Feldman-Cline Match Unusual Tieup of Fistic Talent.

I'm wondering if the fans really know what a great boy this Feldman is. Joe Bickerstaff, local matchmaker, said this morning, "Horn on the East Side in New York, where all the great Jewish boxers hall from. Willie started boxing professionally 3 1/2 years ago. As an amateur he was a spectator at a show in Madison Square Garden one evening and a semi-windup boy failed to show up and Willie, substituting for him, won a great battle. From then on he has fought main events only."

Then a great ballyhoo about how good Willie Yarbou was—a colored scrapper with a great right hand. Willie didn't lay a glove on Feldman in the whole ten rounds. Willie came to the coast this summer, being brought out here by Leo Lomski, and has had seven bouts, winning from Red Uhlman, Homer Sheridan, Tiger Bob Robinson, Tuffy Jimmy O'Dowd, and losing a close decision to Maxie Rosenbloom and a questionable one to Joe Anderson. He is a great class fighter, always refusing the fight. The fans here who have seen Feldman in action claim he is one of the best boys of his weight in the country. Willie's great ambition is to meet Ace Hudkins. He thinks Ace is a setup for him. After a few more shots around here he is going to Los Angeles and try to force Ace into the match."

Johnny Cline needs no introduction here. A veteran of 400 battles, he seems never to grow old, as Jack Britton. He has been going great of late, winning his last seven battles. He is always welcome back here for he tries to please the gang that is always rooting for him. Johnny will arrive today.

The Dairy "Cucumber," Tiny K. O. McCumber, faces a tough and experienced ring man in Young Jess Willard, who tips the beam at 199 pounds and towers 6 feet 2 1/2 inches. This bout should be worth the price of admission alone. The floor boards have been strengthened for this fight as these two mammoths, if either should fall out of the ring, would never be able to get back again. This will be the acid test for the "pride of Yonna valley" and all the farmers of that section will be on hand to root for the boy who has won all eight fights by the kayo route.

The Oregon Webfoots engaged in a light workout in Jacksonville yesterday before heading southward. The Alligators pulled out of their Gainesville training camp last night and joined the Oregon squad at Palatka, to complete the trip on a special train.

Dale Van Sickle, veteran Florida end injured in the South Carolina game several weeks ago, will not play tomorrow.

"Monk" Dorsett, the sophomore who flashed brilliantly against Washington and Lee Thanksgiving day, will take Goodbread's half back post on the first eleven, with Sauls as his running mate. Captain Cawthon and Crabtree will round out the backfield quartet.

The Georgia Tech Yellow Jac-

kets topped off their training program with a hard session yesterday in Atlanta in preparation for their annual tilt with Georgia at Athens.

Trainers announced that "Stumpy" Thomason, Tech's great halfback who was hurt in scrimmage earlier in the week, would be in shape for the final game.

At Athens, the Bulldog coaches worked overtime perfecting a defense to halt the aerial attack that Tech is expected to offer. In the last scrimmage the Freshman squad, running Tech formations, scored twice on passes and threw a real scare into the varsity ranks.

Rejects \$1,000,000 Offer for Horse

CHICAGO, Dec. 5. (AP)—John D. Hertz, Chicago sportsman, has refused an offer of \$1,000,000, the largest bid on record, for his champion thoroughbred, Reigh Count—and can't understand why anyone should offer that much money for a horse, nor why he rejected the bid.

The offer was made by W. T. Waggoner, Texas millionaire, owner of horses wearing the three D silks, and immediately was refused.

"I think a fellow who would pay a million dollars for a horse should be examined—and a fellow who would turn down that price, certainly must be unbalanced," he said.

MAJOR LEAGUE HEADS AVERSE TO AIR REPORT

Say Broadcasting Not Profitable To Ball Clubs.

CHICAGO, Dec. 5. (AP)—The important question of allowing radio broadcasting of baseball games in the American League will come up for consideration when the club owners meet in the hotel Commodore, New York, next Tuesday.

E. S. Barnard, president of the league, indicated today that the owners might decide to follow the decision of Phil Ball, owner of the St. Louis Browns, in denying the privilege of broadcasting from the St. Louis park for the 1930 season.

Radio Reaps Reward
President Barnard said broadcasting of baseball "has become a business—an advertising business," with the broadcasters reaping the financial reward and with no financial returns going to the baseball clubs which provide the entertainment.

"When the broadcasting of baseball games first came up for discussion," President Barnard said today, "baseball men were opposed to it for the reason they believed it would hurt the circulation of newspapers. Later on, some of the club owners figured it would hurt the attendance at their games."

Needs No Discussion
"Now we need discuss neither phase of this question. Radio broadcasting has become a business—an advertising business. Major league baseball has afforded the broadcasting company the opportunity to secure a large audience for such advertising for which they are lavishly paid without cost to themselves."

"In other words, the broadcasters are reaping a golden harvest from the major league clubs without any financial return to the clubs which provide the entertainment."

Meets Diegels Today in Effort to Stage Comeback.

(AP)—Meeting for the fourth time in the history of the Professional Golfers' association championships, Leo Diegel, defender of the title, and Walter Hagen, who for five occasions has claimed the honor, today will clash in the semi-finals of the twelfth annual renewal of the event, aware that somewhere on the Millercrest course lurks for one of them inevitable defeat.
