JIMMY PHELAN IN CHARGE OF HUSKY TROOPS

New Coach Says Public May Criticize Him But Not Team.

SEATTLE, Jan. 9. (AP)—Don't think I'm afraid of criticism. This Irishman loves it. But don't criticize the team. They're mine from now on.

In this dramatic way, Jimmy Phelan, the University of Washington's new football coach, concluded a rousing talk before 715 alumni, grid fans and newspapermen at a banquet here last night.

Comes By Plane
The former Notre Dame quarterback who coached the Purdue boffers to the big ten championship last fall dropped down on Seattle from the sky yesterday afternoon to take over the Washington coaching berth made vacant by the resignation of Enoch W. Bagshaw.

A big rally was staged by 2500 students upon his arrival on the university campus and the monster banquet was held in his honor last night.

Likes Adventure
"More battles and bigger battles, that's why I'm out here," shouted Phelan at the banquet. "When a man leaves a great team and many friends as I did he must like adventure. And that's the reason I came."

"I don't ask my players to win. I ask them to use their heads; to put everything they've got into the game. The results will come."

Spencer Pleased
In his talk to the alumni, Dr. M. Lyle Spencer, president of Washington, said that "this is a day I have looked forward to for 10 years."

"We have had inharmonious at the university since 1915 and this banquet is a symbol of a reunited Washington, a reunited state of Washington."

Want Fighting Team
"We do not expect you to be a miracle man," said Tracy Griffin, president of the Washington alumni association in addressing Phelan. "It does not make any difference whether you win or lose. We just want a fighting team."

Phelan intends to stay in Seattle for a week before going to La Fayette, Ind., to get his family. He said he wanted to become acquainted with the Washington football players as rapidly as possible "so as to teach them my curves and ways of doing things."

Wild Playing of Copulos Leaves Three Men Tied

NEW YORK, Jan. 9. (AP)—Because Gus Copulos of Detroit ran wild yesterday, the national three-cushion billiard tournament today was in a three-way tie.

Champion Johnny Layton, Otto Reisel and Angie Kieckhefer will battle down to the finish line. Each has dropped one game but Kieckhefer has yet to meet the brilliant Allan Hall of St. Louis and Tiff Denton of Kansas City. Layton and Reisel are booked to match cues in their closing encounter Friday night.

Copulos tossed a bomb-shell into Reisel's well laid plans, when he equalled the world's high run tournament record of 17 billiards in the opening inning of their match last night.

Reisel staged a courageous uphill battle but lost 50 to 45 in 45 innings.

Johnny Layton remained in running by downing Hall 50 to 35. Kieckhefer took Charlie Jordan of Los Angeles into camp 50 to 49 in 73 innings to stay in the thick of the fight.

Portland Matman Tumbles Ketonen

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 9. (AP)—In one of the fastest and most scientific wrestling matches seen here in many years, Bob Myers, Portland's contender for the world's middleweight championship defeated Walno Ketonen of Los Angeles here last night.

Myers took the only fall of the evening in one hour and 26 minutes just as he was about to give up from a severe leg split, when he reached back over his head and grabbed Ketonen by the head and with a mighty effort pulled him over his shoulders and rolled him onto the canvas for the fall. Ketonen protested strenuously he had not been planned to the mat.

In the preliminary, Farmer Vance gained one fall over Canadian Mack.

Heineman, Baseball Magnate, Ends Life at New Orleans Home

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 9. (AP)—Alexander Julius Heinemann, who became the owner of the baseball club which once employed him as a peanut vendor, killed himself last night in his office at the New Orleans baseball park. He was 52 years old.

Rehearsed Act
A groundkeeper who found the body said he had been the baseball magnate rehearse the shooting while sitting at his desk several days ago. Friends said Heinemann had lost \$236,000 in stocks recently, but expressed the belief that ill health had prompted his act.

John D. Martin, president of the southern association, who came here today for the funeral paid tribute to Heinemann as "a faithful friend and a man charitable in mind and heart."

Developed Big Leaguers
Heinemann, a native of New Orleans and a bachelor, devoted

his life to baseball. He developed many big league stars while building the New Orleans team into a pennant contender in the southern association. Among his graduates were Joe Jackson, Dazzy Vance, Hank Deberry, Jim Bagby, Buddy Myer, Bob Smith and Joe Sewell.

Although his personal fortune was known to be large he had contributed thousands to charity. College students and scores of old ball players in need of funds received aid from him.

"He was one of the best guys that ever lived, but nobody ever understood him," Jake Atz, manager of the Dallas, Tex. baseball club, said.

Atz and other friends recalled Heinemann's strict discipline as a club owner and his desire to keep a secret his many philanthropies. Recently ministers of the city presented him with a gold umbrella as a token of esteem.

Fight Game Good For Baseballist

CHICAGO, Jan. 9. (AP)—Since becoming a professional fist fighter just a month ago today, Charles Arthur "The Great" Shires, has earned exactly \$5,000 in four engagements, \$2,900 more than he got for playing first base for the Chicago White Sox all last season.

The great man got the \$5,000 in the short period of 30 days, compared to five months of baseball playing for \$5,100; Shires' contract with the White Sox called for \$5,500, but fines plastered on him, ate up more than \$3,000.

Shires expects to increase his ring earnings to more than \$10,000 by meeting Al Spohrer catcher for the Braves in Boston tomorrow night.

His standing as a pugilist in Illinois free of blemish, Shires today hoped to recover his boxing good health in Michigan. The Michigan boxing commission was ready to listen to Charles Arthur's responses to questions concerning an alleged attempt to fix his postponed bout with Criss at Detroit.

Army of Golfers Seeks Big Prize

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9. (AP)—The Riviera country club course, which on the morrow will resound with the tramping feet of 129 chosen golfers as they inaugurate a three day trek seeking fortune and fame, today in quiet desertion clung to the secret of the outcome of the fifth annual Los Angeles \$10,000 open tournament.

The trail which will lead to a \$2,500 prize for the winner, consists of 72 holes over the rugged, stubborn 71 par layout; a journey of 6,910 yards for each eighteen. A round of the opening two days, with the fifty survivors and ties permitted to continue their quest in 36 holes of concluding play Sunday.

Eighty-six players yesterday earned the right to compete in the tourney with a list of forty-three exempt, aware that the victor's spoils will be collected by the contender who can consistently shatter par.
