Oakland-Pontiac Managers Optimistic For Coming Year

Optimism for the coming year was the keynote of addresses made by the officials of the Oakland Motor Car company at a convention of dealers and factory representatives held in the Masonic temple at Portland last Saturday. The meeting was called by G. R. Jones, zone sales manager, and was conducted by a special factory delegation headed by H. E. Mahaffey, western sales manager, and L. M. Dreves, Pacific Coast regional manager. Edward Lyons, factory mechanical expert, was also one of the speakers.

"In approaching our sales program for next year we have every reason to believe that 1930 will prove a good period for business. Industrial and economic authorities assure us that general conditions are sound; agriculture is in a healthy state, and there is no reason whatever to fear a depression. "We are making no rash predictions regarding increases in automobile sales next year, but intend to manufacture according to the retail demand as reflected by our dealers' forecasts. There will be no crowding or forcing of cars on dealers; if they are overloaded at any time it will be for the reason that they have ordered more cars than they can well handle. "However, since we realize that factory sales will be limited only by retail sales, we expect to give our dealers more help than they have ever received from us in the past in the actual soliciting and promotion of retail sales."
