MEDFORD TRIO TORTURE MAN

Apply Blow Torch to Feet In Effort to Extort Money.

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 28. (AP)—Accused of torture and brutality in an unsuccessful attempt to wrest money from an elderly second-hand dealer here, Jack Donovan, 39, his wife, both of Medford, and A. E. Johnson, of Jacksonville, were in jail today. The three are accused of having applied the searing white-hot blast from a blow-torch to the soles of the feet of Pat Bohan, until the old man fainted. The Donovans had lived with Bohan during their three-month residence in Medford, and became convinced, police said, that he had a considerable amount of money hidden in his house.

Holds Up Cafe
Police say that an hour after torturing Bohan, Donovan entered a cafe, ordered coffee, held up the place and robbed a salesman of \$5. Two blocks away Donovan held up Thomas Robinson, a policeman, and told him to "beat it." At that moment another patrolman arrived and as Donovan turned his head Robinson struck him, knocking him down.

From the sidewalk Donovan began shooting and the officers returned the fire. Five nearby windows were broken but none of the combatants injured.

HUNTING VICTIM
ESTILL, S. C., Dec. 28. (AP)—John C. Easley of Richmond, Va., vice president of the Southern Bond and Mortgage company and the Title Insurance company, was shot and killed accidentally yesterday on a deer hunt by the son of his host.

Mrs. Charles A. Harper, said that her sixteen-year-old son William, fired the fatal shot. Easley was 67.

Survey of Upper Columbia Ordered
PORTLAND, Dec. 28. (AP)—A complete survey of the upper Columbia and Snake rivers with a view to determining whether or not navigation of the streams is practical, has been ordered by the port of Portland commission in conjunction with the United States army engineers. Particular study of the type of boats best suited to use on the two rivers will be a part of the work. The survey will extend eastward as far as Lewiston, Idaho.

Consideration is being given the stern-wheel type of river steamboat and it is possible one of these craft might be sent up the river that observers might note its progress through the rapids.

DUSTING THE MINES
LONDON—Vacuum sweepers of the type used by housewives are being used in coal mines in England. Big brawny miners can be seen shoving a sweeper across the floor of the mine frequently. The cleaners collect the coal dust which settles everywhere and this is used as fuel. This sweeping also eliminates to some extent the danger of mine explosions.

Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Dec. 28. (AP)—Prices of veal and the lighter hams have advanced slightly. Veal is 1c higher at 18c and light hams are most unobtainable at 30c.

Egg and butter prices were unchanged.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the United States department of agriculture says: "With retailers, the probable consumers still fairly well-stocked with leftover Christmas supplies, little fruit and vegetable activity is expected on the wholesale market."

"Liberal volume of storage stocks of apples are reported at Willamette valley points. These stocks, including intermediate varieties as homes and Delicous, are showing considerable maturity and are being offered freely on the market now, mostly in faced-and-filled packs. This movement will probably continue with fair activity until the middle of January. After that date, a more stable apple market (from the jobbers' and wholesalers' standpoint) is expected, with offerings limited to well graded, late storage stocks. Notwithstanding this year's light apple crop, storage holdings in the Yakima and Wenatchee valleys is as heavy now, as at this time last year, when production was much heavier. This is due to increased storage capacity at shipping points; each year witnessing construction of new storage space. Thus, apple storage stocks are still largely in the northwest, rather than at eastern storage points, this year."

"Cauliflower harvest continues; with 40 to 50 cars of Oregon celery in storage locally, several cars of California stock have been unloaded here recently; this being necessary on account of the generally poor quality of local stocks. Fresh California arrivals are distinctly superior to storage holdings."
