SHARKEY AND SCOTT SIGNED FOR FEB. 27

Sailor Insists on Match With Tall Briton At Miami.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8, (AP)—Jack Sharkey, Boston sailor man, will battle Phil Scott, heavyweight champion of Great Britain, in Madison Square Garden's second annual southern spectacle at Miami, Fla., Feb. 27.

Difficulties were ironed out in a long conference at the Garden last night.

Selection of Scott as Sharkey's opponent was practically dictated by the Boston sailor, generally regarded as the outstanding contender for Gene Tunney's vacated heavyweight throne. At a recent conference in Boston, Sharkey threatened to break away from the Garden for good unless it abandoned its attempt to match him with Tuffy Griffiths in Miami. He named two or three possible opponents he would be willing to meet but favored Scott especially.

Looks Easy For Sailor
Advance calculations on the match forecast a decisive victory for Sharkey provided he can duplicate such a performance as he flashed against Tommy Loughran, whom he knocked out in two rounds. Scott is a fair boxer with a good left jab but he does not hit hard enough, it would seem, to bother Sharkey. The tall Briton, now in England, is under somewhat of a cloud in this district as a result of his recent battle with Otto Von Forst. Scott won that bout on a foul in the second round but investigations later seemed to confirm a rather general belief that he was not hurt by the low blow and could have continued.

Scott Sails 15th
LONDON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Phil Scott, British heavyweight boxing champion, is booked to sail on the Homeric one week from today for his bout with the American, Jack Sharkey.

Maroons Take One From Montrealites

NEW YORK, Jan. 8, (AP)—The Maroons and Canadiens of Montreal, rivals for the top of the international group of the National Hockey League, had a thrilling struggle last night, the Maroons winning 2 to 1. The Canadiens, feeling severely the loss of their big defense man, Marty Burke, made their best showing in three games against the Maroons this year.

Clint Benedict, Maroon goalie, was struck in the face by the puck, suffering a broken nose and a bad cut, and the game had to be held up while Flat Walsh could be called from his bed, where he was trying to recover from a cold. Twenty-seven penalties were called against the two teams.

Olympia Manager Advances Plan to Eradicate Fouling

DETROIT, Jan. 8 (AP)—A method for reducing the number of fights decided by fouls, is being put forward by Dick Dunn, manager of Olympia. Dunn would have the fighters meet again the following week as an added attraction to another card. Both boxers who took part in the match which ended in a foul would have their purses held up until after the second meeting. If either fighter refused to fight again his purse would be given to some suitable charity.

REISELT HAS CHAMPIONSHIP WITHIN GRASP

Only Layton Remains in Way of German to Obtain Title.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8, (AP)—Otto Reisel, the smiling little German billiard master from Philadelphia, once again is sitting on top of the three-cushion world with his second national title within his grasp.

Eliminated Five
Five of the world's best angle players have already succumbed to Reisel's cool, consistent type of play. Today the Philadelphia found Gus Copulos, a battler from Detroit, barring his way to his sixth consecutive victory. A win would assure Reisel of at least a tie for the title, with only Champion Johnny Layton in his path to a clear claim. The schedule brings Reisel and Layton together Friday, in one of the last two blocks.

Hall Latest Victim
Reisel's latest victory was at the expense of Allen Hall, youthful St. Louis star, who was defeated 50 to 42 in yesterday's feature. Hall's defeat, his first of the tournament, shoved him down into a three-way tie for second place with Layton and Augie Kleckhefer of Chicago, who is ninth title with his south-paw stroke. Technically Layton leads the other two, as he has played one more game.

Layton Stops Greek
Layton remained in running in defense of his title by rallying to defeat Copulos 50 to 34 in 49 innings of drab billiards yesterday. Kleckhefer likewise improved his position with a decisive 50 to 23 victory over Harry Schuler of New York. Tiff Denton of Kansas City went out of the cellar with a 50 to 31 victory over Charlie Jordan, Los Angeles broker-billiard player in a battle of losers.

Great One Takes Faeth In Little Over Two Minutes

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 8, (AP)—It took C. Arthur (The Great) Shires, two minutes to convince a pitcher to go back to baseball for a living.

It all happened in the first round of a scheduled six round bout last night when a couple of right hooks sent Tony Faeth flat on his back for the well known count of ten.

Earnings Not Bad

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8, (AP)—Young Firpo from the mines of Burke, Ida., made short work of Ray Pelkey, Oakland, Cal., in their scheduled light heavyweight ten round main event here last night. Pelkey went down and out in the second round from a terrific right-hand punch and it was five minutes before he was revived. In the first round, despite Pelkey's efforts to cover up, the young miner delivered several hard right and lefts to his face.

Yamhill Gets Trout
The planting of more than 100,000 trout in the streams of Yamhill county has been started by the hatchery department of the state game commission. Most of them are being placed in the North Yamhill river and its tributaries and the work is being carried on under the direction of M. F. Corrigan, of McMinnville, a member of the state game commission.

Cougar Hunters Had Best Month in Years in December

Cougar hunters of Oregon had their best month in years when in December they bagged a total of 37 of the "big cats." The majority of the cats were taken in those sections of the state that are the favorite haunts of deer. Charles H. Erwin of Hoagland led the list for the month with the slaughter of six and was pressed for honors by John Oblack of Molalla with a total of five. Gard Saunders of Elkton and Bud Kintley of Fall Creek each killed four cougars while Clay Uam of Milo and Dale Bonney of Drew each accounted for three of the cats. Erwin, in addition to killing his six cougar, bagged a wolf.

Coast Streams Good
Most of the coast streams are now providing excellent fishing. When clear water prevails the angler has little difficulty in taking the limit of steelhead or salmon in most any of the streams that run into the Pacific.

Eggs for Nature Study
Salmon eggs or trout eggs are furnished by the state game commission to public schools of the state for nature study. Hardly a week passes but what some teacher writes to Matt Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries, requesting eggs for the nature study classes.

Rogue Fishing Excellent.
The Rogue river is providing excellent fishing for southern Oregon anglers according to a letter received by Matt Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries from R. M. Parr, deputy game warden. "Fine weather and many fish in the Rogue," he reports.

Wallows Fishing Good.
"Central and southern Oregon holds no corner on all the good fishing in the state," declared a La Grande sportsman, when visiting Portland a few days ago.

Oregon Highway Condition Given By Association

A bulletin issued yesterday by the Oregon State Motor association shows the following road conditions prevalent throughout the state:

Pacific highway—The highway north from Portland is open but slippery in places on account of the moisture freezing. Use caution in driving. The road south from Portland is without snow until one reaches Canyonville. From there on considerable snow through Oregon, but the snowplows have cleared the roads and all traffic going through. Chains are necessary in the Siskiyou mountains in northern California. Roads are all cleared, but chains are necessary here also. From Redding south everything is okay.

Redwood highway—The road between Grants Pass and Crescent City was closed yesterday, but opened this morning. Chains necessary on account of snow.

Roosevelt highway—Okay.
Ashland to Klamath Falls (Green Springs mountain road)—Heavy snows and chains needed, but road is open.
The Dalles-California highway—This road is open throughout, but on account of snow chains will be needed between Bend and Klamath Falls.
Columbia river highway (old Oregon Trail)—This road is open throughout. No snow except in the Blue mountains where the road is slippery. Advise chains.
John Day highway—Road open.
Road to Burns—Best route via Bend on account of construction between Canyon City and Burns.
Roads to Seaside and Tillamook—No snow. Slippery in the mornings when moisture forms ice on pavements.
Mount Hood Loop—Almost two feet of snow at Government camp. Skiing and tobogganing daily. Motorists not used to driving in the snow would advise they use chains from Twin Bridges on to Government camp. Road closed beyond Swim. From the Hood River side it is open to Cooper Spur road by means of snowplows.
McKenzie Pass—Closed. Road open from Eugene to Belknap Springs.
