Beck, Pelican forward, played a stellar game on the floor and under the basket was a sure point and ball setter. Beck passed accurately with either hand and will strengthen the Pelicans' forward wall considerably. Messer and Louis Anderson worked together and with Beck.

Beckley is a very good man with the ball and passes fast and true. Last night Louis Anderson worked well, making his usual fast breaks. Louis is passing better than last year. PIGSKIN CZAR PLAN TABLED UNTIL SPRING

Conference Discusses Earlier Opening Of Season.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18. (AP)—Graduate managers and faculty athletic representatives of the Pacific conference set about today picking up the loose ends and dispensing with the final minor details of an annual meeting that so far has brought out nothing more startling than completion of a 1930 football schedule and shelving of two fairly important matters.

For the last day of a meeting, the graduate managers had before them a proposal to open the football practice season on September 15. Colleges in the northern sector of the conference, whose classes open earlier, were in favor of the proposition. Stanford, a late starter and Southern California, whose schedule runs far into December, were opposed to the idea.

Commission Plan Tabled
The question of appointment of a "commissioner of football," with full authority over all conference matters, today had been tabled until the meeting next spring. This matter was settled yesterday by the faculty members, who also passed over a proposition to determine some method of awarding conference championships after two or more teams had finished the season in a tie. Four teams, Southern California, California, Stanford and Oregon, tied for the 1929 title, each losing one game.

Considerable discussion on the football commissioner plan had been expected and pre-meeting gossip had it there was a strong probability of the position being created.

Bar Movies
From sources close to the meeting, it was learned that the conference might take action today on the use of motion pictures for scouting purposes. Reports were that this method of analyzing opponents' plays likely would be barred.

Other unfinished business on hand today included election of officers by both bodies and possible renewal of discussion of two incidents that had the graduate manager in a state of unusual excitement yesterday. One was a sudden demand by the professional football officials' association, whose members officiate in conference games, for a substantial increase in fees. The other was a question of "who

should be who" when two teams adopt the same color for jerseys.

More Pay For Arbiters
The football officials slipped over a surprise punch by asking for an increase up to \$250 for each of the four arbiters of games with gates reaching \$200,000 and \$150 each for contests that draw \$100,000. The scale now is \$50 for small games up to \$100 for the important encounters.

Some of the loudest talking of the gathering resulted from the argument over white jerseys. Stanford's men of football, and Oregon State's too, try for touchdowns in an upper garment of white. The question was brought up that when these two teams meet, which should be privileged to wear the white.

Stanford claimed priority through three years' usage. Oregon State's followers, not able to match the pioneering distinction, simply argued that they liked the white jerseys too.

Shields Ineligible For College Team

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18. (AP)—Ruling that the year Mark Shields, University of Oregon football player, played as a member of a junior college team should be counted as varsity football, the faculty members of the Pacific conference have decided Shields ineligible for football competition next season.

Under a conference ruling a player is permitted only three years of varsity competition. Shields played one season on the Ashland, Ore., normal team after having played a season with the University of Oregon, and then returned for another season with university.

Pelkey Wins From Colored Battler

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 18. (AP)—Ray Pelkey, veteran Oakland light heavyweight, took a close hard-fought ten-round battle from K. O. White, Chicago, claimant of the negro light heavyweight championship here last night. In the final round, Pelkey, 34, defeated White, 24, by a unanimous decision.

In the preliminaries Joe Dagatas, Vancouver, won over Earl Stills, Tillamook, four rounds; Benny Gallup, Portland, took a four-round decision over Kid Magalimbel, Manila; Pat Davenport and Red Mays, both of Portland, went four rounds to a draw.

Chet Leslie knocked out Fred Jenkins in the third round, both of Portland.

Portland Loses Again.
SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 18. (AP)—After losing six games and tying two, the Victoria Cubs broke the jinx last night and plastered the Portland Buckaroos for a 2 to 0 defeat on the Seattle job.

Hack Training Temper for Next Year's Baseball

CHICAGO, Dec. 18. (AP)—Hack Wilson, the burly Cub outfielder, is in training at his winter home in Martinsburg, W. Va., but not for a ring battle with Arthur "The Great" Shires.

He is training his explosive temper so he can laugh off the shouts of "Sunny Boy" that are almost certain to greet him every time he steps on a diamond next season.

"It's going to be tough listening to them call me 'Sunny Boy' because I lost that fly ball in the sun during that world series game in Philadelphia," Hack said, "but it's all a part of the racket. I'm training myself to control my temper and laugh it off."

"But they hadn't better get insulting," he warned.

GREAT ARTHUR MAY FORSAKE RING CAREER

CHICAGO, Dec. 18. (AP)—The great Arthur Shires is almost convinced that as a professional fighter he is a good first baseman. He may retire from the ring.

Since he dropped the decision to George Trafton after five rounds Monday night, Shires has been doing a lot of sleeping and no little thinking and he is considering forgetting about fight and getting in shape for baseball.

Not His Game—Maybe
"Maybe professional fighting isn't my game after all," the great one orated to friends who came to offer condolences and quick remedies for the marks Trafton put on his face. "I have gotten about all I can out of it now—a few thousand dollars and a fat two weeks vaudeville contract. Unless someone gets me darn mad with his challenges, I may quit."

Has Vaudeville Contract
It is understood, King Arthur's vaudeville contract calls for a salary of \$2,000 a week.

Greenleaf Stands Between Rudolph And Championship

DETROIT, Dec. 18. (AP)—With six victories and no defeats to his credit today, Erwin Rudolph of Chicago is favorite to win the world's championship pocket billiard tournament which ends tonight. Rudolph won his sixth straight and definitely eliminated Frank Taberski by beating the defending title holder last night 125 to 57 in 15 innings.

Ralph Greenleaf, who made his record five victories and one defeat by defeating Pasquale Natale yesterday afternoon 125 to 16 in eight innings, is the only player who now stands between Rudolph and the crown. If Rudolph beats Greenleaf he will win the title but in the event of a Greenleaf triumph there will be a tie at six games won and one lost. The playoff, in event of a Greenleaf win, will be held tomorrow night.

Rudolph seemed just a trifle shaky against Taberski and despite the fact that he had a run of 54, he did not flash the form he showed in earlier performances.
