RIEGELS STAR OF ALL-COAST MYTH ELEVEN

Experts Say Berkeley Captain Holds Best Record.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3 (AP)—Out of the huddle, eleven young stalwarts stepped to the line of scrimmage today as the outstanding football players in the Pacific coast in 1929, a consensus compiled by The Associated Press revealed yesterday. More than 20 officials, coaches and sports writers of the west aided in the selections.

Riegels Heads List
Out of a speedy, fighting aggregation of linemen and a fleet backfield, men winning berths on the mythical all-coast team, Roy Riegels, California captain and senior, loomed above them all. After committing one of football's biggest "boners" last New Year's day in Pasadena, Riegels came back this season as reflected in the votes of the experts. Twenty-three out of 25 placed him at center.

Two of Riegels' teammates, Bennie Lom, halfback, and Schwarz, guard, were also given positions on the all-coast eleven. Stanford was represented on the team by one man, Don Muller, captain and end.

North Gets Three
Out of the north galloped Merle Hufford of Washington as halfback, Austin Colbert of Oregon, tackle, and Elmer Schwartz of Washington State college in the fullback position.

George Ackerman, St. Mary's tackle, paced on the first string eleven while the University of Southern California is represented by Marshall Duffield, quarterback; Francis Tappan, end, and Nate Barrager, guard. Thus, three members of the mythical gridiron squad came from the northwest, three from the south and five from the San Francisco bay area, while California placed three on the team.

PITT AND YALE GET MOST OF EASTERN TEAM

Cagle Only Man From Army Squad to Get Recognition.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (AP)—Pittsburgh and Yale, with three representatives apiece, win the lion's share of the honors on the all-eastern football eleven for 1929 named by a consensus of sports writers polled by the Associated Press.

In the first team lineup is only one survivor of last year's all-star array—Keefer Cagle of the Army. The West Point red head who played sterling football all season on a losing team held his halfback post against as brilliant a bevy of backs as ever trod the eastern gridirons.

Booth Only Soph
Little Albin Booth of Yale, the only sophomore selected, is named quarterback and Toby Unasa, with more votes than any other back, becomes Cagle's running mate. Completing the backfield, All Marsters, Dartmouth's incapacitated ace, is placed at fullback, a position for which he is made to order although his regular post was at half.

All four men are great open field runners; all but Booth are valuable, "take out men." Cagle and Marsters are rated the two best forward passers in the east and Marsters and Booth are among the leading kickers.

Donches Named End
Joe Donches of Pittsburgh is a top-heavy choice for one end position and the other goes to Jim Douglas of Harvard despite hot competition from such valuable wingmen as Nemecsek of New York university and Booma of Dartmouth, placed on the second team.

Sam Wakeman, Cornell leader, and Fay Vincent, Yale captain-elect, win the first team tackle assignments. Captain "Fido" Greene of Yale and Ray Montgomery, Pittsburgh, get the call at guard, and Ben Ticknor, Harvard captain-elect, beat out Tom Slano of Fordham for first string center selection.

Colgate's well balanced strength and team play is reflected in the fact that while Coach Andy Kerr's formidable eleven had no outstanding star to win first team recognition Gillson, guard; and Hart, halfback, were placed on the second team and several other players were among the best in the section, receiving honorable mention.

Huntley Selected As End on Third Eleven by Warner

Students of Klamath Union High, and football fans of Klamath Falls may, in a few years' time, be saying, "I knew him when," of Roy Huntley, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Huntley, of this city.

"Pop" Warner, famous football coach of Stanford University, has finished his task of picking an all-star team from coast eleven, and has named line-up for three teams. Roy Huntley, a freshman at St. Ignace College has been chosen as right end for the third team.

"Pop" Warner said, "In making my selections, I have, as usual consulted coaches, officials, and newspaper men, and have seen most of the players in action against my own team and others. I have attempted to base my choices on the lay of the whole season, rather than just one or two games in which some player stands out brilliantly."

Huntley was a player on the Klamath Union high school first string last year, and due to the honor conferred upon him during his first year at college, it is predicted by local football fans that he will make a name for himself on the gridiron in the coming three years.

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'Willow Ranch' Regains Importance as Stopping Point With Rail Growth

WILLOW RANCH, Modoc Co., 175,000 board feet of lumber here daily.

Dec. 2.—From a mere whistling station on the line of the Nevada, California & Oregon railway halfway between Alturas and Lakeview, this place has grown into a town of some importance in Modoc county, again regaining its status of horse stage coach days when it was an important stopping point.

With the standard gauging of the Nevada, California & Oregon railway in 1928, Willow Ranch, which is located in the center of Goose Lake valley, regained its former importance as a stock shipping point. Last spring the Crane Creek Lumber company, whose mill is located in the woods five miles east of here, established its lumber yard at this place and at the present time is sending about

most 10 million feet of lumber—almost four miles of lumber piles if placed in one straight line. There is also the possibility that the Crane Creek Lumber company mill may in the future be moved here from its present location.

During the month of December the Alturas Box and Lumber company, under the management of C. G. Watkins and now

located at Alturas, will move its entire plant here. This factory employs a total of 50 hands and works two shifts daily. Watkins will handle the entire box lumber output of the Crane Creek Lumber company and will also secure considerable material from the smaller sawmills located east of this place.
