

Stockmen's Condition Aided By Effective Co-Operation

According to the annual report of County Agricultural Agent C. A. Henderson for December 1, 1929, to December 1, 1929, the Southern Oregon Livestock association was organized this year, covering Klamath county, a part of Lake county and a part of Modoc county, California. A total of 50,000 head of cattle is represented by members of the association. This organization was formed in order to combat cattle stealing, and to secure the necessary legislation to accomplish it.

Halts Stealing

The association has taken an active part in providing protection service, and has been instrumental in securing several convictions. The association also took an active part in anthrax control in the Fort Klamath district by co-operating with the State Livestock Sanitary board in enforcement of quarantine regulations, preventing the movement of stock from infected property to other districts in the county. The county agent acted as secretary throughout the year.

Upon request of the local association.

County Agent Henderson attended the annual meeting of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association at Baker, and took part in the program.

Helps Marketing

Assistance has been rendered the Western Cattle Marketing association in arranging local meetings of members. Approximately one-third of the beef produced in Klamath county is marketed through this organization.

General assistance has been rendered in such problems as disease control, securing blackleg vaccination, and other vaccines, as well as assisting in the location of pastures, etc.

Services have been rendered to the sheepmen, too, in the movement of predatory animal hunters to those ranches where loss was experienced, and in the providing of poison and poisoning information where trapper assistance could not be given.

Saving to Sheepmen

Hemorrhagic septicemia vaccine was secured when this disease made its appearance, resulting in some saving to the sheep-

men. In several cases post mortem examinations were made and reports made to the veterinary department, Oregon State college, with the request for advice on control measures. Loss through a combination of hemorrhagic septicemia and pneumonia was rather severe in several bunches of lambs that were brought into Klamath county from the Willamette valley.

Meetings of the Klamath Wool Growers association were attended, the county agent taking part in the program.

Arrangements were also made for a representative of the Pacific Co-operative Wool Growers' association to attend a meeting and discuss wool marketing. Some assistance was rendered this representative in meeting various local sheepmen, in order to explain operations of this association.

Treat Hogs for Cholera

No regular hog projects were carried during the season, but considerable information was required relative to feeding and disease control. Reports of hog cholera were made at this office, all cases being immediately vaccinated by the county veterinarian.

Most of the extension work carried on in the general livestock problems was in the nature of service and assistance, rather than project work. In some cases small

pasture demonstrations have been carried on in the livestock country in order to improve existing pasture, but to date no definite recommendations can be made relative to this matter.

These baskets will contain not only staple food-stuffs, and the basis for a wholesome Christmas meal, but candles, fruits and other delicacies of the season.

Then there is the event which all the kiddies of the city look forward to each year. This year it is the Elks who are putting on the community Christmas tree, which will be conducted on Christmas eve in front of the Elks temple at promptly 7:30, at which time Santa Claus will arrive and distribute candies and goodies among approximately 4,000 children.

At the same time other similar organizations in the city are pushing forward toward their plans for aiding the poor of the city. Some of the foremost workers of the city are doing their charitable deeds quietly, and with no outward display of charity.

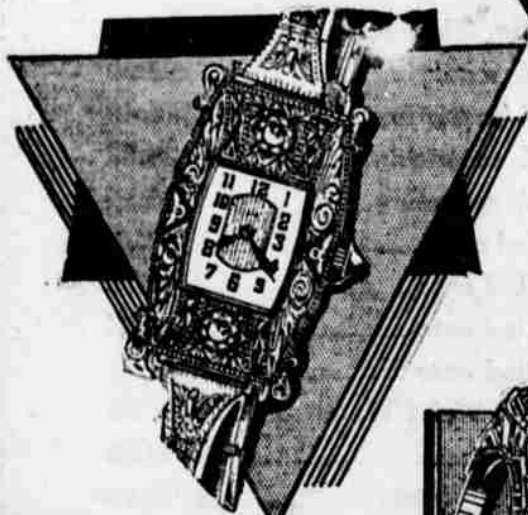

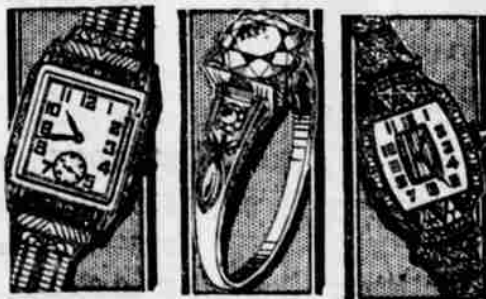
