HEINECKE MAY NOT START IN CARDS' LINEUP

Famous Center Unable To Drill Because Of Bad Cold.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Dec. 24. (AP)—A light setting up drill in the morning and a brisk scrimmage against a plebe eleven equipped with Stanford players were on tap for the West Point Army team today, as the cadets swept into the final stretch of their preparations for the Stanford contest next Saturday.

Teams Go Easy. Less intensive workouts were scheduled for Pop Warner's Cardinals and the Shrine all-star team, both of whom are recovering from the effects of a hard-fought scrimmage yesterday that resulted in a knee injury to Tommy Dowler, Colgate fullback and one of the eastern mainstays.

Heinecke Has Cold. Warner indicated that his starting lineup for the Army contest would be the same as that which took the field against California, with the possible exception of Walt Heinecke at center. The stocky Cardinal pivot man contracted a severe cold, and it is doubtful if he will see much action against the Cadets. If he is unable to start, his place will be taken by Perry Taylor. The remainder of the Stanford team will find Capt. Muller and Preston at ends; Tandy and Thompson at tackles; Bardin and Driscoll, guards; Fleishacker, quarter; Rothert and Frentrup, halfbacks; and Smalling, fullback.

Thought It Was Holland. The West Point team, in jovial spirits, is circulating a story concerning Carl Carlmark, special string left end. As the special train that brought the Cadets west came up from Los Angeles, it passed through San Bernardino, whose vicinity is dotted with oil derricks. Klamath Falls Man Finishes Varsity Career

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 24. (Special)—Roger Montgomery of Klamath Falls wound up his collegiate football career this fall after earning three varsity letters. He is one of 16 lost to the squad. Montgomery played quarterback alternating with Ralph Buecke and Bryce Nozler. He played in Oregon State's big intercollegiate game with Detroit University at Detroit last month when the Orangemen brought home the bacon to the tune of 14 to 7. It was the Titans first defeat in 22 games.

Oregon State football men go to Chicago next Thanksgiving to play West Virginia in another big intercollegiate game. This game to be played on Soldier's field, is a benefit game sponsored by the Shriners. It is the first of a series of 10 such games sponsored for the benefit of the Shriners' hospitals for crippled children.

Oregon State conference schedule for next fall stands as follows: October 4 Southern California at Los Angeles; October 18, Stanford at Palo Alto; October 21, Washington State at Portland; November 15 University of Oregon at Corvallis; and November 22 U. C. L. A. at Los Angeles.

PANTHER MAY EMPLOY POWER HOUSE TACTICS

Jones Prepares Trojans For Famous "Pop" Warner Play.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 24. (A. P.)—Formation "B," that famous brain child of Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner, looms as a threat to the University of Southern California Trojans must deal with when they clash with the Panthers of Pittsburgh in the annual Tournament of Roses at Pasadena, New Year's day.

Jones Prepared. Will Coach John "Jack" Sutherland employ the system of two wing halfbacks in his offense against the men of Troy? Coach Howard Jones seems to think so, for he is priming his defense in anticipation of the formation.

Today he plans more detailed instruction to his players in the matter of frustrating the plot of the Golden Panthers to make consistent yardage by their power house tactics. Yesterday the U. S. C. varsity spent more than two hours on the basic principles of this attack.

Trojans Rest Tomorrow. Christmas will be a holiday in the Trojan camp—a sort of calm before the storm of intensive training which will mark the usual work of preparation to defend the western honors in the annual east-west classic.

With the powerful Pitt line before him, under the formation "B," Tom Parkinson, the battering ram fullback of the Panthers, is expected to do much in the way of progressing toward the Southern California goal, since he will probably play close to the line of scrimmage.

This leaves Eddie Baker, quarterback, free for passing, fakes, or "what have you, and permits Octavius Umana, from his left half position to run the ends. The Southern California staff is apparently satisfied with its own offensive, for as yet nothing more than short snappy signal drill has featured workouts.

"Hun" Anderson To Coach Line At Washington

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 24. (AP)—Heartier "Hun" Anderson will probably be the line coach for the University of Washington's football team next year. Anderson indicated as much yesterday before he left for South Bend for the holidays and after a talk with Jimmy Phelan, Purdue mentor, who goes to the west coast school as head coach.

Anderson was offered an \$8,400 contract to return to St. Louis university for the third year as head football coach but he said last night that Phelan's tender "nearly took me off my feet. It was so much better than I expected. I can get more money coaching the line at Washington than I can here as head coach and without the worry and responsibility."

Anderson expects to talk to Phelan again in January and sign a contract then, he said.

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FOOTBALL NOT MAIN FACTOR WITH SHIELDS

Big Guard to Remain at Oregon and Obtain Sheepskin.

SEATTLE, Dec. 24. (AP)—Marshall Shields, one of the finest guards on the Pacific coast, intends to complete his education at the University of Oregon despite the fact that he has been ruled ineligible for further competition by the faculty committee of the Pacific coast conference.

Shields plans to make football his profession and will continue to study the game from the sidelines. He is a major in the school of physical education and had hoped for another year of playing which would aid him in obtaining a coaching position. He still has hope of being reinstated, citing instances of the past when Butch Meeker, Washington State college quarterback and Moose Garrity, California back, were given special dispensations.

Shields was declared ineligible after he had transferred back to Oregon from Ashland Normal, a junior college.

Cougar Cage Completed. The Washington State college Cougar will move into its new cage at Pullman after the Christmas vacation.

Finishing touches are being put on the latest unit of the Washington State campus, the new \$150,000 field house, and it will be ready for spring track practice next month.

The football squad initiated the new building by using it for several last-minute workouts before leaving for Hawaii. Students are calling the structure, "the Cougar's new cage."

The project was financed entirely by the students. The building is 327 by 137 feet.

Rum Runners Use "Ghost Walking" Trick on River

DETROIT, Dec. 24. (AP)—Ghosts are walking once more on the Detroit river.

Customs officers reported today that down river rum runners are resorting to "ghost walking" tactics. This discovery was made yesterday on Beau-bien bay, off Ecorse, when a sled loaded with 10 cases of liquor was seized.

"Ghost walking" consists of covering oneself and one's sled with a sheet and then setting out for the American shore. Against the ice and snow the white robed cargo is practically invisible. Yesterday customs officers heard some one

walking on the ice off Ecorse. They investigated and found the sled, footprints and other markings in the snow which told of the fact that the rum runner had fled, trailing his sheets behind him.
