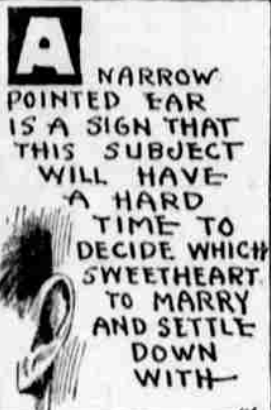

AT THE PELICAN

The likes and dislikes of the nation's millions of football fans were kept uppermost in the mind of John Ford, director of "Salute" at the Pelican theater now, while the screen's first all talking grid-iron picture was in production.

Every precaution was taken to make the West Point-Annapolis game which climaxes the story not only a thrilling affair, but a technically correct one also. The Army team in the picture uses Army formations and the team representing the Navy launches the same plays drilled into midshipmen at Annapolis by Coach Bill Ingram.

Players of national renown comprise the "Army" and "Navy" eleven. The referee, umpire, field judge, timekeeper and linesmen are accredited officials during the college season. Ford and a company of 50 spent six weeks in Annapolis filming scenes in and around the academy, including the football field.

George O'Brien, a former high school and college player, trained two months before work on the picture began that he might look as well as play the part of an all-American West Point halfback. "Almost everyone in America is a football fan today," Ford says, "and everyone is surprisingly well informed on even the smallest details. When these people go to a motion picture theater to hear and see a football game they want enough to satisfy. A few glimpses of two teams in action won't do. They want to see the game start, see its progress, see the tide of battle ebb and flow and be right on hand at the climax."

"I have tried to accomplish this in 'Salute.' Thanks to the story itself, to the players and to the miraculous work of Joe August, chief cameraman, and to the sound experts, I think we have captured something quite out of the ordinary."

In addition to O'Brien, the cast includes Helen Chandler, William Janney, Joyce Compton, Stepin Fetchit, David Butler and several other featured players.
