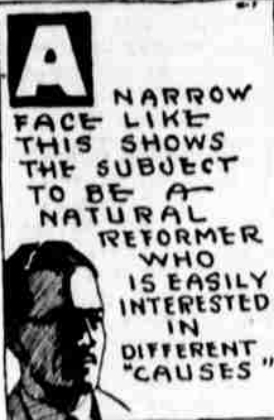


NEWS IN BRIEF

Governor Commends Work of Oregon Tuberculosis Assn.

"Your organization has already accomplished splendid results in alleviating the effects of this dread disease in Oregon, and deserves the encouragement and co-operation of the people of Oregon, in its future efforts."

In these words Governor Patterson endorses the work of the Oregon Tuberculosis association in a letter received today from him by Mrs. Nellie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary. "I regard it as an annual privilege to express my hearty commendation and support of the seal sale by which the Association finances its program of health work," the governor continued.

The sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals started Thanksgiving Day by the Oregon Tuberculosis association, and its twenty affiliated associations known as county public health associations. They are volunteer groups, for the most part, the two exceptions being Lane county and Multnomah county, where the work has developed to such an extent that paid workers are essential for the county program.

Once Worth Poured

That an ounce of prevention is really worth a pound of cure is, in the estimation of Mrs. Dunbar, particularly true in the work financed by the annual sale of

Christmas seals. "We do take some credit for the continued reduction of the annual death rate from tuberculosis, but those who have purchased Christmas seals in past years are the ones who have really made this possible. We who administer the funds you contribute have had to decide how to do this humanitarian work. The board of directors, made up of physicians, surgeons, nurses, business men and women, health officials, professors, teachers and other socially minded persons decided our work should be to prevent tuberculosis. When this association was formed in 1915 the annual death rate was 95 out of every 10,000 persons. In 1923 it was 55. In other words, at the rate of increase of the population in Oregon, the number of deaths last year would have been 250 had the 1915 rate continued. The actual number killed last year by tuberculosis was 504. We believe we have had some part in this saving of lives. Nationally known life insurance officials tell us we have. Eminent physicians and surgeons tell us we have. Governor Patterson has endorsed this year-round program which is helping to save the lives of our neighbors and mine. It is on this record that we base our appeal to you; buy Christmas seals, for they do fight tuberculosis."

On Second Thought, Santa Clausing Wasn't So Good

JOLIET, Ill., Dec. 7. (AP)—George Weyer started out Tuesday to be a philanthropist and wound up today with his money all back in the bank.

He went to the bank and asked how much his balance was. They told him it was \$17,000 plus. "Too much money to be lying around," declared Weyer, so he drew out \$10,000.

He moved on down the street. He came to the Guardian Angel Home and entered.

"Here's \$2,000 for your excellent institution," said Weyer. "Tut, tut, don't try to dissuade me. I've got money, a good job and no one to support."

The next stop was at the Providence high school where he gave the Sisters in charge \$7200.

Later he dropped into the Salvation Army and gave away the rest of the money.

"Money irks me terribly," he explained.

Yesterday, however, was another day. He went to the police station and told everything. "We've been waiting for you," the police said. "The people you gave the money to have been calling up. It looked fishy to them."

"Oh, that part's all right," said Weyer. "It isn't the money itself, but I got to thinking that if the money had stayed in the bank, it would have earned interest. If the people really want me to have it back, why am I to hurt their feelings?"

Today the money's in the bank—Weyer's bank.

GRAND JURY TO MEET THURSDAY

Will Consider Cases of Wright and Johnson During Meet.

Whether or not John G. Wright should be officially charged with first degree murder in an indictment made to stand trial on that charge will be decided by the Klamath county grand jury which has been called to meet on Thursday, December 12.

Date for the meeting of the grand jury was decided yesterday by Circuit Judge W. M. Duncan after a conference with T. R. Gilenwaters, assistant district attorney.

To Allege Murder Wright has been bound over to the grand jury after a preliminary hearing. Evidence will be presented to the grand jury to attempt to show that Jack Wright, local plumber and husband of the woman who was shot and killed by Sydney E. Darling, owner of the Anchor hotel, on the night of November 12.

The state will further tell the grand jury that the shooting was premeditated and done with malice aforethought and constitutes a felony.

Assistant District Attorney Gilenwaters will present the case to the grand jury.

JOHNSON CASE UP

As yet no additional counsel has been employed to help J. C. O'Neill, chief of Wright's defense counsel, O'Neill states.

Case of the state vs. Ted (Taylor) Johnson will also be presented to the grand jury. Johnson, known in Klamath Falls as Taylor, will be accused by the state of assault on a 9-year-old girl. Johnson escaped county officers when he was freed by a city policeman through a misunderstanding between the officers and no reports of Johnson's present address have been received here.

RAIN FORECASTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7. (AP)—The weather outlook for the week beginning December 8 was announced here today by the United States weather bureau as follows: far western states, the outlook is for occasional rains in Oregon and Washington. Probably extending to northern portions of California by the middle of the week and generally fair weather elsewhere. Temperatures will be near the normal.

Juror "More Than Sampled" Evidence

BEND, Ore., Dec. 7. (AP)—A warrant charging an unnamed juror with contempt of court because he abused the bailiff and "more than sampled" a half gallon alleged moonshine was to be served today after Judge Duffy declared a mistrial in the case of Mrs. Lulu Cline, charged with possession of liquor.

Judge Duffy announced that the half gallon of liquor had disappeared during the trial and that W. P. Vandever, 75, bailiff, had been abused and threatened by the juror.

The judge held the juror had a right to test the liquor, but declared it was evident at least one juror had "more than sampled it."
