Mrs. Walker, mother of Mrs. Arthur Leavitt, is spending several days here from her home at Redding, Calif. She plans to remain until after New Year's.

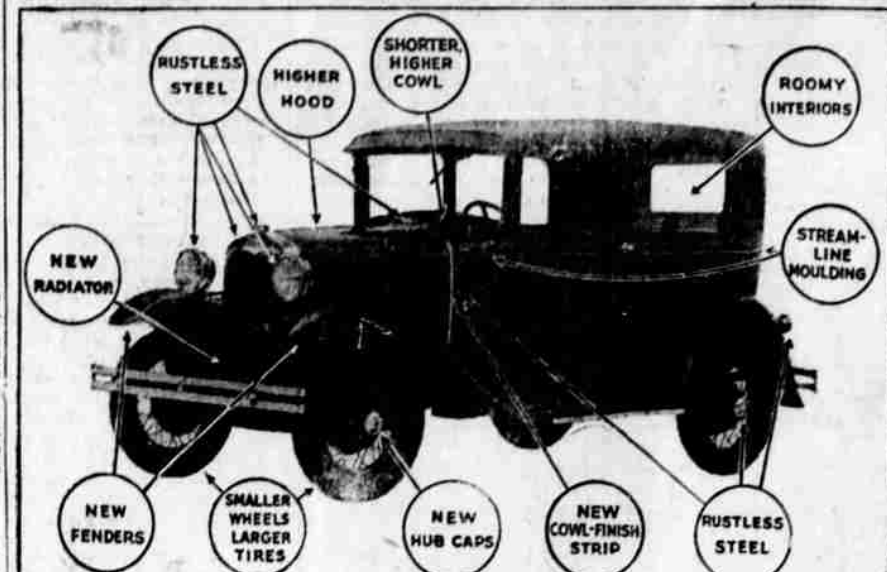
