight wrestling champion of the world.
