ARMY'S SQUAD RESTED AFTER LONG JOURNEY

Drill Starts Today In Preparation for Big Battle Saturday.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. Dec. 23, (AP)—The Army's football warriors, refreshed after a night's sleep in Branner Hall, were expected to start intensive practice today for their inter-sectional game next Saturday with Stanford's Cardinals, who finished in a tie for the 1929 Pacific coast conference championship.

Nine hours behind schedule, the Army train of thirteen cars, pulled into Palo Alto last night. Cadets and coaches, apparently benefitted by a two-hour workout at Santa Barbara yesterday after their long trip across the continent, were housed in Branner Hall which they will occupy until the game Saturday.

Use Stadium For Drill

The West Pointers will probably use Stanford stadium, largest in the far west, while Stanford will practice on its regular field. Arrangements were to be worked out between Coach Lawrence "Bluff" Jones and Glenn "Pop" Warner, Cardinal mentor, today. Meanwhile Jones let it be known that the Army workouts would be strictly private.

Practice Secret
Cameras and reporters will be barred, Jones said and other outsiders will find no welcome during the week of intensive practice. It is no secret that the Army wants to win Saturday's game and turn the tables on the team that meted out a 27 to 6 defeat to the West Pointers in New York last year. With this determination, Jones is guarding against anything that might interfere with preparations.

The Army squad will work out one day this week with the eastern members of the East-West teams which meet in Kassar stadium New Year's day in the annual Shrine charity game.

Stanford Working
Meanwhile, the Stanford varsity is picking up loose ends dropped since its last game—the contest with the California Bears which they won a month ago.

Pop Warner had his third team using Army plays against the first string yesterday. Dusty Allen, impersonating Red Cagle, directed the attack and took a fierce hammering from Preston and Muller, first team ends. The varsity was composed of the same team that started against California, with one exception. Wah Heinicke, Cardinal center, was in a Palo Alto hospital with a cold and his position was filled by Perry Taylor. Heinicke will be out in a few days and Warner said he would surely start against the Cadets.

Falcero Champion Individual Bowler

NEW YORK, Dec. 23, (AP)—Joe Falcero, of New York is the new world's individual bowling champion. He won the title from Joe Scribner of Detroit in a special six block—60 games—match completed here last night. Falcero won by 129 pins, compiling a grand total of 12,923 to 12,803 for Scribner.

Scribner held a lead of 158 pins at the end of the first three blocks, played in Detroit. Falcero shaved this to 38 in the fourth block here on Saturday, took a lead of 167 in the fourth block and then clung to his advantage in the final block. The grand averages were: Falcero 215 32-50; Scribner 213 23-50.

Connie Mack Not To Retire Until Age Forces Him

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 23, (AP)—Connie Mack, hale and hearty, was receiving congratulations today on his 67th birthday. The veteran manager of the world's champion Philadelphia Athletics said that so far as he was concerned it was just another birthday and was without significance.

For 28 years he has been head of the Mackmen. When he began managing them William McKimley was president of the United States; Jim Jeffries was heavyweight champion of the world; Al Simmons wasn't born and ladies thanked gentlemen for the buggy ride. Since then he has won seven league championships and four world series.

"When am I going to retire? Not until I am forced to quit. This is my life—baseball. I'm going to stay in it until I am physically unable to continue."

George Siler, the famous old referee, once gave a decision in points to a fighter who was knocked out colder than a polar bear's nose.

It was one of those six round affairs between a white boy and a local negro and up to the end of the final round the white boxer had all the better of the milling. He had jabbed and hooked his black opponent to apparent helplessness and out-pointed him hopelessly in every round.

Toward the end of the sixth round he grew a little careless and just as the bell sounded the finish of the fight, the black boy started one from the floor and hit him right on the button. He fell flat as a mackerel, completely out.

Siler never hesitated, but picked up the fallen boy's hand in signal of victory.

It almost started a riot, but he was absolutely right. The fight was technically over before the knockout occurred and the white boy had piled up a commanding lead, but it took plenty of "intestinal fortitude" to make the decision.

Football specialists, watching the two squads at practice on their respective training grounds, were amazed at the speed and ease with which players gathered from every section of the country were able to perform intricate plays with the dispatch of veterans who had played together for months. It simply gave proof of the fact that with plenty of good material, a coach has no trouble turning out a team with a winning punch.

Both East and West squads yesterday engaged in light workouts. Meanwhile the western outfit has brought to its complete quota with the arrival of Tommy Churchill, brilliant Oklahoma end, who came to San Francisco by airplane and was given a warm reception by Coach Percy Lacey and his pack.

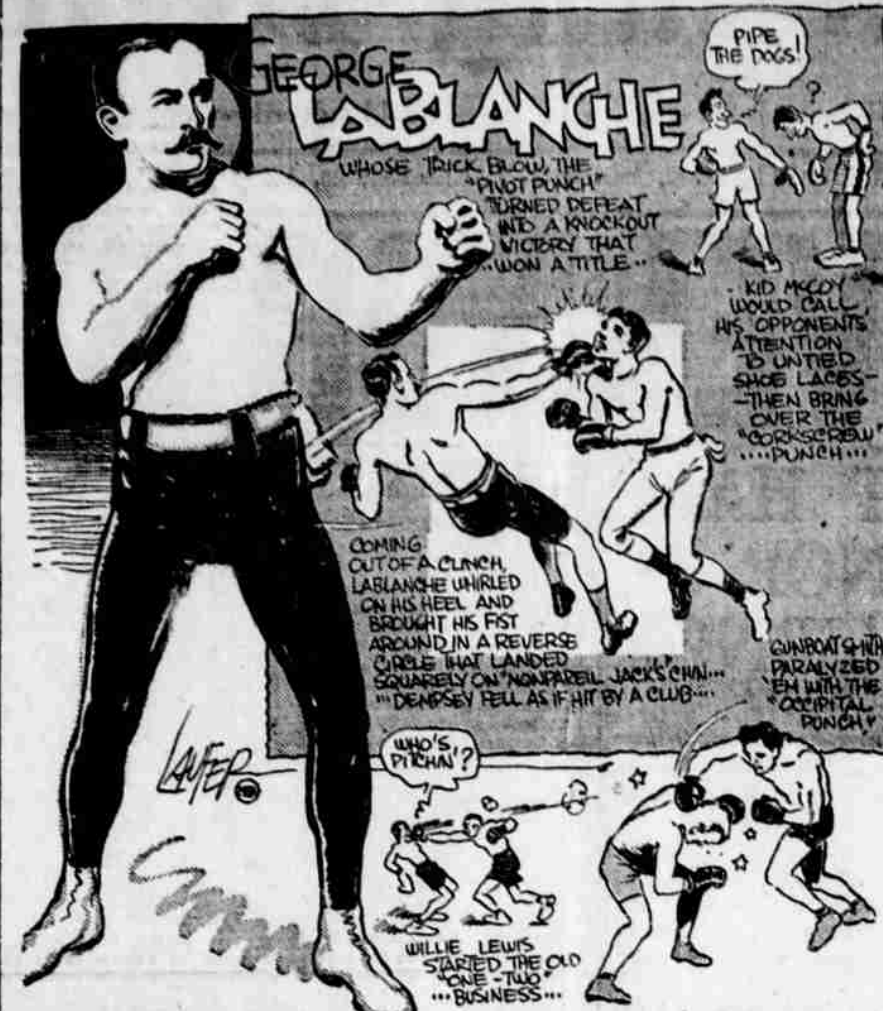

CHICAGO, Dec. 23, (AP)—Promoter Jack Dempsey is busy hunting a main bout for January 17 to replace the welterweight title fight between Jackie Fields, champion, and Young Jack Thompson, San Francisco negro, which has been moved to Madison Square Garden for January 3.

Dempsey abandoned plans for the championship affair because of feeling against "mixed" title bouts in Illinois, after signing the pair early this month for the Chicago coliseum. He is working on a match between Kid Chocolate, sensational featherweight, and a suitable opponent.

Chinese Steamer Swamped by Waves

HONG KONG, China, Dec. 23, (AP)—The Chinese steamer Lee Cheong with her Chinese officers and crew of 250 Chinese passengers, including many women and children, sank late Saturday night with practically all on board.

The vessel was caught in a violent storm shortly after leaving Swaboo Saturday afternoon for Hong Kong and went down at midnight swamped by huge waves.

Two seamen clinging to wreckage were picked up yesterday and brought here.

Crew Injured In Head-on Collision

GORHAM, Kas., Dec. 23, (AP)—Five persons were injured, several of them seriously, when two Union Pacific passenger trains collided a mile east of here this morning. All of the injured were reported to be trainmen, no passengers being hurt. The injured were removed to Hays, Kas.

The collision occurred at a siding, near an oil refinery, the locomotives of passenger train No. 125, eastbound, and passenger train No. 121, westbound, striking head-on. Both trains operate between Kansas City and Denver.

FREIGHTS CRASH

PEORIA, Ill., Dec. 23, (AP)—Two Toledo, Peoria & Western freight trains crashed head-on near the station at Forrest, between Peoria and the Indiana state line at 10 a. m. today. Crews of both trains were pinned beneath them and a rescue corps is fighting its way through the snow drifts from Peoria with acetylene torches to free them.

Warns People Of Christmas Fire Hazards

In order that Christmas may be truly "Merry Christmas" and that no tragedies from fire may mark the holidays, Keith K. Ambrose, fire and police chief, has issued a warning to all to be careful of fire during the decorating for Christmas.

"Wax, inflammable candles should not be placed on Christmas trees, nor should highly inflammable material be used in Christmas decorations," the chief warned.

He also advised against placing trees or decorations too close to open fires or hot stoves, and asked that trees be taken down before they become too dry.
