KLAMATH TO MEET MEDFORD

Quintets To Clash on Gym Floor at High School Saturday Night

Klamath high's basketball team will meet Medford here Saturday night in the first game of the season for the local quintet. Medford was state champion last year and for the past six years have been champions of the southern Oregon conference.

The teams are more evenly matched this year, it is believed. Medford has two lettermen of the last year's team back on the squad and have experienced men from Gold Hill and from Phoenix high schools. Tonight the Medford team will meet the Chiloquin five in Chiloquin.

Grove Is Captain

Klamath has one letterman from last year's team back. He is Richard Robustelli. Virgil Grove, captain of the Klamath team, played on the county league five of Klamath high school last year.

The Klamath high team recently defeated the Kiwanis team which was composed of four members of last year's high school team and another experienced player, 37 to 33.

Team Is Fair

Klamath has a team that is working comparatively smooth for the first part of the season, although the passing is not as good yet as Coach Dwight French wishes it to be.

The game Saturday night will be held in the Klamath high gymnasium.

Bucks Land In Second Place In Puck League

PORTLAND, Jan. 3, (AP)—Portland's steady drive today had carried the Bucks to second place in the standings of the Pacific coast ice hockey league, and within 2 1/2 games of the league-leading Vancouver Lions, 1 to 0 victims in last night's contest.

Old Timer Spills Beans

Vancouver held the fort successfully until exactly 13 minutes and 51 seconds of the third and last period had sped by. At that moment Joe McGoldrick, the old timer of ice hockey in the Pacific Northwest and stellar Buck defense stick swinger, dented the net with a shot that even the alert Vancouver goalie, Perck Jackson, failed to see. The play caught Jackson flat-footed, and was executed largely with the assistance of Red Conn, Portland captain.

Penalties Frequent

The game was replete with thrills, major penalties and furious skating. Referee Mickey Ion was forced to extend himself in handing out penalties, four of the more grievous classification having been assigned in half that many periods.

Joe Jerwa and Jack Pratt assumed a somewhat unfriendly attitude early in the game. The second period found them throwing sticks at each other with no uncertain aim. Referee Ion stepped into the breach and settled hostilities by planting both on the bench for ten minutes and fining each \$10.

Last night's was the fourth straight victory for the Buckaroos. The game was the best in the way of stick handling and combination play seen on local ice this season.

Major Sasse Chosen Army Squad Mentor

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 3, (AP)—The Army football squad will be coached next year by Major Ralph Sasse, who has directed tactics of the West Point line under Coach Biff Jones.

Appointment of Major Sasse to succeed Captain Jones, who will be transferred to duty at Fort Sill, Okla., was announced here last night by Major General William R. Smith, superintendent of the academy. General Smith was traveling with the Army grid squad on its return from California, where it was defeated by the team of Stanford university.

It generally was expected that Major Sasse would succeed to the position of head coach, but General Smith gave the first official confirmation.

Lomski and Maxie Lock Horns Tonight

NEW YORK, Jan. 3, (AP)—Maxie Rosenbloom and Leo Lomski, leading light heavyweights for several years, clash in the "battle of nothing much" at Madison Square Garden tonight.

Through a combination of circumstances neither figures in the light heavyweight championship tournament, which has progressed to a state where the only survivors are two Buffalo residents, Jimmy Slattery and Lou Soozers.

Rosenbloom and Lomski have met three times with honors all even. The busy Harlem battler shed out one decision, Lomski, the Aberdeen "Assassin," took another, and the third engagement resulted in a draw. Rosenbloom rules a 6 to 5 favorite to win. The bout is at ten rounds.

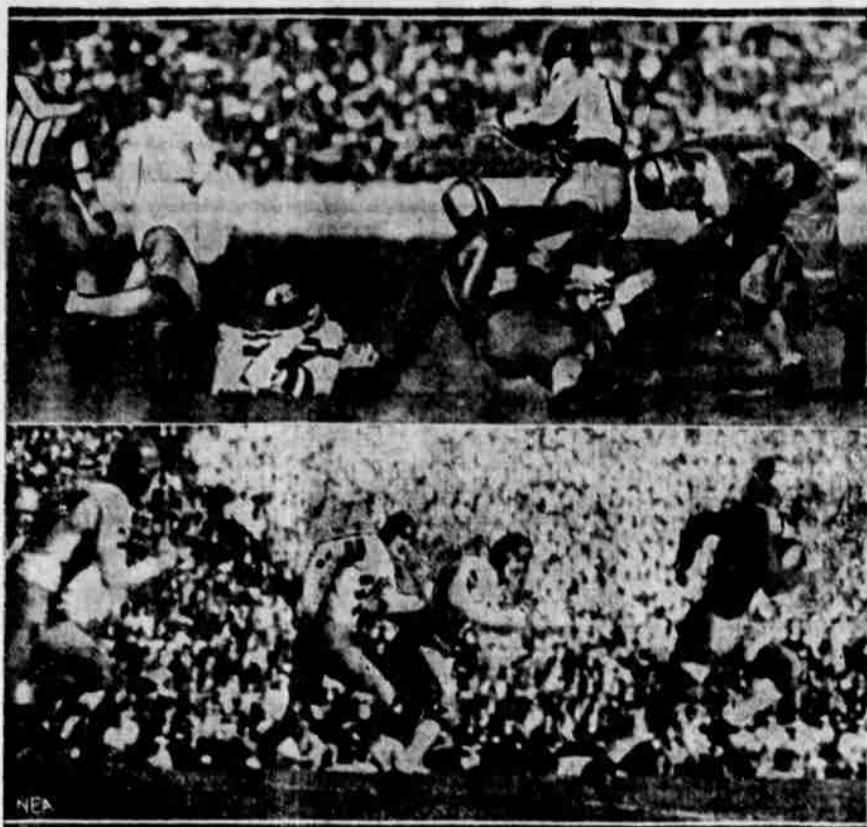
Earl, who returned from California, said an announcement of the name of a new coach must come through Tom Stoddard, student body president and chairman of the athletic committee.

Michigan Boxing Commission Cancels Shires-Criss Battle

DETROIT, Jan. 3, (AP)—Arthur (the Great) Shires, white Sox socker, and a lad who might be heavyweight champion if he were half as good as he is reported to have said he is, is under suspension by the Michigan boxing commission. The charge, which Shires denies indignantly, is that his representatives sought to have Shires' opponent in a scheduled fight here, take a "dive."

The commission acted yesterday after receiving a statement from Vance Gildersleeve, manager of Battling Criss (who was to have been Shires' opponent) in which Gildersleeve said Shires' representatives told him Criss would have to "take a dive" or Shires would not go through with the fight.

The bout, which was to have taken place last night, was called off when physicians for the commission found Shires was suffering from a severe cold.

THREE CUSHION TOURNAMENT OPENS

Johnny Layton to Defend Title Against Seven Challengers in Round Robin At Palm Garden.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3, (AP)—Johnny Layton, holder of the world's three cushion billiards championship for two years, begins defense of his title at the Palm Garden tonight with seven challengers in the field.

The championship round robin tournament gets under way with Layton opposing Harry Schuler of New York in one match and Otto Reisel of Philadelphia, meeting Charles Jordan of Los Angeles, in another.

Layton rules a favorite to retain his crown but considerable opposition may be expected from the former title-holders, Reisel and Augie Keckhefer of Chicago as well as from the other five challengers, Schuler, Jordan, Allan Hall of St. Louis, Tiff Denton of Kansas City and Gus Copulos of Detroit.

To the winner will go a yearly salary of \$6,000; a cash award of \$2,000, as well as a major share of the gate receipts.
