LINEUPS FOR SHRINE GAME ARE IMPOSING

East-West All Star Classic Includes Country's Best.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21. (AP)—First indications of what the line-ups of Eastern and Western all-star teams will be in the annual Shrine hospital benefit classic here New Year's day began to appear today as both teams settled down to intensive practice for the battle in which many famous gridiron heroes of the 1929 season will play.

The information regarding positions at which the stars will play was obtained by observers at workouts of both teams, but it was a fact that before the big game takes place, many changes and various combinations may be made before definite line-ups are established.

Hunting West's Kicker.
Fanny Hunting of Gonzaga, a noted kicker, may open for the West. It was indicated, while Frosty Peters of Illinois, the man who nearly displaced "Red" Grange, may carry the burden for the East. Hunting made the best showing as a punter in yesterday's practice session of the western team. Peters, noted as one of the craftiest field generals in the game, is a neat drop kicker.

It was December 21, 1891, that Naismith, then a young instructor in the Springfield, Mass., school training directors, announced he had perfected the new game to meet demands for a fast indoor team sport. Dr. Naismith has been professor of physical education at the university of Kansas for the last 30 years.

Woman's Scream Saves Her Life


SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21. (AP)—An involuntary scream when she struck the cold waters of the bay off Pier 14, prevented Mrs. Helene Yall, 28-year-old wife of a Sacramento dentist, from committing suicide last night. The scream sent W. L. Davis, sailor aboard the U. S. S. Unadilla, plunging into the water after her. He brought her ashore and called an ambulance.

She said she was estranged from her husband, and that a divorce decree is pending. When it is granted, she declared her husband plans to marry her own sister. BASS SCORES KNOCKOUT IN SECOND ROUND

Boxing Commission Will Withhold Pay Pending Investigation.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21. (AP)—Tod Morgan has relinquished his junior lightweight championship but whether to his conqueror, Benny Bass, or not, awaits the decision of an official inquiry by the New York state athletic commission.

Bass, the pile-driving puncher from Philadelphia, knocked out Morgan in the second round of their 15 round titular bout in Madison Square Garden and apparently had succeeded to the 130-pound crown beyond a doubt. A few minutes after the knockout, however, Chairman James A. Farley of the state commission, ordered the purses of both fighters withheld pending an investigation to be begun by the commission on Tuesday. Bass and Morgan, with their managers, were ordered to appear before the commissioners at that time. Farley indicated that he did not believe the bout had been fought on its merits.
