Coast Steamship Grounded in River
PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., Dec. 21 (AP)—The coastwise steamship Cardena was reported grounded last night for the second time in recent weeks off the mouth of Skeena river. The ship struck near the Balmoral cannery, across the river from where she ran aground a few weeks ago. The vessel was on her first voyage north from Vancouver after being repaired following her first mishap. The ship was reported waiting for high tide in hope that she could float free and was apparently in no danger. The Cardena is operated on the coast run north from Vancouver and carries passengers and freight.

Reforestation Law Meets With Favor
PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21, (AP)—E. J. Eberley, former deputy forester, now in charge of application of Oregon's new reforestation law, said today forest land owners and county officials are reacting with uniform favor to the new legislative act. Preliminary classification of Oregon's land, Eberley said, also indicates that the law is fair to both the timbermen, and the public, although in many instances considerable explaining was necessary before few were able to understand it. "The principle of the law," Eberley said, "is to make the forest land contribute to public expense in proportion to the yield of the forest crop. Being new in nature there are innumerable questions arising in addition to the preliminary classification work that has been done in three counties."
