INDIANA HAS UNIQUE PLACE IN FOOTBALL

State Has Two Teams With Records of No Defeats.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2. (AP)—The football frenzy is over for 1929 except for a few remaining flourishes in the south and far west, but the picture of a campaign of sparkling individual achievements is still vivid and the argument over championship claims yet is far from settled.

The season that was brought to an arctic climax Saturday by Notre Dame's ninth straight triumph, at the expense of the gallant Army team, was in many respects the most remarkable in the history of the great American college sport.

Unprecedented Season
The tumult and the roar from early October to the last day of November was punctuated by the famous Carnegie report on commercialism, by astounding individual performances and long-run thrills despite the new fumble rule, by record-smashing crowds, by an unprecedented epidemic of so-called "breaks" in the big games and by the development of an unusual number of high class teams.

Yale Stage Comeback
For sheer drama, Yale and Notre Dame topped the list under circumstances of the most extraordinary variety. Trampled by Georgia early in October, the Huskies came back to whip Brown, Army and Dartmouth in successive Saturdays with Albie Booth setting capsers across the historic turf of the Yale bowl such as no one at New Haven has been in a blue moon. On successive Saturdays, Booth outplayed two of the game's greatest stars, Red Cagle of the Army and Al Marsters of Dartmouth, to become the most talked and written about ballcarrier since Red Grange, even though the "Mighty Atom" went into something of an eclipse against Princeton and Harvard.

Slick Coach Inspires Team
Knute Rockne, on a sickbed most of the season as the result of an infected leg furnished the inspiration for one of Notre Dame's greatest teams, the first unbeaten Irish army since the famous Four Horsemen dismantled in 1924. In next to their last game, the star center, Tim Moynihan, broke his leg, but the team kept on winning, even though it took a "break" and a one hundred yard dash by the fastest man on the team, Jack Elder, to beat the Army. Notre Dame was among the five major teams that finished their seasons unbeaten and untied.

Purdue Heads Big Ten
Purdue's mighty boiler-makers made it two votes for the state of Indiana. Pittsburgh in the east, Tulane in the south and Utah in the Rocky Mountain zone completed the big five, of this group, based upon the calibre of opposition and performance over the whole course of the campaign, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh and Purdue established the strongest claims to National championship honors. No one of this trio could possibly be picked out for the main award, however, without the loudest kind of a roar from the others.

St. Mary's was tied early in the season by California but came along afterward to hang up the most consistent record of any team on the Pacific coast, while the "Big Three," Stanford, Southern California and California, cut each other down.

Colgate Among Best
Judged by the strength of their finish, Andy Keer's powerful Colgate machine ranked with the best in the country, despite an early October setback at the hands of Wisconsin. The Maroon juggernaut smashed Columbia, Syracuse and Brown, three strong teams, on successive Saturdays by the aggregate margin of 85 to 0 with an exhibition of power unsurpassed by Pittsburgh—or any other highscoring outfit.

O. S. C. Injures Detroit
Georgia Tech, after two years at the top in the southern conference, tumbled with a resounding thud, losing five games altogether and facing the loss of a sixth in meeting Georgia this Saturday. Detroit, after a two-year winning streak, was tied by Marquette and later beaten by Oregon State in one of the outstanding upsets of the season. The two-year reign of Illinois in the Big Ten group was ended by the rise of Purdue. Texas, southwest champion, was dethroned.

EXPENSE MORE, VALUE SMALLER

been made for this year for "property classification" and takes the place of the "timber cruise" item of \$10,000 appropriated last year to complete the now notorious Edgar-Cullison cruise which was partially thrown out when the timber assessments were slashed \$2,176,740 this fall. The statement also shows that the county paid in the past four years \$95,311.23 for the cruising of timber.

The property classification item is to care for the expense of hiring a man who will work under the direction of the state tax commission and the county in assessing all property in the county. It is supposed, since the county would have to bear the expense and since it has been stated that the state is willing to start work early in 1930. Evidently no timber cruising will be done as the item is for only an average worker and not a high priced timber cruiser.

Assessor Cuts Expense
Incidental legal services and collection of delinquent taxes is given \$3,500 this year against \$2,000 in 1929. This is in addition to the salary of the district attorney and his deputies.

In addition to the \$2,500 for the property classification in the county the assessor is given \$600 more for salaries of employees, bringing that total up to \$8,760. However, travel expenses and equipment funds for the tax assessor's office has been reduced from \$2,000 to \$500, giving his office \$900 less to operate on than in 1929.

Sheriff Gets More
The sheriff's office has been given an increase of \$2,500 for salaries, \$500 for mileage and travel, \$4,000 for board of prisoners and \$400 for a camera and the services of a fingerprint expert. The items this year are: Salaries, \$21,500; mileage and travel, \$4,500; board prisoners, \$10,000; and the camera and expert, \$400. The statement shows that \$1,600 was appropriated to buy a car for the office in 1929 and that \$1,800 was spent to buy the car.

C. R. DeLap, county clerk, will cut expenses in his office in the salaries to deputies and clerks from \$14,000 to \$12,840, a reduction of \$1,160. Amount budgeted for registration and elections has been raised from \$2,000 in 1929 to \$7,000 for 1930. This item in 1928 was \$10,449.81 and in 1927 was \$7,244.95.

Damages Higher
Salary and traveling expenses of deputy district attorneys has been reduced from \$5,000 to \$7,000, but \$1,000 has been added to traveling expenses in a separate item, giving the office the same amount as in 1929.

An increase of \$1,500 has been given the county surveyor for "viewers and damages (roads)" over 1929, where \$500 was allowed on this item. This item is \$3,000 for 1930. Other appropriations for the surveyor's office are the same as in 1929.

The state water master's salary and deputies in 1930 may use \$750, where only \$500 was used in 1929.

Increase Emergency
The emergency fund has been increased from \$7,500 to \$10,000.

Justices' fees, witnesses and jurors will be provided with

\$7,000 this year, where \$1,250 was allowed in 1929.

Averaging appropriations have been reduced \$1,800. One thousand has been clipped from the usual amount for publishing the budget and proceedings of the county court, bringing that item to \$1,000; \$1,200 will be used to advertise the "resources of Klamath county," and the amount for boys' and girls' club work has been reduced from \$1,800 to \$1,000.

Poor to Get More
The county health unit will be provided with \$8,500 on which to operate, against \$7,800 in 1929.

Widows' pensions have been reduced from \$4,000 to \$3,500. The county poor will receive considerable more this year than a year ago. Salaries of superintendents and nurses at the poor farm and amounts to indigent soldiers have been raised from \$11,000 last year to \$16,000 for 1930. Aid to poor, not at the county farm, has been increased from \$10,000 to \$11,500.

Two thousand dollars has been added to the weed control appropriation, bringing that amount for 1930 to \$3,000.

More for Roads
County roads will get \$69,000 for general expenses and maintenance in 1930, where in 1929 \$51,000 was appropriated and \$18,000 will be used to buy road equipment in 1930 where but \$8,000 was appropriated for this item in 1929. Only \$29,800 of that amount will have to be raised by taxes where \$59,000 was raised by taxes in 1929 because of deductions.

The deductions are \$14,200 estimated balance in fund on December 31, 1929; \$18,000 estimated forest rental and county's share in sale of timber to be received before December 31, 1929; and \$25,000 to be received from rentals and sale of timber or timberlands in 1930—a total of \$57,200 in deductions.

Special Tax Grows
Total of the amount in the budget for the current expense fund in 1930 is \$516,741.30, \$42,400, it is estimated, will be in this fund at the end of business in 1929, leaving \$474,341.30 to be raised by taxation. In 1929 this amount was \$515,031.30. The amount is \$59,300 less than the amount raised for the current expense fund in 1929.

Under the special funds the state tax is estimated at \$240,000 in 1930 against \$225,000 in 1929—an increase of \$15,000.

Total of the special bond and interest funds for 1930 is \$293,928 which is an increase of \$69,928 over the 1929 figure of \$224,000.

Total bonded indebtedness is given as \$1,879,404.

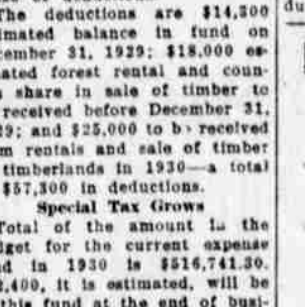

or \$7,193.50, a total deduction of \$42,400, leaving to be raised by taxation for the current expense fund, \$474,341.30. In 1929 this amount was \$515,031.30.

In the special funds for 1930, \$6,300 is levied for the county fair special fund; road bond sinking, \$125,000 less interest of \$6,000 or \$119,000 for 1930, against \$57,500 for this item in 1929. Road bond interest, \$102,500, less motor vehicle license fees, \$91,500 or \$11,000 against \$25,000 in the budget for this item a year ago. General warrant redemption bond sinking fund, \$7,928, (balance estimated in fund December 31, 1929, \$4,259.02; general warrant redemption bonds and interest, \$6,700 against \$6,800 a year ago; state tax, \$240,000 or \$16,000 more than \$225,000 in the 1929 budget, showing a total amount of \$393,928 to be raised for the special fund in 1930 against \$324,000 raised in 1929 for that fund. An increase over a year ago of \$69,928.

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
