LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12. (AP)—Coach Howard Jones plans for his University of Southern California football aggregation definitely to do something here Saturday about the array of trick plays credited to the tartan foe from Carnegie Tech.

While the Trojan coaching staff was laying plans for more scrimmage today, 27 members of the Carnegie Tech squad, with their coaching staff, spent the day at the Grand Canyon. Yesterday they turned out at Winslow, Ariz., for a light workout.

Rose Bowl Game Will Be Sell-Out

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12. (AP)—Indications are that the Rose Bowl, scene of the tournament of roses clash between the university of Southern California and Pittsburgh football eleven, will be sold out long before New Year's day. Arnold Eddy, assistant graduate manager of the Trojan institution, said today.

Two days after application for tickets were issued, Eddy said, 32,000 of the approximately 70,000 seats were sold. "If the present rate keeps up, there will be no public sale, all of the tickets going by application," he announced.

Of these tickets, 2,000 went to Pittsburgh alumni and 3,500 to the Trojan rooting section.

Army-Navy Fuss May Be Settled

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (AP)—A suggestion that the Army and Navy football controversy be settled by a commission comprising five former captains drawn from Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Pennsylvania and Georgetown was made to President Hoover today by Representative Fish, republican, New York, who called at the White House.

Fish said the commission of football captains should be appointed either by the president or by the secretaries of navy and war departments, and any decision reached by it should be binding upon both institutions.

He added he had discussed his proposal with Senators Copeland and Wagner of New York, and Senators Tydings and Goldsborough of Maryland, and said they approved.

Fish represents the West Point district in congress.

Majors May Cut Rate to Children

CHICAGO, Dec. 12. (AP)—School children may be admitted for 25 cents each to all major league baseball games in 1930, excepting those played on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

At the suggestion of Keneaw M. Landis, commissioner of baseball, Alderman Thomas J. Bowler of Chicago was bound for the joint meeting of the majors at New York today, with the plan of cut rate tickets for youngsters.

"The youngsters are losing interest in baseball because they can't pay high prices for tickets," Bowler said. "If the rate is cut to 25 cents for them, they will become interested in the game again."
