McKENZIE NOT BOATING RIVER

State Does Not Own Islands in Stream According to Findings Of Attorney General

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28, (AP)

McKenzie river is not a navigable stream according to the exact definition of the word and, therefore, the state does not own title to an island in the river, located in Lane county and which certain individuals wish to acquire, according to an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle. The opinion was written in reply to an inquiry by George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board, of whom inquiry was made by Judge L. T. Harris of Eugene in behalf of clients. The opinion states that the middle line of a non-navigable river is the boundary of a riparian owner's land.

In the absence of a court ruling relative to the McKenzie river in particular the attorney general adds: "If, however, the persons wishing to purchase the same are of opinion that the state is, or may be the owner, and wish to purchase the island from the state, taking their chances of thus acquiring title, I know of no reason why the state land board cannot, in its discretion, sell the same. In any event the state does not warrant the title to the land which it conveys."
