WILL AID BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (AP)—To enable expansion of the federal government's huge public buildings program, the house public buildings committee today approved the Elliott bill to provide \$20,000,000 in addition to the sum already authorized for construction of postoffices and other federal buildings.

Inspect Proposed Route—

A proposed rural delivery route through Langell Valley was looked over Thursday by a postal inspector, John McCall. Klamath Falls postmaster, and the postman at Bonanza. Several weeks ago the people who reside in Langell Valley prepared a petition asking the postal department for delivery service, which was sent to Robert D. Butler, representative from this district. The proposed route starts at Bonanza, runs along the east side of the valley and back the west side to the starting point. A rural delivery route gives the same service as a postoffice. It was explained, since the carrier is allowed to sell stamps, make out money orders, etc.

Cal C. Wells Popular—

A movement has been under way both in Medford and Klamath Falls, ever since it became known that United States Marshal Hotchkiss was not to be re-appointed and would be succeeded by John R.
