AT THE PELICAN A spectacular outdoor action scene in which 300 head of bellowing cattle swim across the swirling current of the Stanislaus River in California is one of the big features of "The Virginian," which comes to the Pelican Theatre the first half of the week. The action scene represents a new chapter in talking picture history. It is the first time such a spectacle has ever been recorded on films.

The crossing was made at Byrne's Ferry, twenty miles from Sonora, mining town in California's "Mother Lode." Seven cameras and a battery of microphones recorded the action and sound. When the mechanical and electrical equipment had been installed at vantage points along the river bank, a group of cowboys, responding to a signal from Victor Fleming, the director, stampeded the protesting cattle into the swift stream. The herd milled and turned, eventually striking out for the far shore. The swift current carried most of the heaves and the mounted riders 200 yards downstream before the objective was reached.

All the sounds of this stirring tumult were recorded precisely by the sound laboratories set up some 300 yards from the "mikes." "The Virginian," is the first outdoor classic in sound and dialog. Gary Cooper is cast in the title role, his first full-dialog part. Walter Huston, featured lead of "Gentlemen of the Press," is seen and heard as Trampas, the villain Richard Arlen is Steve, the wayward cow-puncher, and Mary Brian is Molly Wood, the winsome school-ma'am.

"The Virginian," a novel of the 50s, gained quick fame as the greatest American novel ever published and to this day it is held to be one of the great classics of literature. It brought universal renown to its author, Owen Wister. A few years later Wister and Kirk La Slette transcribed the book into a play of the same name. The play became as famous as the novel. Dustin Farnum created the role of the Virginian on the stage and since that time other actors have achieved correspondingly widespread fame in the same role.

The handsome Gary Cooper, with his winning drawl and tall, rangy physique is admirably cast as the hero. Huston is sensational as the villain. It is a triumph of talking pictures that such remarkable talent can be brought to show-goers in two dimensions—"see" and "hear."

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Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Dec. 21. (AP)—Coming somewhat in the nature of a Christmas present, prices for veal, pork, butter and flour have declined, while poultry values remain steady at current quotations, which, in turn, are lower than those quoted for Thanksgiving.

Veal was 1c cheaper at 16@17c and pork 1c off at 14@14 1/2c. Butter and butterfat prices dropped a full cent. Family flours went down 20c a barrel in keeping with the decline in wheat.

Turkey prices are doubtful because shipments from eastern Oregon have been held up by the weather. The No. 1 grade is quoted at 23@30c, buying prices, which are 2c or more below the prices at Thanksgiving. As a whole, no advance is expected.
