

FINE MANY TULE HUNTERS

Improper Licenses Bring Large Amount Into Court in Fines

George Tonkin, United States game protector, was in the city Wednesday with a report of game law violations in the Tule Lake region and Klamath county. During the past four days nearly \$500 in fines have been assessed by the justices of the peace at Dorris, Calif., and Klamath Falls.

One of a party of five from Josephine county was caught hunting at Tule Lake Saturday without a nonresident license, was taken to Dorris by Fred Starr, game warden, and fined \$50.

Shoots Swan

The four other members of the Josephine county party went back into Oregon after this incident and Tonkin ran across them at the Charles Mack ranch in the Spring Lake district just as one of the men, Clifford Hale, killed a swan and another of the party, C. J. McBriety, was found to be hunting without a license.

The officer brought the men before Judge W. B. Barnes who fined Hale \$25 and costs, and McBriety \$15 because he attempted to conceal his guilt. Tonkin asserted that when he approached the men, McBriety hid his gun and said he wasn't hunting. He insisted that he didn't own the gun until Tonkin tried to give it to the owner of the place.

Hale and McBriety were obliged to board in the county jail here a few hours until money arrived from home. In the meantime the other man was being retained in the Dorris jail where he suddenly remembered that he had a bank account and that his check book was in his pocket.

Lawrence A. Meeks of Eugene was arrested at Tule lake using a resident license. He insisted that his father worked at Adin, Calif., but finally admitted being an Oregon resident. He pleaded guilty to the charge of using an improper license and paid a fine of \$50.

Sunday morning, Tonkin and A. A. Jordan, deputy state warden, stopped a Marshfield car containing three hunters. One of the men was carrying a license which did not check with his description, Tonkin stated, and he finally admitted the license had been given by the owner, Enoch H. Holland of Marshfield, to Charles Huggins of the Huggins Insurance company at Marshfield who in turn passed it on to S. E. Taylor. Taylor pleaded guilty to a charge of using an improper license, and the judge figured that since it had been fraudulently handled by three, the fine would be \$50 for each, or \$150. Taylor was detained in Dorris, not in a hotel, until the money came from home.

The game protector said yesterday that the judge at Dorris has put his Christmas fines on the market and prospects indicate there won't be anything cheap in the way of fines this year.

Pauline Frederick Ill From Poisoning

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 13, (AP)—Announcement was made today that the sudden illness of Pauline Frederick, star of "The Queen was in the Parlor", has forced the closing of the play which has been holding forth at a local theater.

Miss Frederick was forced to cancel her appearance a short time before the curtain went up Tuesday night, due to illness caused by food poisoning.

Dr. Edgar L. Craft, who is attending the actress, said her condition is not critical, but she will be confined to the hospital for several days more.

McNary Promises Action on Harbor

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 13.—A telegram from Senator Charles L. McNary received by Mr. C. E. Gates, President, Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association Thursday morning states that the survey report of Crescent tUCy harbor will be sent to Washington, D. C., about December 14th, and will be given consideration by the Board of Army Engineers at an early date.

Although the report is somewhat delayed the assurance of the Senator that the Board of Army Engineers will review it as soon as possible is very encouraging to officials of the Development association.

Immediately upon receipt of the telegram President Gates sent a letter to Senator McNary to ascertain if the report will be

acted upon in time for the cent City project to be included in the recommendations of the Rivers and Harbors committee.

There seems to be a feeling here that Crescent City harbor should have a fair portion of the total of the Rivers and Harbors fund, especially in view of President Hoover's announced building program, and it is expected that a very broad view will probably be taken with reference to development and expansion work.

Senator McNary will be notified immediately the Board of Army Engineers has taken action on the harbor and his reply will be eagerly looked for according to President Gates.
