Mountain Highways Closed to Traffic

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10. (A. P.)—The Oregon State Motor association announced today that because of heavy snows and general rains throughout the state, the highway from Medford to Port Klamath by way of Crater Lake and the road from Portland to eastern Oregon via the Wapinita cutoff had been closed.
All other highways over the state are open.
The Crater Lake road has been closed two days, but the Wapinita road was closed Monday afternoon following a 14 inch snowfall.
Motorists traveling between Roseburg and Grants Pass were warned today to drive carefully because of ice on the pavement. The highway commission today started sanding the highways.

Shaw Bertram Has New Superintendent

A. H. Hughes, who has been superintendent of the Shaw Bertram Lumber company logging camp, has resigned and J. P. Baker, formerly logging foreman with the Pelican Bay Lumber company, has been appointed superintendent, effective January 1st.
The logging camp has been closed for the winter but repair work will start after the holidays and logs that are now being decked by Grover Grimmert will be loaded out by the loading crews starting about February 15th, and regular operations will be resumed at Squaw Valley on the O. C. & E. as early after that date as the snow conditions will permit.

Santa Claus To Visit Sugarman's Friday, Dec. 13

Santa Claus has been invited to come to Klamath Falls and give a royal treat to all the children of the city by K. Sugarman, local merchant, who will stage on Friday, December 13, his second annual Christmas party for the children.
Remember the good time all the kiddies had last year? Remember all the candy and toys that jolly old Santa Claus gave away when K. Sugarman's store was his headquarters? And how he came down Main street from the court house after he had arrived here from the North Pole? It will be just the same this year and a promise has been given to all the kiddies that each one will get something.
Garbed in a red suit with white trimmings, as everyone remembers him, and with black leather boots with jingle bells all around them, he will appear at the court house at promptly 7:15. From the court house he will be led by the Klamath Union high school band down Main street to K. Western Senators Back River Measure

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10. (A. P.)—Senator Wesley L. Jones and Representative John W. Summers of Washington have notified the chamber of commerce here that they will support the Columbia Valley association in its attempt to have the upper Columbia river and tributaries placed on the national waterways improvement program.
"Rest assured that everything I can do toward the improvement of the Columbia river for navigation, as well as other purposes, will be done," Senator Jones said.
All of Oregon's delegation in congress, as well as Senator Dill of Washington, Senator Borah and Representative French of Idaho, have assured the association of support in obtaining its objective.
The goal of the association is the restoration of navigation on the upper Columbia.

Art Shires Says Tunney Due To Come Out of Retirement

CHICAGO, Dec. 10. (AP)—Victorious in his first professional boxing bout, Charles Arthur (The Great) Shires, wants Gene Tunney next.
Shires made his bow at the White City arena last night and spent just 21 seconds of his first fight for profit, in knocking out Dangerous Dan Daly, a Cleveland youth who also was making his initial appearance as a professional heavyweight.
After the bout Promoter Jim Mullen told Shires his next opponent would be George Trafton, huge center of the Chicago Bears of the National pro football league. But Charles Arthur noisily and firmly refused the assignment.
Best or None
"No more punk fighters get any free publicity through me," was Shires' ultimatum. "I want the best or none. Get Tunney out of retirement for me."
The great one was only mildly stirred by his quick victory and the circumstances surrounding the show. It drew a capacity crowd of around 5,000, with gate receipts of approximately \$13,000.
"Big crowd?" Shires asked. "What's 5,000 people when 55,000 used to turn out to see me play the Yankees?"
Both Mixed Freely
Shires had plenty of competition from Daly until the finish occurred. They answered the bell by charging into each other throwing punches from everywhere. Shires connected with a right to Daly's chin, and the Cleveland youth, a protégé of Eddie Meade, manager of Joe Lynch when the latter was heavyweight champion, dove face first to the canvas. He tried to get up, but could not make it. Even the cocky Shires was bewildered at the quick finish. He redonned a gorgeous red and purple bathrobe, across the back of which was inscribed "Art 'The Great' Shires," then rushed over to assist in reviving Daly.
Boos Erupt in Cheers
The belligerent White Sox first baseman entered the ring with a chorus of boos as his greeting, but left with cheers ringing in his ears.
Lou Harbour, travelling secretary of the White Sox, who went to the aid of Lena Blackburne, then manager of the club, when Blackburne was attempting to subdue Shires during a battle in a Philadelphia hotel room last summer, was at the ringside, as was Dell Pratt, former major league infielder, who came all the way from Dallas, Tex., to see Shires fight. Pratt, manager of the Dallas club of the Texas league, had Shires on his team before the great one came to the White Sox.
