

COAST TEAMS HAVE EDGE ON EASTERN BOYS

Andy Kerr Says West Ideal Section For Football.

HAMILTON, N. Y., Dec. 13. (AP)—The best eastern football team invading the Pacific coast can naturally expect to be twenty per cent the worst of it, according to Andy Kerr, Colgate coach, who also has charge of organizing the East team for the annual charity game with the West at San Francisco.

Kerr, in addition to his wide experience in eastern football, put in four years at Stanford university, and has had opportunity to study the intersectional question from both angles.

Eastern Fields Frozen
"Look out there, and you'll see the reason," said Kerr, pointing to Whitall field, the college gridiron. "That field is frozen as hard as a rock and is as slippery as a mill pond. It is the same in any other section of the east or middle west. You can't hold practice on a field like that. Why, you can't even walk on it without slipping."

No Risk in West
"On the coast it is different. They have fine football weather through New Year's. You can work them as hard as you want without incurring any injury risk. The difference in the weather conditions and training facilities amounts to at least 20 per cent advantage for the coast team."

The trip across the continent is no handicap either way in Kerr's opinion. "It may be a bore in some respects, but it is also restful," he explained.

Weather Handicap
"In poor weather, the western eleven is at no disadvantage coming east, but would be heavily handicapped in rain or snow or extreme cold," Kerr declares. "They don't have any of that November weather out there, and they'd be lost if they struck it here. During the season the eastern teams would give much better account of themselves."

Eight Feet Snow At Crater Rim

There is estimated to be eight feet of snow at Crater lake rim, four feet at Anna Springs camp, and three feet at the Klamath and Medford entrances to the park, and it is still snowing, according to information received yesterday from the Crater lake park office at Medford.

The only person now in the park is the caretaker at the lodge, who remains throughout the winter. Ranger R. R. Beck and Mrs. Beck left the park Tuesday after receiving word from headquarters that the park was closed to all motor travel for the winter.

They had considerable difficulty in getting out of the park, it was stated, since the snow had piled up in great drifts and was soft and sticky. It was necessary for a truck from Fort Klamath to meet them at the Garden of the Gods and tow them the remainder of the distance to the fort.

Several large trees have blown across the road between the Klamath entrance and Anna Springs camp, it was learned.

Trapped In Mine, Man Directs Rescue

CROSBY, Minn., Dec. 13. (AP)—Smoking cigarettes and partaking of nourishment prescribed by physicians, Gus Snyder, 45-year-old miner, directed men who sought to rescue him today.

He was imprisoned Tuesday in a sub-chamber, 367 feet underground in the Croft mine, when ore broke through timber supports shortly after a companion had left him.

Workmen established communication with him late yesterday, 24 hours after he was trapped, and food, tobacco and a stimulant were passed through an aperture to him.

Rescuers were forced to work slowly to prevent a further cave-in. Although Snyder's legs are pinned by a timber, he is able to use his arms to reach food passed down through the crevice.

NORTH UMPQUA ROAD IN DOUBT

Increase in Cost Of Big Camas Strip Halts Work.

PORTLAND, Dec. 13. (AP)—The Oregonian said this morning that Washington, D. C., forestry officials have notified Senator McNary, Oregon, that the outlook for the completion of the North Umpqua Highway is uncertain.

Excessive cost of construction of the remaining link in the road seems to be the principal objection of the forest service. The district forester at Portland has offered a compromise in the form of a survey of the rest of the route if the counties interested will contribute half of the total cost, estimated at \$30,000.

Proposed Forest Road
"It appears that the project from Rock Creek to a junction with the Crater Lake-Odell road had been recommended as a forest highway by the state highway

commission. The district engineer of the bureau of public roads and the district forester," stated the letter received by McNary. "Two sections of the road, one from Rock Creek to Steamboat, and the other from the Crater Lake-Odell road to the Big Camas ranger station have been constructed, but the portion between these two sections has not been undertaken, due to the excessive increase in cost," the letter said.

CELTIC TOTAL LOSS

QUEENSTOWN, Ireland, Dec. 13. (AP)—All hope was abandoned today of refloating the liner Celtic, which stranded on the rocks near here a year ago.

The liner has broken her back. The front portion remains on the rocks, but the stern has fallen into deep water.

Children Should Be Weighed To Determine Diet

The growth, weight and height of children should be watched. To grow in height and grow regularly in weight is just as much a sign of health in a boy or girl of nine or ten as in a baby. Mothers have learned to weigh their babies. They should also learn that it is just as important to weigh the older boys and girls. When children do not gain regularly something is usually wrong. If the boys and girls are weighed monthly any changes will be discovered early and not allowed to go on to serious consequences.

The causes of poor nutrition are not usually difficult to find. The most common causes are insufficient food or not the right kind of food. The child's appetite for simple foods needed for growth such as milk, cereals, vegetables etc. is often spoiled by excessive indulgence in candy, sweets, pastry and other indigestible foods. Irregular eating between meals of cakes and tarts interferes with the child's digestion. Eating too rapidly, and

never taking time to chew food properly is another cause of poor digestion and poor nutrition. Tea or coffee in place of milk is another cause of poor nutrition. Insufficient sleep causes disturbances of nutrition. The child of eight or ten needs at least ten hours sleep each night. The child should sleep with windows wide open in order to get all of the fresh air possible.

The poorly nourished child frequently suffers with habitual constipation. Over stimulation of the nervous system by emotional excitement of motion pictures and other evening entertainments interferes with the growing child's health.

Some children play too hard or too many hours. Their activities should be carefully regulated. Some children are overworked in and out of school.

It must also be remembered that poor nutrition may be due to such things as decayed teeth, or enlarged or diseased tonsils. When a child does not gain regularly and shows signs of being poorly nourished, immediate steps should be taken to determine the cause. A regular diet of simple nourishing food

Fish Canneryman Dies In Portland

PORTLAND, Dec. 13. (AP)—Frank Seufert of The Dalles, prominent fish packer and developer of the Upper Columbia country, died Thursday night at his Portland residence, after an illness of several months. He was 77 years old.

Seufert was born at Long Island, N. Y., in 1853, and learned the butcher trade in New York. He came west and opened a meat shop at The Dalles.

He developed fish wheels, and after studying salmon, opened the packing plant. In connection with the fish packing business he operated large orchards in The Dalles district.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a daughter and three sons.
