

WEST HUMBLES EAST AT ROSE BOWL CLASSIC

Brilliant Passing Offensive of Trojans Baffles Pitt Panthers, Whose Four All-American Players Are Unable to Deliver Expected Threat. Game Second Won by Trojans at Tournament.

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 2 (AP)—Burdened with a decisive 47 to 14 trouncing handed them as a New Year's day greeting from the mighty Trojans of the University of Southern California, Pittsburgh's grid squad today prepared a return to its native heather, victim of the most decisive defeat ever meted out in the fourteen years of tournament of roses competition, and their first defeat of the season.

Beginning with the initial touchdown, which came only a few moments after the 70,000 persons had filled the stadium, the men of Troy found scoring possible in four of their seven tallies because of unerring aerial work. A fifth counter was indirectly the result of a long pass and the others were the result of plunging, driving football.

The Trojans left no element of doubt, no possible out for their opponents. The uncomfortably warm weather, which was expected to cut the invaders down after a period or so of play, was left with the task of finishing what Coach Jones men had started.

Pitt Defense Shattered
The Panthers, with a quartet of all-Americans in the lineup, saw the glory of individual performance stolen from them by a group of U. S. C. gridsters who shattered the famed Pitt defense with abandon.

Toby Uansa, one of these all-American selections, opened the conflict with a dazzling 68 yard end run on the first play following the opening kickoff, but fleet Russell Saunders, U. S. C. safety man, cut him down from behind 15 yards short of the goal.

Then, when the Panthers had failed to crack the Trojan line for the necessary yards, the touchdown parade for the Pacific coast representatives started. Saunders' pass to Harry Edelson caught the Pitt secondary defense flat footed and the Troy halfback scored U. S. C.'s first touchdown.

Satisfied with their aerial thrusts, the Trojans reverted to straight football, with Marshall Duffield skirting the Panther end for touchdowns.

Panthers Score Twice
Trailing 26 to 0 as they went the second half, the Panthers mustered a rally, going to the air for a pair of touchdowns. Uansa's pass to Bill Wallinichus and Harold Williams flip to Paul Collins, two of the four completed tosses out of the 19 attempts, were responsible for the eastern eleven's points. These came in the third and fourth periods.

Figures tell the story of a complete rout. The determined U. S. C. combination turned in 454 yards compared with 295 for Pittsburgh. Thanks to Uansa's startling 68 yard run, the team from the smoky city held the edge in yardage from scrimmage with a 199 total against 167 for the men of Troy.

It was the passing attack which wrote Pittsburgh's doom. Southern California completed half of its sixteen attempts for 257 yards, while a quartet of Pitt's efforts netted 37 yards. The invaders were outdistanced 14 to 10 and outplayed 46 yards to 37.

Second For Trojans
The victory of the Trojans was their second in tournament of roses play. In 1923 U. S. C. handed Penn State a 14 to 3 beating.

Credit Saunders and his substitute Duffield, with the burden of the Trojan scoring thrusts, and mark the superb work of Francis Tappan and Garrett Arbelbide for the defensive play which saw Uansa turned back time and again without the yardage which had made him an all-American.

Coach Jones poured his reserves into the fray in its dying moments, long after the Panther hopes had been dashed into oblivion and the shadows of evening were enveloping the field. When the final gun sounded, the Trojan bench had been cleaned of its second, third and even fourth team members.

WINS ON FOUL
SALEM, Jan. 2 (AP)—Art Akers, 135, won on a foul in the fourth round of a scheduled ten-round main event from Jack Kentworth, 136, here last night. Both fighters are Salem boys. Kentworth had the best of the going until the fourth round. He was repeatedly warned for hitting low, however.

EAST ALL STAR GANG TROUNCES WESTERN CREW

Gridiron Enthusiasts Singing Praises Of Eastern Stars.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2 (AP)—Western gridiron enthusiasts were singing the praises of Jack Cannon, Notre Dame guard, Glasgow, Iowa halfback, and a host of other eastern performers today as they were recovering from the effects of seeing the all-star west team trounced 19 to 7 here yesterday by the all-star east team.

Triumph Decisive
The decisiveness of the triumph left spectators at the contest gasping on bewildered. The east scored their first touchdown in the opening quarter on a 25-yard pass, added another in the second, and completed their scoring by means of two field goals by Frosty Peters of Illinois.

The west made their lone score in the third quarter, when Sloan of Nebraska crashed through for a touchdown after a march down the field.

Cannon Spectacular
Cannon undoubtedly played the most spectacular game of his colorful gridiron career. The 50,000 spectators hailed him as one of the greatest of all guards to put in an appearance in this section.

It was the second consecutive defeat for the west in the annual Shrine classic. Last year's contest also was won by the east with a score of 20 to 6.

Attack Broke Early
The west's attack in yesterday's game was broken early when the eastern squad unleashed an offensive led by the charging "Bronko" Nagurski of Minnesota, who covered most of the territory. Hal Booma of Dartmouth boomed the stock of the easterners when he went over for the first touchdown. The second touchdown was scored by Glasgow.

Hansen Revenges Recent Knockout

PORTLAND, Jan. 2 (AP)—Charles Hansen, Nebraska, took revenge on Howard Cantonwine, Iowa, here last night, when he spilled the Iowa grappler two straight falls in a vicious match.

Hansen knocked Cantonwine cold after one hour and eleven minutes of wrestling to take the first fall with a body hold and head-first slam to the mat. Cantonwine had to be carried to his dressing room, and asked an additional five minutes, which Hansen refused. He tottered back in a weakened condition, and Hansen made short work of it with several lusty rabbit punches. In their previous match Hansen was knocked out when thrown from the ring by Cantonwine.

Al Karasick and Tarro Miyake, the Japanese wrestler, went one hour to a draw in the preliminary. Miyake won the first fall in 24 minutes 10 seconds with a Japanese jiu jitsu hammerlock. Karasick took the second fall in 11 minutes with a series of flying reverse headlocks.

Game Commission Views 1929 As Year of Accomplishment

With its work for the year of 1929 at a close the Oregon state game commission can look back upon a record of accomplishment, according to Harold Clifford, state game warden.

"Except for one year—1927—more fines were collected from law violators in 1929 than in any previous like period," said Mr. Clifford, this week. "In 1927 the sum collected from fines totaled \$25,731 and in 1929 it reached \$25,084. Half of this went to the counties in which the fines were levied, this being in accordance with the Oregon statutes.

Plant Larger Fish
"Larger fish were planted in the state's lakes and streams than in any previous year. Many of the millions that were planted were as long as nine inches and the vast majority were well above five inches. It is now the policy of the commission to hold fish in the ponds of hatcheries until they are of sufficient size and length to withstand conditions and protect themselves against fish that would prey upon them. Under the old system we once used of planting fingerlings hundreds of thousands were lost. Now we are running hatcheries to capacity. The holding of fish until they reach a length of six inches or more means that our ponds must be enlarged and this work is going forward as rapidly as finances will permit.

Operated To Capacity
"An average number of game birds were liberated from the state farms. The farms located at Eugene, Corvallis and Pendleton have been operated to capacity.

"We have experienced the most effective year of the department's history in preventing illegal fishing on the Lower Rogue river. Capable wardens have been patrolling the stream in power boats and making it exceedingly unhealthful for law violators. As a result of this work there has been remarkable fishing on the Rogue during the past year.

Hawaii made its only score in the third on a series of end runs and off-tackle plays, converting for an extra point. The visitors made their final touchdown in the last period.

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Thye Wins Eight Round Wrestling Match From Sepp

SEATTLE, Jan. 2 (AP)—Ted Thye of Portland won an eight round wrestling match from August Sepp of Seattle here last night to lay claim to the light heavyweight championship of the world which he formerly held. It was announced before the match that the winner would claim the title which Thye lost to Clarence Ecklund in Australia several years ago, because the latter refused to defend the championship for some time.
