

CONCERN FELT FOR JAPANESE

Tokyo Fears Subjects Have Fallen Into Soviet Hands.

TOKYO, Dec. 13, (AP)—Concern for the safety of several hundred Japanese subjects in northwestern Manchuria was increased, by receipt Thursday of the first message since November 16 from the Japanese consul at Manchuria. The message which came through Moscow merely reported the safety of a few individuals.

Messages Go Astray
Since the message was numbered "9" officials believed the eight previous messages went astray or were suppressed and doubt was arisen concerning the value of Moscow's general assurances for the safety of all Japanese subjects in the occupied zone.

Moscow has persisted in its refusal to permit the Japanese consul to Manchuria to report to Tokyo in code messages. The foreign office has instructed the Japanese ambassador at Moscow to urge the Soviet government to forward the consul's reports.

Soviet Holds Railway
Officials reports apparently confirm reports that the Soviet troops are occupying the western portion of the Chinese Eastern railway, including Khabarovsk. Governor Wan Fu-lin of Hwangkiang told the Japanese consul at Tatsien that the Chinese were unable to insure the safety beyond Yakutsk, 80 kilometers east of Khabarovsk, of the proposed international train carrying American, French, British, Japanese and German consuls which was to leave Harbin Friday for Manchuria to ascertain the situation beyond the Khinggan mountains. The consul reported he had been informed that Soviet cavalry had been seen 60 miles east of Khabarovsk.

PORTLAND, Dec. 13, (AP)—The Portland chamber of commerce today wired Senator McNary, Oregon, to stir up action on the Mount Hood tramway, because of repeated delays by Secretary of Interior Wilbur's special committee.

It was explained delay was caused by the illness of one of the members of the committee, but W. D. B. Dodson, secretary of the chamber, said he had been notified that the report should have been delivered last Tuesday.

ATTORNEY DIES

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13, (AP)—R. Porter Ashe, 65, prominent California attorney, died at his home from the effects of a cerebral hemorrhage. He was the son of Dr. Richard Ashe, of Asheville, N. C., who came to California as first naval Governor when the state was taken over from Mexico.

BUSINESS MEN TALK FARM AID

PORTLAND, Dec. 13, (AP)—Twenty-five upstate bankers were here today at the invitation of W. G. Ide, manager of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, to discuss proposals for organizing a Pacific Northwest Credit corporation, to loan funds to farmers.

The bankers met in conjunction with the numerous Pacific Northwest business men and agriculturists, who are attending the Pacific Northwest Advisory board meeting, which started today.

Following a visit here of C. W. Wilkins, vice president and general manager of the Agricultural Credit corporation of Minneapolis, Ide started investigations and the meeting today was the culmination.

Need Banks' Support
Formation of a similar institution in this territory is said to hinge on the necessary support from banks and the question whether agriculture here needed such assistance.

Ide said a much smaller organization would suffice in this district, and estimated that a maximum of \$1,000,000 would be sufficient to insure its successful operation, whereas the Minneapolis institution had \$10,000,000 with which to work.

Since Wilkins' visit considerable agitation has been prevalent in the Northwest for a credit corporation, Ide said.

Five Killed As Bus Crashes Car

LONDON, Dec. 12, (AP)—Five persons were killed and 30 injured when a motorbus collided last night with a street car at Enfield, Middlesex. Four of the victims were women, and all those killed were bus passengers.

The street car overturned, imprisoning the passengers amid piles of broken glass and debris. The collision came when the bus swung out to avoid striking a cyclist.

Weird Ceremonial Used To Portray Feast of Virgin

LAS CRUCES, N. M., Dec. 13, (AP)—Dressed in ceremonial robes, fantastic headpieces and grotesque masks, participants in the weird observance of the feast of the Virgin of Guadalupe began at sunrise Thursday their ceremonies—a strange wedding of old Spanish Catholicism and the ancient Aztec religion.

A glaring fire cross on the slopes of Tortugas mountain last night flashed an invitation for all who saw to attend the feast in the tiny village of Tortugas which continues until midnight tonight. Tom-toms beat their call to the "Olla" of promise dance.

The celebration today was to open with a procession in which the Indians carry a figure of the virgin. Many of them carry or wear articles dating back to the Spanish conquest of New Mexico.

Throughout the day the dancing goes on with first one group and then another measuring their tread with the throbbing of the tom-toms, continuing until after the sun has set.

Three Perish In Texas Hotel Fire

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Dec. 13, (AP)—Three men, including two firemen, were killed today in a fire that destroyed the Antlers hotel here, a three-story brick structure.

The dead are Smiley Turner, assistant chief of the Wichita Falls fire department, G. T. Anderson, fireman, and Kenneth Brice, taxi driver. The firemen were killed when a wall caved in. Brice died when the roof fell in while he was crying for help at a third-story window.

Eight persons also were injured, four critically.

The fire broke out shortly before midnight. Its origin was not immediately determined.
