Amateur Boxing Championships to Open February 28

PORTLAND, Jan. 10. (Special)—The 1930 Pacific Coast Amateur boxing championships will be held in Portland at the civic auditorium, Friday night, February 28, and Saturday night, March 1, under the auspices of Multnomah Amateur Athletic club.

A large number of entries is expected. Boxers from the Pacific Northwest winning any of the eight titles or those making the best showing, will be sent to the National championships at Boston, with all expenses paid.

Practically all the winners and a large number of entrants in last year's Pacific Coast Amateur boxing championships have turned professional. This will mean a large number of inexperienced boxers entering the coming championships, with an equal chance of getting into the fight.

Layton Defending Cue Title Tonight

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. (AP)—Johnny Layton of St. Louis and Otto Reisel of Philadelphia will meet tonight for the national three cushion billiards championship, now in Layton's possession.

The defeat last night of Angie Kieckhefer, Chicago southpaw, by Tiff Denton, Kansas City veteran, automatically eliminated Kieckhefer and left Layton and Reisel free to fight it out in the final.

Denton, who lost his first three starts in the tournament, conquered Kieckhefer, 50 to 26, in 35 innings for his fourth successive triumph. Earlier in the day Denton had beaten Gus Copulos of Detroit, 50 to 41 in 41 innings. Copulos also lost to Allan Hall, youthful St. Louis star, 59 to 31 in 53 innings. In the other match of the day, Charles Jordan, of Los Angeles, recorded his first triumph of the tournament when he defeated Harry Schuler of New York, 50 to 28 in 65 innings.

Married in Haste, Track Star Repents

CHICAGO, Jan. 10. (AP)—Winner of many women's track and field events, Helen Filkey yesterday out in the divorce court and will no longer be known as Mrs. Beach Van Huseen Warren. Miss Filkey, holder of many records, eloped with Warren last April; they separated December 15.

Jackie Fields, world welterweight titleholder, will meet Jimmy Owens, Oklahoma City puncher, in a special 10-round non-title encounter, but interest has centered on the 10-rounder between King Tut, mauling Milwaukee lightweight, and Bruce Flowers, New Rochelle negro. Tut has slugged his way to a leading position among contenders for a bout with lightweight champion Sammy Mandell and was favored to beat the negro veteran.

Win Six Straight Victories and Stand Two Points Below Vancouver in Hickey League

PORTLAND, Jan. 10. (AP)—Portland today had run its string of the Pacific Coast hockey league stood within one game, two points, of the Pacific coast hockey league leading Vancouver Lions, having defeated Seattle 2 to 0 on the Coliseum ice here last night.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 10. (AP)—Lightweight Champion Sammy Mandell today said he was ready to repulse the left-handed thrusts of Young Manuel Quintero, Cuban boxer, in the first major ring engagement of the Florida season.

Mandell meets Quintero tonight in a ten-round non-title bout at the Miami Beach Kennel club.

The champion is favored, although Quintero will be one of the few left-handers Mandell has encountered.

Wrestling Placed Under New National Control Association

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 10 (AP)—Wrestling, a profession which never recognized any national affiliation and frequently witnessed many muddled championship situations, was placed today by the National Boxing Association on the same organized basis as all governed sports.

Stanley M. Isaacs, president of the N. B. A., which last year included the mat game in its jurisdiction, announced that effective immediately all wrestlers are subject to the benefits, championship awards, suspensions and discipline of the national organization. About 3,500 wrestlers are affected.

Operate Like Boxing
High spots of the N. B. A. wrestling requirements call for defense of championships three times a year, posting of title appearance forfeits ranging from \$2,500 to \$5,000, public bidding by promoters for the privilege of staging championship bouts, wrestlers to accept terms of the highest bidder, national champions to be decided in recognized classes by April 20, 1930, championship entries to be matched by public drawing.

Will Settle Titles
Isaacs said the N. B. A. will not dominate over the wrestler but it was found necessary to formulate strong rules to protect the public from unannounced matches and disputed national championships.

The N. B. A. recognized only four weights—heavy, light-heavy, middle and welter. At present, Isaacs said, there is insufficient activity in the lighter classes to justify championships.

Wrestlers Classified
Five wrestlers were selected as worthy of an opportunity to compete immediately for championships in each division. One man in each class was given a bye provided all five men enter the eliminations. The bye-man will participate only in the final match.

Refusal by any wrestler to enter means his elimination effective in all 52 states under N. B. A. government.

Sonnenberg Leading Heavy
The ranking heavies are Gus Sonnenberg, Providence, R. I.; Richard Shikat, Philadelphia; John Fiesel, Ravenna, Neb.; Jim London, St. Louis, and Pete Sauer (also known as Ray Steele), Tulsa, Okla. Sonnenberg was granted the bye.

Every heavyweight applicant must post \$5,000 with the N. B. A. to assure defense of the title every four months.

Oregon Has Three
The light heavyweights recognized are Clarence Eklund, Buffalo, Wyo.; Ted Thy, Portland, Ore.; Hugh Nichols, Mexico, Texas; Pinkie Gardner, Schenectady, and Joe Banaskie, Chicago. The same conditions apply as in the heavy class except that the forfeit is \$2500. Eklund drew the bye.

Gus Kallio, Finland, was given the middleweight bye. The other four names were Charles Fisher, Butternut, Wis.; Ralph Parquet, Spencer, Iowa; Ray Carpenter, Lancaster, Ohio, and Bobby Myers, Portland, Ore. The forfeit also is \$2,500.

In the welterweight class, Jack Reynolds, Cincinnati; Billy Halas, Canutila, Texas; Robin Reed, Reedport, Oregon; Russell Vix, Los Angeles, and Charles Grip, Huntington, W. Va., were named under the same conditions. Reynolds getting the bye. The forfeit is \$2,500.

DEER LASSOED

Otto and Paulino To Spar Tonight

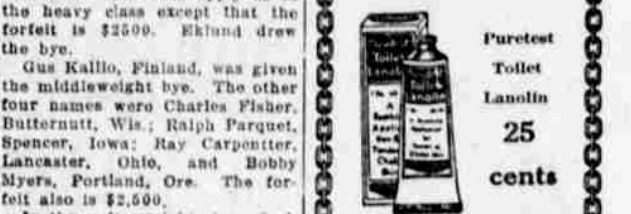
