Tragedy Stalks Home of Sailor William Rogers

CHICAGO, Dec. 13, (AP)—The Lake tragedy of October 29, when William Rogers, a sailor, was saved from the sinking steamer Wisconsin off Kenosha, re-echoed funeral in his home today. His son James, 4 years old, was dead.

Ever since Rogers was saved, with other members of the crew, from one of the worst storms that have swept Lake Michigan in years, there have been celebrations at his home. Mrs. Rogers said today that friends of her husband had expressed their jubilation by calling often, bringing bottles of liquor.

Their son was alone in the house yesterday except for an uncle, Philip O'Donnell. While his uncle was in another room the boy climbed on a chair and got a bottle half filled with moonshine whiskey. He drank nearly all of it.

Physicians worked over him several hours, but he died late last night.

NEW SAFETY DEVICE

PARIS—A new safety device for railway trains has been successfully demonstrated here. Two trains were sent down the same track at top speed, starting at opposite ends so as to run into one another. Floods Wash Out Track, Delay Train

All north and southbound traffic on the Southern Pacific railroad was held up yesterday when about 100 feet of roadbed was washed out by floods three miles south of Kennet. Ties and rails were left suspended in mid-air the entire distance.

Passenger trains Nos. 14 and 16, northbound, were held at Redding, while Nos. 15 and the Cascade Limited were held north of the washout. All freight traffic was stopped.

No other trains which pass through Klamath were delayed in arrival here, it was stated last night.

MISS CUMMINGS IN Polyphonic Choir
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Dec. 13, (Special)—Margaret Cummings, music major at the University of Oregon, is one of 48 students who will appear with the new Polyphonic Choir directed by Arthur Boardman, head of voice, when it makes its initial appearance here Sunday afternoon, Dec. 15, at regular vesper services.

Recognized as one of the few amateur polyphonic choirs in the United States, the new group is occasioning much interest here. It is singing the early church music of Bach, Palestrina and others, involving not the usual four-part work but as many as 10 and 12-part singing. Only music majors were considered for membership. Its organization is patterned after the Small man choir, of Los Angeles, and the famous Russian Symphonic choir.

Arthur Boardman, American tenor and head of the voice department, is directing the group.

ATTORNEY DENIES He Attempted To Influence Hoover
WASHINGTON, Dec. 13, (AP)—A letter from H. C. Lakin, of the Cuba company, to President Machado of Cuba, which said President Hoover had instructed E. P. Shattuck, attorney and Chairman Smoot of the Senate Finance committee "to confer together" was read into the record today at the senate lobby committee hearing.

Friend of President Shattuck, a New York attorney, was employed by Lakin to work for lower tariff rates and the Cuba company official had

previously testified that Shattuck was employed partly because of his friendship for the president. The letter to Machado said that Shattuck's connection with President Hoover "is our strongest weapon except your efforts and those of your ambassador."

Shattuck has denied that he has attempted to influence President Hoover in connection with the tariff bill.

The letter Lakin wrote Machado said the Cuba company president had "obeyed your instructions to work in cooperation with your ambassador."

IT'S ALL ATMOSPHERE
