JUDGES TALK LAW CHANGES

Insanity, Jury List and Trial By Court Discussed

Circuit Judge W. M. Duncan has returned from the meeting of the Oregon Judicial Council held in Portland Saturday and at which the circuit judges and the members of the state supreme court proposed changes in laws affecting court procedure.

In the matter of pleas of insanity by those accused of crimes the judges wish that they be able to appoint experts for the court and accept the report of those appointed, where the question of insanity is brought up. They would also ask that the law be changed to make it necessary for the defense to make a statement at the beginning of the trial regarding a plea of insanity.

Discuss Insanity Plea

A resolution was passed recommending that a law be passed giving the state and the defense the same number of peremptory challenges, making each have three, except in the matter of cases punishable by death.

They would ask that a law be passed making it necessary that any party acquitted of a crime on grounds of insanity be compelled to spend at least three years in the state hospital before being allowed to apply for a writ of habeas corpus.

Under another suggested law the defendant would be allowed to have his case tried by the court alone or by jury, except in capital cases.

For Jury List Change

The judges also felt that the circuit court should be allowed to aid in the selection of the jury list, which is now made up alone by the county court. In Multnomah county at the present time the court appoints those who select the jury list.

Some time was spent at the meeting discussing the proposal to make criminal cases of like charges more uniformly punished. Governor L. L. Patterson, during his life, brought out that in different parts of the state men accused of like crimes were given sentences which sometimes differed in the most extreme manner.

No direct action was taken on the suggestion. Judges, however, will compile reports with the idea of agreeing on such general policies as seem justifiable.

Many times the circuit courts feel there are circumstances that call for consideration in the sentence meted out. The man may be a hardened criminal with previous offenses or he may be a young man gone wrong for the first time and with no previous mistakes or crimes against him.

The judges also passed a resolution to meet this summer with the Oregon State Bar association in Pendleton, pursuant to

a request from the bar association. Many problems of each could be adjusted with the help of the other association, it is felt.

YOUTHS SAVE COMPANION ON HUNTING TRIP

Three Klamath youths experienced an adventure Sunday such as occur in the west where men are men and where it gets cold enough sometimes to almost freeze off the fur. These three proved themselves sons of the west and almost came through unscathed.

Harry Seweris, 14, and Lynn Propert, 14, accompanied by another youth whose name could not be learned, were hunting in the marsh below the Kerns ranch on the Keno Highway Sunday when Seweris slipped into an irritating ditch, wetting half his clothing and one foot.

It was only a matter of a few minutes before his wet clothes began to freeze in the bitter cold wind blowing over this open land.

The boys started a tramp toward a large ditch digger located near the marsh which offered a possibility of shelter and warmth to thaw Harry's clothing. Harry soon became as stiff from the cold he was unable to proceed further, so Propert took the boy, still clutching his gun, and carried him the rest of the way to the shovel.

The boys had two matches between them and a small scrap of paper. They gathered sticks and built a small fire in the scoop of the big shovel, which soon thawed the ice from Harry's boot so they could slip it off. Lynn called into use first aid used in scouting, diligently rubbed the boy's half-frozen hands and feet. By the time the car which had taken them, Harry was again able to walk, and yesterday was little the worse for his experience.

Pacific Highway Cleared of Snow

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer, reports that snow has been cleared from the Pacific highway in the southern part of the state and the highway is now open throughout its length. The Redwood highway below Grants Pass was to be cleared early today.

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
