Still stinging under the untimely hayo handed him by Gene O'Grady, the coming light heavy champion hope of Ashland, Kid Dennis desires to knock Tom Corbett clear over the ropes so that he can claim another chance at O'Grady. The Kid says Gene was lucky and that he'll make a monkey of him the next time they meet. With this grudge in his system he's going to give Corbett a good lacing and do it so quick that he will not be tired out for his bout with O'Grady.

Corbett thinks Tom Corbett is no piker himself, and while Dennis is thinking so much about his return match with O'Grady he intends to bring him back to earth and make him realize that he's got his hands full in the present scrap. Corbett, with a win over K. O. White, is not to be taken lightly by any fighter and it is a certainty that Dennis will hear the birds again if he gives Tom a single opening.

This is the kind of a fight the cash customers like to see and they will get their money's worth Monday evening.

GRIFFITH NODS BASQUE HEAVY

CHICAGO, Nov. 30. (AP)—The standing of Gerald Ambrose Griffith of Sioux City, Ia., among the heavyweights ranked as possibilities for the title vacated on the retirement of Gene Tunney, today was a notch higher by the margin of a close decision victory over Paulino Uscudun, the stubborn, rugged basque.

The youthful Iowan, giving away 14 1/4 pounds to a more experienced opponent, won the decision of the referee and one judge at the Chicago stadium last night after 10 bitterly waged rounds of fighting. The remaining judge called the fight a draw. Griffith's edge over the Spaniard was not so great, but he demonstrated he can take as much as the basque.

The crowd of more than 11,000 persons received the verdict with mixed feeling, a liberal number of boos sounded among the cheers for the American who was the crowd favorite throughout.

Paulino was amazed and angry at the decision, saying he believed he had won easily. He criticized Referee Dave Miller, claiming the official had refused to let him stay in close.

The knockout career of Salvatore Ruggirello, Italian giant, was halted by Helen Mueller, recent German invader, who outboxed his huge opponent to gain a 10 round decision, in the semi-final bout.

Will Rule Makers Make New Boners?

The baseball rule makers got their heads together and for some reason known only to themselves adopted the rule that a ball is "dead" when a backward pass or fumble strikes the ground and is recovered by an opponent.

The rule was probably adopted to prevent a superior team from suffering a severe penalty, sometimes a defeat, because of a minor misplay. It is an absurd rule. Its application eliminates the best feature of any game—the element of chance. It is just as silly a rule as if a rule were adopted by baseball officials to do away with errors on fly or ground balls.

Officials and players are as bewildered as the spectators about this fumble rule and some of the other trick rules. It is a travesty on a great game otherwise to see players and officials in a huddle after practically every play. Of course, it is necessary to go through the present season under the present rules, but I hope for better things in 1930.

New Truck Establishes Record



PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 30.—Establishing a new record for commercial automotive transportation, Daniel T. Snow has just arrived here from Los Angeles in 12 hours, 3 minutes in a one-ton Fargo truck equipped with a De Soto motor and carrying a two-ton load. The former record, so far as is known, was 13 hours, 36 minutes.

Mr. Snow was checked out at the Western Union office at 2823 Whittier boulevard, Los Angeles, at 11:01 p. m., Pacific time, and

was checked in at the Western Union office here the following day at 12:03 p. m. Mountain time, according to his report. He made the trip via Yuma and El Centro, a distance of approximately 300 miles.

"This motor had only been driven a few miles before leaving on the trip and naturally was new and stiff," Mr. Snow said on his arrival here. "The efficient lubrication provided by Texaco oil prevented a development of more than the normal degree of

heat, however, and the motor operated freely and smoothly despite the speed made. Less than one pint of oil was used. It was not necessary to add either oil or water, and upon arriving here the water in the radiator still was at proper circulation level.

"That the Texaco gasoline used also proved its worth is indicated in the fact that we made exceptionally good gasoline mileage and always had a surplus of power despite the strain to which the motor was subjected."

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 30. (AP)—A field of 64 contestants faced the last 36 holes of play in the \$5,000 Berkeley open golf championship today, before the winner of the first major northern California competition will be ascertained.

Billy Burke, of Westport, Conn., started the day holding a precarious one stroke lead over the remainder of the field. He turned in a brilliant 69, one under par yesterday, which, coupled with his 71 for the first round, gave him a total of 140.

One stroke behind Burke came Johnny Perelli, professional from the Feather River Inn, Calif., and Abe Espinosa, Chicago, each tied for second place with cards of 141.

The winner of the tournament will be decided on the basis of medal play.

Coaches Silent About Merits of Scoring System

NEW YORK, Nov. 30. (AP)—Football officials and coaches assembled in New York for the Notre Dame-Army game were reluctant to comment to any great extent today upon the merits of the new Pop Warner scoring system, tried out here yesterday in a game between Brooklyn City college and Long Island University.

Eliminating the point after touchdown and counting each first down as one point, Long Island defeated Brooklyn City by 23 to 11 to win the championship of the New York metropolitan conference, but the result would have been no different under the old rules. Long Island scored two touchdowns to one for Brooklyn City.

Another feature of the Warner system is that, at the start of the second half, the ball is played from the spot where it rested at the close of the first. With Long Island leading by 18 to 11, Brooklyn City got a big break through this innovation as the first half closed with the ball in Brooklyn's possession on Long Island's three-yard line. The Brooklyn eleven failed, however, to cash in on the break.

Most of the coaches who saw the game voiced their approval of this particular feature—the playing of one game of sixty minutes rather than what in effect is two games of thirty minutes apiece.
