

COLD WEATHER STRIKES HERE

Four Below Zero Marks New Record in Six Year Period.

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ditions seem to be modified. This is four degrees colder than last year's lowest temperature.

At Kirk, according to phone reports from that place, a steady drop in the thermometer was experienced yesterday and early this morning a low minimum of 18 below was reached. Other outside reports were unavailable.

Tales are coming into Klamath of hazardous travel condition in the Shastas, on Sexton mountain north of Grants Pass, and on the Green Springs highway between Ashland and Klamath Falls. Snow continues to fall, adding to travel difficulties on the mountain roads.

Portland Has Snow

The scrape of snow shovels, a sound uncommon in Portland and the Oregon country, resounded throughout the city today as residents with upturned coat collars attempted to remove a two inch snow which whitened the state overnight.

Although yesterday had the earmarks of the beginning of spring, a storm rising east of the Cascade mountains swept into the state and brought with it real snow and low temperatures.

Mercury in the government thermometer gyrated crazily within the past twenty four hours but finally settled at 24 degrees above and remained practically stationary except for a trifle lowering during the night.

Starting in early this morning, the snow continued while thousands started for work, then ceased.

Medford Shivers

Down in Medford the mercury dropped to 14 degrees last night and established the coldest point of the year. It was accentuated by a heavy fog and two inches of snow. Hundreds of birds flocked into the city to be fed by housewives. All highways in the Medford area were reported open.

La Grande shivered in eight above, a new low for the season. Sub zero weather was reported from Meacham with a minimum of 12 below. Elgin reported two above.

Baker reported that overcast skies indicated snow with the mercury at one above.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8. (AP)—From Seattle to San Diego the Pacific coast was swept by chill winds last night, and weather bureau experts predicted a continuance of the cold during the day. Freezing temperatures were reported in many regions.

Snow fell in parts of California even in citrus belts and on the Mojave desert where it is seldom seen. Drifted snow in the mountains east of Stockton, Cal., caused apprehension for at least one couple believed snowbound in a mountain cabin. Search parties tried to force a path to the aid of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Nightengale marooned in their summer cabin.

Chico Men Safe

Three Chico men, earlier believed snowbound somewhere on the Jonesville road, were picked up last night by searchers who located them on the road about 20 miles from Chico. The men, Dan and Kirk Zumwalt and W. T. Wray, had to leave their automobile and proceed toward Chico on foot after a Sunday outing that became a weekend excursion.

Orchardists Smudge

Orchardists used smudges in many parts of the state. Riverside growers had been warned of an impending low temperature of 25 degrees. At Ventura, where a five minute snowstorm was reported yesterday, continued cold was expected. Clear and cold was the prediction at San Jose and generally throughout the interior valleys. Rain fell in San Jose and foothills near the city were covered by snow.

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his father, King George of Great Britain, Marshal Petain, saviour of Verdun, and M. Beco de Fouquieres, director of the protocol, were present for France. Ambassador John W. Garrett and Mrs. Garrett represented the United States. The Infante Don Ferdinand was sent by his cousin King Alfonso for Spain. Premier Mussolini, his cabinet, secretaries and their wives were present.

Bride Enters With Father

The bride, a tall, striking girl, entered the historic chapel on the arm of her father, King Albert, who was garbed in the full dress of a general. The wedding march was an old Sardinian hymn sung by the papal choir lent the royal family for the occasion. At the altar rail waiting for her stood the crown prince, resplendent in the full dress of a colonel of infantry, and wearing the collar of the Annunziata, Italy's highest decoration about his neck.

Prince Handsome

Dark, of high stature, handsome, and with a pleasing smile, he presented a colorful figure in his gray green uniform relieved by silver epaulettes with their long fringes, the plaques and medals, and the long purple sash caught up just under the sword at his left.

The bride wore a cream white velvet gown at ankle length with a mantle of the same material, seven yards long, and embroidered with ermine. The queen of Italy wore cloth of gold with pearls and a golden mantle five yards long. Princesses Yolanda, Mafalda and Marie wore regal mantles of House of Savoy blue bordered in gold.

Cardinal Smiles

Cardinal Maffi, smiling benevolently, approached the royal couple as they went forward to the altar. His conspect of brilliant red was surmounted by a rochet of rare old lace, and on his head were the cardinals' red beretta. His episcopal ring, studded with a brilliant amethyst, glittered on his finger.

One Ceremony Sufficient

He read first the terms of the Italian code governing marriages, since by virtue of the conclusion of the lateran treaties of last February 11 the priest officiating at a wedding assumes the functions of a civil officer of the Italian state. Had the couple been married before the signing of the lateran treaties they would have had to go through two ceremonies, one civil, the other religious.

There were smiles when Cardinal Maffi in accordance with the code before him, told Marie Jose that she must contribute to her husband's maintenance if he had not sufficient means. (His father, King Victor, is reputed to be the richest man in all Italy.)

King Kisses Missal

The nuptial mass was celebrated "according to royal prerogative." After reading of the gospel the celebrant offered the missal to the king of Italy, who kissed it and returned it.

Witnesses for the bride were her brothers, the Duke of Brabant and the Count of Flanders, and for the bridegroom the Duke of Aosta and the Count of Turin. They held the veil over the heads of the two until they responded with "si," and then they let it fall.

Parents Give Consent Before answering the cardinal's

questions each turned toward parents for consent, which was given with a nod of the head.

Cardinal Maffi then blessed the rings of the two and they exchanged them. The choir began "Oremus Pro Principe Nostro—Let Us Pray for Our Prince." The cardinal pronounced them man and wife and the mass went on, punctuated with other bits of music. At its conclusion the cardinal read them the terms of the pope's letter of special benediction to the young people.

Then arm and arm they marched down the central aisle of the chapel, bowing and smiling to the right and left, the future king and queen of Italy. They went through the palace to the balcony where they were accorded a tremendous ovation by the crowd gathered below. They were cheered to the echo by the multitude, which included Fascist organizations drawn up in military formation.

The ceremony over the bride and groom went directly to the Vatican for a private audience with Pope Pius XI.

Humbert and the new princess of Piedmont arrived at the Vatican frontier just before one o'clock. They had been delayed 25 minutes because of a great crush of people about the Quirinal palace. Police and soldiers had the utmost difficulty in clearing a way.

Pope Pius smiled benignantly when they finally were ushered into his presence. He dismissed their excuses for their tardiness with a gesture and told them how much their visit pleased him.

Loan Association To Locate in City

Jay S. Moltzner, managing director of the Guardian Building & Loan association of Portland is in Klamath Falls today to pick a location for a branch office of the firm which will be opened here in the very near future.

The rapid spread of the concern of the entire state has been greatly increased during the past year, Mr. Moltzner stated, and branch offices will be opened soon in Eugene, Medford and Burns as well as Klamath Falls. Other offices are already established in The Dalles, La Grande, Baker and Tillamook.

A central location for the firm will be established in Klamath Falls and a manager installed for the local office. The manager will probably be a Klamath man.

In addition to a savings department a loan department will also be a part of the business, and loans made on first mortgages.

Man and Woman Draw Three Years

Nelson West and Mary Reed were sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary on the charge of robbery and violence, not being armed with a dangerous weapon. Sentence was passed this afternoon by Judge Duncan.

The man and woman, together with Clarence Pratt, were arrested on December 12, the result of an investigation of the robbery of Gibson's store in Dairy the night before. The trio entered the store, escaped with \$35, and left in a car for Klamath Falls and were apprehended the next day, two of them in Klamath and one at Chiloquin, and were placed in the county jail.

T. R. Gillenwaters, deputy district attorney, represented the state in the prosecution of the two robbers.

Sentence on Pratt will probably be given later this afternoon, it was stated.

INTERVIEWS LACK EVIDENCE

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in an automobile to the apartment, where Taylor was killed, the night Sands found the body. Peavey, Taylor's valet, claimed his attempts to disclose the slayer had been muzzled by investigators at the original inquiry.

The district attorney called attention to the thorough questioning which both Peavey and Hefner underwent shortly after the murder, and on several occasions in recent years. He said evidence recounted by Hefner within the past few days had been discredited previously, and that Peavey's recent statement matches others he had made.

King Gives Version

Edward King, a veteran investigator of the district attorney's office, who directed the principal inquiry in the murder, and since had led other searches for new evidence, told the Associated Press:

"I think I know as much about this case as any human being living. I worked on it from the day the body was found."

"With regard to Peavey's statement that he has knowledge of the slayer, but was prevented from giving it, I will say this: If ever a man was given an opportunity to tell what he knew about a case, that man was Peavey. We begged, pleaded and threatened him, but he would not talk."

Peavey Confessed

"Several years ago, 1927, we heard that Peavey had confessed killing Taylor. He was in San Francisco then, and we asked the San Francisco police to arrest him. I went up and questioned him. 'Why, no, I never made any such statement,' he said."

"Peavey is a lover of publicity. No doubt he said the things attributed to him, but what he can say won't solve this case. We have all the information Peavey can give about the Taylor murder. Let some one unfamiliar with every detail of the case talk to Peavey and he'll recount some such story as he just has. Then let me step in the room, and knowing that he is facing someone who is acquainted with every detail of it and he will tell me: 'Why, no, I never said that.'"

Jailers Worked on Case

Clem Peoples, now county jailer and a deputy sheriff at the time of the murder, who aided King in the attempts to identify the slayer, said that Hefner has no direct information about the killing.

"Hefner was told what to say by Sands," Peoples said. "We've questioned him several times since this case developed. Nelson is his right name. I'm familiar with the various stories he's told, and I can go to him today and catch him up on numerous details which do not jibe."

At the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Emmitt, Orville Elma McConnell and Miss Opale Elizabeth Conklin were united in marriage by Judge Barnes. Miss Conklin arrived from Colorado just before the ceremony.
