'WEST POINT SPECIAL' ON WAY TO COAST

Army Football Squad, 110 Strong, Headed For Palo Alto

WEST POINT, N. Y., Dec. 19. (AP)—The Army football squad, 110 strong, was en route today on the longest trip ever taken by the gridders warriors of the military academy. They are due to reach Galesburg, Ill., this afternoon on the first leg of the trip to Palo Alto, Calif., where they will encounter Stanford in the final game of the season, December 28.

Travel in Luxury
The departure of the "West Point Special," a 13-car train which provides every possible comfort for a traveling football team, was made a ceremonial occasion yesterday, when the academy superintendent, Major General W. R. Smith, gave permission for the cadets to give final vocal encouragement to the departing squad. General Smith previously had ruled that the cadets could not be present at the departure on account of examinations, but he relaxed the ruling to permit 500 who were free most of the afternoon to be present.

Reception at Galesburg
The arrival of the train at Galesburg this afternoon will be another important occasion. The players, officials and others who bring the party to a total of 140 members, are to be the guests of the city. They will be escorted to the team field for practice. While the team is drilling, a reception is to be held in honor of General Smith and his staff of officers at Knox.

GALESBURG, Ill., Dec. 19. (AP)—Winter's fury, which slowed up traffic throughout the middle west, spoiled the plans of Army's football team for a good workout here today. The team, en route to California for a game with Stanford, December 28, was almost three hours behind schedule coming to Chicago. It had been planned to arrive here at 3:30 p. m. for a good workout on Knox field.

N. W. Conference Tables Proposal Include Columbia

PORTLAND, Dec. 19. (AP)—Coach representatives and Northwest conference faculty gathered here today for a joint session to elect officers for the ensuing year, complete the 1930 football schedule, and conduct other business accumulated during the past year. The question of taking Columbia university into the conference as a full fledged member will be discussed. The university entered a petition last fall, and although members of the conference were in favor of allowing the school to enter, the final decision was tabled for a year.

Coaches who were in the city are "Spec" Keene, Willamette, "Nig" Borleske, Whitman; Leo Frank, Pacific; Anne Cornell, College of Idaho; W. Pirwitz, College of Puget Sound, and Henry Silek, Linfield.

Futurity, Matron Entries Close Soon

NEW YORK, Dec. 19. (AP)—Nominations for the 1932 running of two of the richest produce stakes in racing, the Futurity and the Matron stakes, will close on January 2. Both events are run at Belmont Park. Horses must be nominated before that date for their produce to be eligible for the two big races two years later.

The Futurity, which will have its 43rd running in 1932, had a gross purse of over \$130,000 this year, of which \$105,750 went to the winner, Whitchone. The Matron is expected to gross about \$30,000. The Futurity is open to both colts and fillies, with geldings ineligible, while the Matron is restricted to fillies.

Karasick Awarded Dubious Decision

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 19. (AP)—Al Karasick, heavy-weight Russian wrestler, was awarded a decision here last night over Harry Demetral, his Greek opponent, under conditions unique in the annals of the mat game. Each had won a fall, and each went after the deciding split with more determination than discretion, with the result that both were knocked cold when they hit the mat.

Karasick was on top, however, so the referee counted Demetral out and awarded the Russian the match. The official's decision was made before either of the contestants recovered consciousness.

Fighter Runner-up In Necktie Race

Paulino Uzcudun, the "Pyrenees Woodchopper," is the first serious contender of Babe Ruth for the necktie championship that I have met. The "Basque Battler" tells me he has over nine hundred neckties in his collection.

That goes for Christmas ties and all.

Helme Zimmerman, the old Giant third baseman, always bought his ties off the neck of the other fellow. He thought this practice gave him base hits.

Greenleaf Beats Rudolph; Playoff Scheduled Tonight

DETROIT, Dec. 19. (AP)—Erwin Rudolph and Ralph Greenleaf will play off the tonight for the world's pocket billiards championship. Greenleaf defeated Rudolph by 125 to 79 in ten innings last night. Each has six victories and one defeat in the tournament.

Greenleaf Superior
Greenleaf was the superior to Rudolph under the severe strain. He broke away with a run of 59 in the third inning, but this advantage soon was cut down when Rudolph replied with 54 in his half. A duel of safety followed with a few scratches thrown in. Rudolph began to feel the strain, and three times during the match he missed on easy shots. Greenleaf, on the other hand, was confident and careful. He played with plenty of skill and self-assurance.

Runs 80
During that run of 59 it seemed certain that Greenleaf was going to run out the game, and that the final score would be 125 to 8. On his 90th shot, with the seven ball in the corner at the foot of the table, he overshot the ball in an effort to get position for the break on the 13. He got the position, but missed the seven.

Rudolph Runs 64
Rudolph made the 13, then ran down and got fine position behind the seven. He pocketed the ball and his cue ball ricocheted up the table, crashed into the bunch, and he was off on his run that terminated at 64 when he failed on an easy shot in the side. It was a mix just as easy on the seven ball in the second inning that halted Rudolph after running eight.

Rudolph had two chances near the finish, but failed on easy efforts.

Fulton Trying to Stage Comeback

ST. PAUL, Minn., Dec. 19. (AP)—Fred Fulton, who was fighting in the heavyweight division during Jess Willard's regime as champion, is training for a comeback attempt.

"The Minnesota Plasterer," harried by the Minnesota state boxing commission several years ago, has been reinstated to good standing and is preparing himself to try again.

Petrone Escapes KO at Hands of Kid Chocolate

NEW YORK, Dec. 19. (AP)—Kid Chocolate, dusky Cuban featherweight, now can go back home for Christmas with the knowledge that he has met and overcome his strongest opponent since he disposed of Al Singer last spring. He also has attracted some 20,000 fans as contributors to the Christmas fund of the Fifth Avenue boys association.

The Cuban kept some stiff opposition from Dominic Petrone of New York, the biggest and toughest opponent he has encountered in some time last night. But after a few rounds he came through to add one more triumph to his long list.

Petrone, with a three pound weight advantage and a couple of inches in reach, battled Chocolate to a standstill through the first two round battle at the Coliseum last night but wilted under the Kid's merciless hammering and escaped a knockout by a slim margin. Only his stout heart kept him from going down in the closing rounds when Chocolate hit him almost as he pleaded "I'm a good back" and dared Petrone to try to hit his face.
