

VALUATION AND MILLAGE RATES ARE COMPILED

Merrill Millage Highest In County, Klamath Is Second.

The total amount of taxes to be levied for each district and the millage rates for 1929 have been compiled by the county assessor's office along with the valuations on which the 1929 taxes will be levied.

Klamath Falls will pay \$208,226.04 in taxes on a valuation of \$9,551,653.81 under a total levy of 66 mills of which 21.8 mills is a special levy.

Merrill Highest
Total state and county taxes of \$846,427.19 will be raised on a total valuation in the county of \$37,786,928.38 with a levy of 22.4 mills.

Merrill taxpayers must pay the highest rate with a levy of 69.6 mills necessary to raise \$2,144.64 on an assessed valuation of \$752,699.91. Their special levy amounts to 29.5 mills.

Bonanza Lowest
Chiloquin is third high in the county after Klamath Falls and \$9,859.60 will be raised on an assessed valuation there of \$357,231.99 by a levy of 65.2 mills. The special levy is 27.6.

Malin taxpayers will pay under a levy of 61.6 mills of which 21.4 is a special levy and will raise \$2,156.65 on a valuation of \$169,778.29.

Bonanza has the lowest rate in the county with 59.3 mills tax on a valuation of \$88,091.54 to raise \$1,006.42. Their special levy is 14.5 mills.

\$422,895.64 Schools
A total of \$1,493,526.28 will be raised for all purposes for the coming year in taxes for 1929 the records show. Of that amount \$422,895.64 will be used for educational purposes by the various school districts.

Description of Trustees Given

Notices containing the list of names and descriptions of trustees who have "walked off" from the Klamath county prison within the past several months have been sent to cities and towns throughout the north-west by L. L. Low, sheriff.

The list includes D. S. Gathwright, alias Pat Gathwright, who, the notice states, "will be bootlegging or living off woman;" John Knox, booked as a truckdriver, "who will probably be found bootlegging;" Charles Coke, listed as cook and salesman; moonshiner; Lawrence Meyers, bootlegger; and Carl Carter alias Tex Carter, "gambler and rouser, bootlegger."

This is the first circular sent out from Klamath containing finger print records of former prisoners and plots taken here. Both the finger-print record and plot of Gathwright is given, and Carter has a finger-print classification.

Judge W. M. Duncan Leaves for Judicial Council; Report Shows Work Done by Court here in 1929

Judge W. M. Duncan of the 13th judicial district left last night for Portland, where he will attend today a meeting of the Oregon judicial council, which is composed of the supreme court and the judges of the various state courts.

Reports of the work of the 13th judicial district for 1929 will be taken to the meeting and will be filed with the council secretary. Court work in this district is now up to date, with all cases ready for trial. Some remain at issue and there are some criminal cases which will be tried during the January term of court.

Is National Problem
With the problem of law enforcement and court action now being studied by the highest authorities in the nation on that subject, Klamath county is seen to be well to the front in efficiency.

Judge Duncan's report shows that during the past year 302 law actions were filed in this court; equity suits filed totaled 104; 151 divorce cases were filed; 89 criminal actions were registered on the court books.

Many Trials Held
Jury trials in Klamath county, which is the 13th judicial district of the state, cost approximately \$4,577.53, records show. This includes 23 civil cases tried by jury and 12 criminal trials. There were no equity cases tried by jury during the past year.

Five law actions were tried by the court, 16 equity trials were held before the judge, and seven contested divorce cases were also tried by him; 101 divorce cases which went by default were tried.

Speeds Court Procedure
During the year the law docket and the equity docket were called a number of times and at each time an attempt was made

to get for trial as many cases as were ready to be tried. This resulted in the court being caught up in its work throughout the year and in justice being speeded.

The number of cases tried in comparison to the number of legal actions filed does not show the number of cases yet open, it was pointed out, as many cases are dismissed, non-suited or withdrawn, and do not come to trial.

Study Court Work
At the meetings of the judicial council many matters relating to legal and court practice are discussed and recommendations are made to the legislature for changes in laws where they are thought needed. Judge Duncan said yesterday.

Among the problems which the council has discussed or is considering are changes in the manner of selection of the jury panel. At the present time the panel is selected by the county court. The change advocated is to allow a member of the circuit court to help choose the panel.

Jury selection is also being considered in connection with the attempt to speed up court procedure. In Klamath county in

Taxi Companies Move From Main

In obedience of a recent city ordinance passed by the council, all taxi stands have been moved off Main street, a survey made yesterday showed. Whether or not the taxi owners intend to carry the matter of the validity of this law further remains to be seen, according to Keith Ambrose, chief of police.

A ordinance was passed November 5 and for several weeks was observed by the taximen, although they complained against it and hired an attorney to represent them before the council and in court, should the matter be taken that far.

However, during the last week of the year three of the taxi companies, Gordon's, the Hurry and the White Star, ignored the law entirely by keeping one of their cars in a stand on Main street at all hours. On the night of December 30, after City Attorney A. W. Schaupp had given an opinion that the law is valid, the chief of police issued orders to all the companies to have their stands off the street by the first of the year.
