Lake of the Woods Beautiful—

"If you want to see a beautiful sight, just go to Lake of the Woods this time of year, and look at Mt. Pitt and frozen waters of the lake," advised James Daily, who with Andrew Grigsby returned Sunday night from the Southern Oregon resort. Their trip established a record, no car heretofore reached the lake at this time of the year.

Leaving Medford at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, they arrived at the lake eight hours after. Cold and foggy from Medford to Ashland, the weather was clear on the Green Springs mountain, with fog encountered again at Klamath river and continuing until they reached Klamath.

Everything was frozen over at Klamath. The water from Klamath on the weather was cold but clear and roads were with one exception.

The exception, said Mr. Daily, was caused by a number of trees which had fallen over the road over a distance of ten miles before reaching the lake, particularly between Fort Klamath and Dead Indian Springs—Medford Mail Tribune.

Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Daly and T. O'Connor, residents of Lakeview, are among the city's guests today.

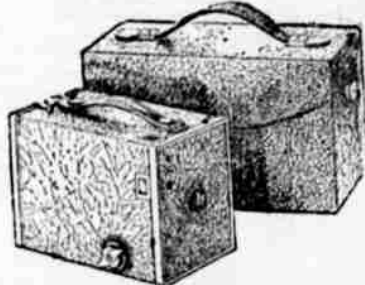
