

RAINS HOLD UP RAIL TRAFFIC

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sprinkling yesterday, was not included in the forecast for rain.

Rains continued throughout the night in Eastern Washington and North Idaho, where precipitation for the 24-hour period ending at midnight ranged from a fraction of an inch to more than three inches. Snow in North Idaho damaged telephone wires and drifts impeded highway travel. Western Montana also reported a heavy fall of snow.

Freeze Lowers Water

Belin forecast for the Tacoma district in Washington failed to materialize yesterday. Instead, freezing temperatures slowed up the flow of streams supplying water for hydro-electric plants, thus making the power situation more acute.

Flurries of rain continued throughout Oregon, with snow in the higher regions.

In Northern California, streams which had been trickles less than a month ago, became torrents, rivers and dams rose by the foot, and heavy snow fell in the high mountains.

Air Service Handicapped

Air mail and air travel were seriously handicapped north and east of San Francisco. Transcontinental air mail was carried by train between Sacramento and Reno. North of the California border, passengers and mail were transferred from plane to train.

At Kennett, several north and southbound trains were held up when two sections of the Southern Pacific track were washed out by the headwaters of the Sacramento river between Kennett and Coram. Trains from the north were tied up for twelve hours while a large crew of workmen repaired the damage. Travel was resumed near midnight.

Stockmen Warned

No swiftly did the rivers rise in the uplands of Northern California that State Meteorologist N. R. Taylor warned stockmen to remove their cattle and sheep from the lowlands.

The town of Iron Mountain, in Shasta county, was isolated when the rain washed out his Rock creek bridge.

The Sacramento river rose a foot within the last 24 hours, while the rise of Butte creek near Chico has been between four and five feet since Sunday.

Shasta Gets Downpour
Exceptionally heavy rains fell in Kennett, Shasta county, where 11.65 inches fell over a 24 hour period. At Buck creek, Plumas county, a total of 30 inches was recorded in three days.

A freak result of the storm was reported at Visalia, Calif., where millions of flying white ants, said to be termites, invaded the city after the first precipitation.

Rains during the next 48 hours are expected to come from two low pressure areas, or "storm makers," out in the Pacific ocean, another off the Humboldt county, Calif., coast and another over Montana.

SIMS AND DUNN RESIDED HERE

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latives of the men. Miss Marie Maggart, a friend of Sims, left Klamath Falls for Portland Wednesday and the two were to meet at a home in Portland yesterday.

Both Worked Here
Both men were former residents of Klamath Falls, having worked here for some time, and were on their way to Portland. The men, both unconscious, were found under the motorcycle by R. M. Hollingshead, Shastiko stockman. They were placed in the man's truck but Dunn died before Madras was reached. Sims was taken to Bend and died in a

Bend hospital. Both suffered internal injuries and fractured skulls.

Deputies and Jefferson county officials were at first unable to identify the two men, but the identification was made from Klamath Falls information. The two men were both employed by the Porter Construction company here during the summer months but not recently. It cannot be learned whether or not the men had been employed around Klamath for the past few months and it is thought they were on their way to Portland in search of employment.

Sims' father lives in Tigard, Ore., and he has an uncle and brother living in Vancouver, Wash.

The body of Dunn is in Madras.

COUNTY GRAND JURY AT WORK

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to T. R. Gillenwaters, assistant district attorney, that some secret indictments may be returned, although he would not state definitely what he would ask or the nature of the crimes that might be involved in the secret indictments.

Trial for January
Assistant District Attorney Gillenwaters is in charge of the case against Wright for the alleged killing of Darling. He stated last night that there is indication now that the expected trial of Wright may not come up until the January term of the circuit court.

Judge W. M. Duncan, who will hear the case of the state against Wright, is expected, has a number of civil cases on the docket for the December term and because of the fact that the court is now busy, Gillenwaters said that to ask that the case be tried in December might work a hardship on the court and delay civil business.

Gillenwaters states that trial of the case is expected to be set for early in January.

Automatic Examined
Wright is held in the county jail since November 12, the night which Darling, owner of the Anchor hotel, was shot in the head with a shotgun. The charge went through a screen door, a glass in a wooden door and blew off the left side of Darling's head.

Wright called the officers and gave himself up. Since that time a small automatic was found at the foot of stairs at the head of which Darling's body was lying. The automatic has been examined for fingerprints but neither Sheriff L. L. Low nor Assistant District Attorney Gillenwaters have made any statement regarding the findings. They have stated that all will be brought out at the trial of Wright.

No Assistants Hired
The alleged motive for the shooting, according to the state, is a difference of opinion over money matters in connection with Mrs. Wright's lease of the hotel from Darling and over rooms being put in the basement by Darling and to which Wright objected.

J. C. O'Neill, attorney for Wright, has given no indication of the argument which the defense will use. There was a rumor that further defense counsel might be employed to assist O'Neill and also that relatives of Darling might employ an assistant to help Assistant District Attorney Gillenwaters with the prosecution. As far as could be learned last night no additional attorneys have as yet been employed by either side.

CORONER JURY FREES DRIVER

That Henry Keough, 40, came to his death Wednesday by means of injuries due to an automobile accident and no one is guilty of a crime or negligence thereby, was

the verdict returned by the coroner's jury after an inquest held last night.

Elmer Stonedipher, wheat rancher of Walsburg, Wash., and driver of the car that struck Keough on the Dallas-California highway at Chemult, Tuesday afternoon, took the stand and told of the details of the accident as nearly as he could remember them.

Unable to Stop

He stated he was certain they were not going over 25 miles an hour at the time he struck Keough, because it had started to snow and he and his wife were watching along the road for an inn or hotel where they might stop for the night.

As they drove into Chemult the rancher said he saw a man step out from behind a truck. He sounded his horn, the man stopped and looked at the approaching car, then stepped directly in front of it so quickly that he had no time to stop or avoid him, the witness said.

Dr. L. L. Truax, who attended the injured man, testified that death was caused by internal hemorrhage, caused by a ruptured liver, but that he also incurred fractures of the right arm and left wrist, and six crushed ribs.

Crossing Worst In Experience of Liners' Captains

NEW YORK, Dec. 13, (AP)—After a crossing which their skipper agreed was the worst in their long experience, the French liner France and the Cunard liner Berengaria were in port today, two days late.

Both ships ran into the storm a few hours after leaving the coast of France, and battled it for several days. A blinding snow storm, accompanied by a wind that reached 100 miles an hour, caused seas estimated at fully 50 feet high.

The Berengaria had eight windows smashed on the upper promenade deck, two ventilators carried away, and a steel bulkhead 60 feet above the water line bent.
