Justice Barnes Hears Pleas of Three Prisoners

Joe Klopp yesterday pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of liquor, his third conviction, but took his allotted time to either waive examination or demand a hearing on a felony charge of possession on the third offense.

Justice of the Peace W. R. Barnes did not sentence Klopp yesterday on his plea of guilty to the minor charge but took the matter under advisement.

Edith Olson entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor and Justice Barnes set bond at \$100, which had not been furnished last night.

William Stencil pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of liquor but Justice Barnes did not sentence him yesterday. Stencil is represented by J. C. O'Neill.

Five Federal Charges Filed

Federal charges were filed yesterday against five men, all of whom are accused of violations of the national prohibition laws. The charges were filed before Bert C. Thomas, United States commissioner, by Louis C. Mueller, federal officer.

Shelby Ward waived preliminary examination and was bound over to the federal grand jury under \$2,500 bond.

Hearing was held today at 2 o'clock for Phil Gouin, represented by Ralph W. Horan, attorney. Friday at 2 p. m., James McCana will be given a hearing. He will be represented by J. C. O'Neill, who will also represent Wesley Pope who will appear at 10 a. m., Saturday.

I. O. Cover, of the Olene Chicken Dinner Inn, has retained Ralph W. Horan as attorney, but has not yet indicated whether he will waive examination or will ask a hearing.

Death Closes Career of Bok, Editor, Author, Philanthropist

LAKE WALES, Fla., Jan. 9. (A.P.)—Edward W. Bok, who came to this country as an immigrant boy from the Netherlands and carved out for himself a distinguished position in public life as an editor, author and philanthropist, died at his estate near here today. He was 66 years old.

Mr. Bok became ill shortly after his arrival here, four days ago, and his condition became critical yesterday. He passed away at 4:25 a. m. today, suffering from an acute heart attack.

Won Fame as Author

As the donor of a \$100,000 prize for a plan by which the United States might co-operate with other nations in attaining and preserving world peace, and the writer of "The Americanization of Edward Bok," an autobiography Bok became widely known. Retaining the details of his first employment in America as a messenger boy at the age of 13, his efforts to educate himself and his success as a journalist, the book was received as an outstanding work of its kind.

Built Florida Estate

Following his retirement in 1919 as editor of the Ladies Home Journal, a magazine for whose success he was largely responsible, Mr. Bok spent much of his time in Florida. Within a short distance of his estate rises one of his principal philanthropic enterprises—a carillon of 61 bells erected on a bird sanctuary.

For the dedication of the Mountain Lake singing tower and preserve, Calvin Coolidge, then president, made a special trip from Washington last February 1, and delivered an address in which he accorded high praise to the accomplishments of Mr. Bok.

Mr. Bok, his friends said, considered the town and its grounds a tribute to his grandparents, sturdy folk of the old world who found enjoyment in music.

Associate of Curtis

In his thirty years as an editor, Mr. Bok was associated with H. K.

Curtis, wealthy Philadelphia publisher, and in that city he was known as a patron of the fine arts.

He married a daughter of Mr. Curtis, the former Mary Louise Curtis, and they had two sons, Curtis, who resides at Rosemont, Pa., and Cary, who lives at Merion, Pa.

The sons, as well as Mr. Curtis, were summoned to Mr. Bok's bedside yesterday, but did not get there in time.

Five Sentenced For Liquor by Justice Almeter

Justice of the Peace Jack Almeter yesterday fined five liquor law violators, all of them, a total of \$1,425 after they had entered pleas of guilty to charges of sale of intoxicants.

James Jamison who sold liquor to Indians in a promiscuous manner, was fined the largest amount, \$450. Jack Russell was fined

\$350. John Stolt was ordered to pay a fine of \$300 and Charles Hanold was fined \$250. Sam Sherry was sentenced to pay a fine of \$75.

In some instances there were previous convictions against the men. In each instance charges of possession were not filed but the men were sentenced only on pleas of guilty to sale of intoxicating liquor. All were arrested Tuesday night.

H. W. Rodabaugh Held in Custody

H. W. Rodabaugh alias Rodabaugh is now in the county jail after having been brought back from Ashland by Constable Dave Cozad.

Rodabaugh faces charges of defrauding two Klamath Falls hotels and also had check charges. V. G. Klock, Burns representative, states that he does not know how many checks are out but that there are a number.

Klock said that Rodabaugh also bought a watch on conditional contract at one store here and then pawned it at another.
